BIRDS IN WINTER


Many birds live in Pennsylvania during the winter. Some birds live here year-round and others migrate here from other places. Your backyard may attract some of these birds that are looking for the things they need to survive- food, water, and shelter. You can make your backyard more attractive to birds by placing a birdfeeder and birdbath, planting native plants and creating brush piles. Birdfeeders are a great tool to use to observe birds.

A bird is an animal that has feathers that cover its body, has a backbone, is warm-blooded, lays eggs, has lungs to breathe air, and has wings and hollow bones.

MATERIALS:

.Scissors .Glue .Markers or Crayons .Photos of Common Winter Birds of Pennsylvania (included)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Print the following 3 pages.
- 2. Fold the (nearly) blank page in thirds (like a brochure). This is your winter bird guide.
- 3. Cut out the "Cover Photo" and glue it to the front of your bird guide.
- 4. Cut out bird photos and then glue them into your guide wherever you would like. Get creative!
- 5. Use markers or crayons to decorate your bird guide.
- 6. Use your bird guide to help you identify birds you see during the winter.

Optional: Laminate your guide to help make it last longer.



Birdfeeders Are A Great Tool To Use To Study Birds

A good way to study birds in the winter is to set up a birdfeeder. Place the feeder in an area that is easy to see, like in front of a window. Use this guide to help identify birds that visit your feeder.

Birds Need Water, Too!

Birds need water every day, even during the winter. A birdbath with fresh unfrozen water will be attractive to many winter visitors.









