ABSTRACT: The objective of this job is to obtain native wild turkeys for both in- and out-of-state transfers to suitable unoccupied habitats. No transfers were necessary during the winter of 2012-13.

OBJECTIVE

To obtain native wild turkeys for both in- and out-of-state transfers to suitable unoccupied habitats.

METHODS

The Bureau of Wildlife Management has supplied each Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) Region with 2 complete sets of turkey trapping equipment. Each set includes a net, rockets, charges, rocket and net box, net weights, detonators, galvanometers, battery wire, data sheets, clipboard, and National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF) fiberboard turkey transfer boxes. We also supplied aluminum leg bands and banding pliers in order to maintain survival and movement data on the in-state restoration efforts. The Bureau of Wildlife Management provided replacement equipment when needed. The state trap and transfer coordinator identified areas within the state having suitable unoccupied habitats for wild turkeys. In-state restoration efforts were completed in 2003.

The coordinator was also responsible for arranging out-of-state transfers in cooperation

with the NWTF's Making Tracks Program, for making exchanges for other wildlife species, or for unilateral transfers to other states or countries that the Executive Director approved. Each regional wildlife management supervisor assigned regional turkey trapping quotas and destinations. Regional trapping crews were responsible for locating and trapping turkeys in their assigned areas. They were also responsible for shipping the turkeys to destinations assigned by the regional coordinator.

Beginning in 2006, all wild turkeys transferred out of state were tested by a wildlife veterinarian for *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*, *Mycoplasma synoviae*, avian influenza, and *Salmonella pullorum*, via blood tests, to ensure each wild turkey was disease-free prior to shipping.

RESULTS

No transfers were necessary during the winter of 2012-13. This is the fifth consecutive year with no transfers needed.

From 1958 to present, we have trapped 3,709 wild turkeys within Pennsylvania. Of these we have transferred 2,794 wild turkeys within Pennsylvania and 915 to 9 other states for population restoration or establishment (Tables 1, 2 and 3). This includes, in 2008, 23 wild turkeys transferred from nuisance urban flocks within the greater Pittsburgh area (Wildlife Management Unit 2B, Allegheny County, Greentree Township) to State Game Land (SGL) 432, SGL 297, and Allegheny Land Trust Property, a Safety Zone property, as part of the "Nuisance wild turkey transfer pilot program in Southwestern Pennsylvania" (Casalena and Trusso 2011). This program was in place to monitor (via leg-banding) whether birds return to their nuisance location and if relocated turkeys become nuisances in the relocated area.

During 2012-13 no training workshops were necessary for regional turkey trapping crews. Turkey trapping training is now provided to each Ross Leffler School of Conservation Cadet class.

RECOMMENDATION

This job should be classified as inactive (no annual report prepared) because virtually all suitable wild turkey habitat in Pennsylvania and the rest of the United States is now occupied, and no trap and transfer activities have been necessary for 5 years. If population declines or other issues necessitate resumption of trap and transfer efforts; this job and the associated annual report can be reactivated.
