

Each time a hunter buys a hunting license, the money he spends goes toward many facets of wildlife management. Since 1920, close to a million and a half aces of State Game Lands have been acquired with these funds. Each year nearly \$7,000,000 is spent to improve wildlife habitat. Habitat improvements enhance living conditions for non-game birds and mammals as well as those species which are hunted. Pennsylvania hunters willingly share these lands with the non-hunting public, and with few exceptions, State Game Lands are open for general use year round. Surveys indicate that hunting accounts for only thirty-five percent of game land usage. The remaining sixtyfive percent is used by the general public for nonhunting purposes.

"Working Together for Wildlife" is a Game Commission program providing everyone an opportunity to help support wildlife management in the areas for endangered and non-game animals. Monies derived from the "Working Together for Wildlife" Program are being used in Pennsylvania to re-introduce the osprey, river otter, bald eagle, peregrine falcon and provide habitat for other birds and mammals indigenous to the Commonwealth. Construction placement of blue bird houses on State Game Lands provides needed homes for this beautiful songbird. Islands in the Susquehanna River have been set aside as propagations areas for nongame shore birds. Numerous other projects are planned on State Game Lands and other public

NORTHUMBERLAND & LYCOMING COUNTIES State Game Land (SGL) 325 in Lewis Township, Northumberland County with a small amount extending into Muncy Creek Township, Lycoming County consists of approximately 637.4 acres.

Game Lands 325 is a diverse areawith a wide range of species with oaks , red maple, and Eastern hemlock the dominant species. Other trees include red pine, Scotch pine, Norway spruce, tulip poplar, black cherry, sugar maple, walnut, and white ash. Topography varies from gentle slopes to steep side hills. The highest elevation of about 1,100' is along the southeast boundary. The lowest elevation of about 700' is located along a tributary of Glade Run in the north end of the Game Lands, in Lycoming County.

The entire Game Lands has good access via township roads T-675 (Water company road), T-672 (Hill road) through the center of the Game Lands, T-671 (North Bend Road) on the east , and T-668 (Murray Road) on the west. Several parking areas are available along these roads (Figure 3). There is one gated road that gives access to the old water company dam and intake area on the northern end of the SGL. Another gated road in northeast area gives access to the northeastern area. An old vacated township road in the center of the Game Lands is gated on the southern end and a gate on the northern end is located at a food plot along township route 675. These gated roads provide good foot access to the SGL interior.

Primary species hunted here include American woodcock, ruffed grouse, Eastern wild turkey, gray squirrel, and white-tailed deer. Black bear are occasionally spotted on the property and some bear hunting activity has been noted. Furbearers include raccoon, coyotes, and gray fox.

Hiking, bird watching, geo-caching, and cross-country skiing are lawful recreational activities that occur occasionally. The is relatively small in size and not a major attraction for these activities. 2/20/2018
