

## STATE GAME LANDS No. 136 LANCASTER COUNTY

Each time a hunter buys a hunting license, the money he spends goes toward many facets of wildlife management. Since 1920, close to a million and a half acres of State Game Lands have been acquired with these funds. Each year nearly \$7,000,000 is spent to improve wildlife habitat. Habitat improvements enhance living conditions for non-game birds and mammals as well as those species which are hunted. Pennsylvania hunters willingly share these lands with the non-hunting public, and with few exceptions, State Game Lands are open for general use year round. Surveys indicate that hunting accounts for only thirty-five percent of game land usage. The remaining sixty-five percent is used by the general public for non-hunting purposes.

“Working Together for Wildlife” is a Game Commission program providing everyone an opportunity to help support wildlife management in the areas for endangered and non-game animals. Monies derived from the “Working Together for Wildlife” Program are being used in Pennsylvania to re-introduce the osprey, river otter, bald eagle, peregrine falcon and provide habitat for other birds and mammals indigenous to the Commonwealth. Construction placement of blue bird houses on State Game Lands provides needed homes for this beautiful songbird. Islands in the Susquehanna River have been set aside as propagations areas for non-game shore birds. Numerous other projects are planned on State Game Lands and other public properties which will also provide food and habitat for non-game wildlife.



State Game Lands 136 is in rural Lancaster County within the Pennsylvania Game Commission’s Southeast Region (Wildlife Management Unit 5B). The Game Lands is all one compartment. The entire property lies within Colerain Township, near the boundary with East Drumore Township and is accessible from Puseyville Rd, (State Route 2010). One parking lot is maintained and foot travel allows access to all of the game lands. The farthest interior point from the parking area is 0.5 miles.

Topography is semi-steep gorge and ravines, with some flats located above the steep areas. The lowest elevation (350 ft) is located along the West Branch Octoraro Creek. The highest elevation (540 feet) is located in the northeastern corner of the property.

The principle species hunted are white tail deer, turkey and squirrels. Furbearer trapping opportunities include red fox, raccoon and mink. Hiking, bird watching and geo caching are lawful recreational activities that occur occasionally. This game lands is small in size and is not a major attraction for these activities.

Game Lands 136 is primarily wooded. Soil conditions, existing wetlands and forest composition present opportunities for several game species as well as species of greatest conservation need. Management focus will be toward, whitetail deer, squirrels and turkey. In addition to practices geared toward game species, all management activities on Game Lands 136 will consider mammalian and avian species of concern and habitat improvements that can be made at the local level that we believe will bolster populations of these species on a landscape scale. Specific attention will be paid to bird species such as wood thrush, brown thrasher, golden-winged warbler, blue winged warbler and yellow-breasted chat. Habitat generalists including whitetail deer, gray squirrels and turkey will also benefit from proposed management.
