ATTORNEY MARTSON: The first item for consideration before the Board is on page two of your agenda.

The American Marten is a furbearer once commonly found in portions of Pennsylvania, but extirpated from the Commonwealth in the early 1900s due to deforestation and unregulated harvest.

In accordance with Goal 1.3b of the Pennsylvania Game Commission Strategic Plan 2020 to 2023 and as authorized by the Commission at its July 9, 2022 meeting, the Bureau of Wildlife Management completed an American Marten Reintroduction and Management Plan for Pennsylvania. The plan outlines a long-term, ten-year strategy, to translocate the species back to the state and then conduct long-term monitoring to evaluate their reintroduction.

Important aspects of the plan include release locations, source locations, as well as partnering organizations to provide martens and reintroduction locations. It also discusses methodology on capture, transport, health evaluations, and release. Finally,

the plan provides a timeline and cost estimate for the project.

The Bureau of Wildlife Management is requesting that the Board of Game Commissioners release the plan to the public for a 60-day comment and review period, excuse me, as per guidance from PGC SOP 40.7 Species Management Plans. Comments received and any resulting revisions to the plan would be presented at a future meeting of the Commission to inform a final decision on acceptance and implementation of the plan.

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just want to take a minute to recognize the outstanding job the PGC staff has done in advancing this issue. And in particular, furbearer biologist, Tom Keller, who we heard from yesterday. Tom traveled all over the state, attended, I think, 73 different public meetings, and really engaged with the public in letting them know what the plan was and how they could be involved.

He did a fantastic job, and he represented the agency incredibly well. I understand he's still working with an outside company to perform an additional in-depth survey of public opinion regarding possible marten introduction here in PA. And that survey is expected to be completed in the coming months.

I commend Tom for the importance of conducting this additional survey work to help us guide us in our decision-making process. So, given that the survey is not yet completed, I believe it's appropriate that we table this issue at this time to allow for that survey to be completed and the results to be made available to this Board and the public. By doing so and tabling this agenda item for today, the Board will continue our commitment to evidence based decision-making to considers and values the

input of the public that we serve.

ATTORNEY MARTSON: The next item for consideration can be found on page three of your agenda as it comes from the Bureau of Administration. The Commission recently conducted an evaluation of its issuing agent program looking for ways to decrease costs and requirements applied to this group. This effort is, in part, related to the Commission's recognition of the significant impact that changes to its licensed sales process have had on issuing agents in the form of reduced license sales opportunities and increased business costs. For these reasons, the Commission is proposing to amended Sections 143.21, 143.23, 143.24, 143.27 and 143.30 relating to appointment of agents, minimum sales requirements, fee for reapplication, conditions

for appointment, and return of disapproved applications and to remove sections 143.22, 143.25, 143.26 and 143.28 relating to rebate for first year agents, rebate restrictions, time for rebate, and application period to reduce issuing agent application fees, minimum annual sales quotas and annual bond rates.

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Current regulations set the annual issuing agent application fee at \$500. First year issuing agents are eligible to apply for application fee rebates of up to \$400 depending on the number of licenses they sell throughout the license year. However, few first year issuing agents recoup more than \$100 to \$200 in rebates each year. Moreover, the \$500 application fee figure was set at a time that predated the availability of internet license sales and on-site license printing for in-person sales that are now current standards. Due to the updates and advances in the licensing system, process and infrastructure over the past decade, the Commission determined that it can safely lower cost to issuing agents by reducing the annual issuing agent application fee from \$500 to \$200 without creating an unreasonable risk to the Commission. Furthermore, this change mitigates the need for the

Commission to maintain the existing rebate program, thus allowing the applicable regulations to be simplified by elimination of regulatory text.

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Current regulations require an issuing agent applicant to acquire and maintain an \$18,000 This bonding rate was set at a time when paper licenses were sent to all issuing agents to cover the value of the Commission's expenses for the value of the paper license stock, as well as all license and permit fees collected by a given issuing agent. After the Commission's migration to the current onsite printable licenses, its investment in licensed paper stock is significantly reduced. Furthermore, the Commission's migration to weekly electronic funds transfers has also reduced the Commission's financial risk associated with collection of the revenues generated by license and permit sales. Lastly, of the few instances in the past two years where a Commission collected against an agent's bond, the claims fell well below the \$18,000 figure. all of the updates and advances in the licensing system process and infrastructure over the past decade, the Commission determined that it can safely lower costs to issuing agents by reducing the annual bonding rate from \$18,000 to \$11,000 without creating

any unreasonable risk to the Commission.

As an added measure to reduce requirements on issuing agents, the Commission determined it is appropriate to reduce the annual minimum sales requirement from 50 to 25 licensed products per year. The changes will also allow mentor hunting permits to be included in an issuing agent's sales figures.

Lastly, the Commission determined that it is no longer necessary to maintain the limited

November 1 through March 31st application window for issuing agent applications due to the advances in technology and license issuing processes. Allowing applications year round will give issuing agent applicants greater access without creating any unreasonable burdens on the Commission.

So we've got a pretty ambitious staff out there seeking out these key pieces of property within game lands to try to protect the integrity of those game lands from further development and things like that. So whenever an opportunity comes up, whether we see, you know, properties being marketed by our field staff that we want to try to tackle these types of properties as fast as we can to protect the game lands.

through our entire elk management program for years,

or less acre of State Game Land Number 36 in Overton

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Township, Bradford County, Exhibit RED 8. The Commission determined that the three more or less acres to be conveyed to the Commission is of greater value than the land to be conveyed to the Gerlachs, and the proposed exchange is in the best interest of the Commission. Access to the three-acre parcel is through existing State Game Land 36.

Gustafson, looks like we've got another three to one land exchange here?

MR. GUSTAFSON: We do. And this is another instance where, you know, sometimes neighboring properties, maybe if there's an uncertainty about where a boundary line may be, you end up with what we call encroachments. Whether they have a shed that may be across the line or a fence or they're mowing grass, or in this case, a driveway that cuts across the game lands. Once we're aware of those, we have an obligation to protect the integrity of the game lands and clean those up.

Oftentimes one of the mechanisms we

use to clean those up is exchanges. In this case, there wasn't another suitable alternative, because of slope of the land, to get a new driveway access into this property for this individual. So you know, looking it's one acre and three acres. But the staff time, the negotiation, the surveyors going out on the ground to lay out this project, it's a lot more involved than it may seem on a simple map. So I just give a ton of credit to the field staff that work with the landowners, the survey team, our real estate team, our legal team, all of them that make these things happen.

You'll see several more of these coming up where we're trying to work towards cleaning up encroachments. It's a big mission of ours in the real estate program right now. So this is one of those projects.

PRESIDENT SCHNEPP-GIGER: Thank you.

Question. On the map here, it appears as though there's a group of buildings right in the middle of the State Game Land 36, there's a road going out there. Are those our buildings or are they, do they belong to somebody else?

The Commission will provide an additional \$1,220 lump sum from the Game Commission's restricted account representing funds from third-party commitments for compensation of habitat and recreational losses which occurred on State Game Lands for previously approved projects. Acquisitions using this may exceed \$400 per acre.

The Commission determined that the 4.55 more or less acres to be conveyed to the Commission is of greater value than the land to be conveyed to Sally J. Reedy, the McCutcheons, Michael J. Rethi, and Deborah M. Rethi and the proposed exchange is in the best interest of the Commission. Access to the 4.55 acre parcel is through existing State Game Land 153.

PRESIDENT SCHNEPP-GIGER: Do I have a

MR. GUSTAFSON: Yeah, it is. So in the previous few items that you saw, we were able to do an exchange, just a discrete exchange with one owner where they had land to give up that we could acquire that made sense. Sometimes when we discover multiple encroachments, there isn't that opportunity to do a direct exchange at the site. So in this case, there was an opportunity to acquire four and a half acres and allow those folks with the encroachments to contribute towards that exchange essentially. They're contributing funds instead of land, and therefore, we're cleaning up those encroachments in that way.

So, you know, lots of different ways to accomplish the same task. But yet again, you can see the complexities of some of these maps, and we're

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looking at small triangles of, you know. 04 and .011
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  acres. So it's a lot of work with the field staff,
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  the surveyors, the legal team. And it's a lot of
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  work just to draft up an agenda item to try to make
  it make sense. But, yeah, essentially we're
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  acquiring four and a half acres to clean up several
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  encroachments.

Range Resources-Appalachia LLC, Range, offered \$184,511 in exchange for a Special Use Permit granting the temporary privilege of constructing, operating, maintaining, and removing a total of 7,660 feet of above-ground water with four valves and or air vents in a 25 foot right of way and one above ground storage tank, AST, with the necessary pumps, valves and fittings on an existing 3.05 acre pad along with the temporary privilege of using and reclaiming 2,816 feet of existing access road and a total of 0.44 acres of additional workspace on State Game Land Number 232 in Blaine Township, Washington County, Exhibit RED 15. The waterline and AST will be used to manage and transport freshwater for completion of natural gas wells within the game lands while reducing truck traffic on the game lands and in the surrounding area. This is an informational item only. Therefore, no action is required.
