5 PROCEEDINGS 1 2 3 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Good morning, ladies and gentleman, and 4 welcome to the Quarterly Commissioners meeting. We 5 just want to have --- just offer an opportunity for 6 7 public comment again one more time. And at this time, I'd liked call Jim Grace. He's the Deputy Secretary 8 for Parks and Forestry for DCNR; Jim. Jim, there's no 9 time limit, so you can talk as long as you want. 10 11 MR. GRACE: 12 I'll be very quick. I'm here just to 13 reinforce or encourage approval of one your pieces of 14 business this morning, which is the land exchange 15 between DCNR and the Game Commission involving lands at Pymatuning State Park, which will be going to the 16 17 Game Commission lands along the Clarion River, which will be coming over to DCNR. 18 19 I think this is a win-win for both 20 agencies. Staff from both agencies have been working 21 over the last year. I think we've interacted well and 22 come up with a very positive agreement. Since the 23 Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission also has a facility in the area, we've included them in part of 24 25 their discussions, although they're not formally part

of it. But we have interacted with their staff, and 1 we think we've met all of their needs as well. And 2 the University of Pittsburgh also has a facility at 3 the Pymatuning site, and I think we've taken care of 4 their needs. So I think this is a very, very positive 5 thing for both agencies. I think we've been working 6 7 cooperatively at Pymatuning for over 60 years. Ι think this change in ownership just makes sense in the 8 proper management of that area. 9

And more recently, we've been working 10 very cooperatively along Clarion River. We see that 11 12 site as one with increased recreation and access to 13 the river, and I think we both agree that it probably 14 make more sense for us to manage that along with the 15 State Park and the State Forest system. So I will be 16 here to answer any questions that you have when you 17 bring up that piece of business. But I very much hope you'll endorse it, and it's been a pleasure working 18 with your staff to get to this point. 19

And with that, let's stand for the Pledge of Allegiance. 6 PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE RECITED 7 8 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 9 Mr. Secretary, roll call, please? 10 MR. WEANER: 11 Mr. President, all eight Commissioners 12 are present. 13 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 14 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. At this time, 15 I would like to --- I'd like a motion for approval of 16 the minutes. 17 MR. SCHLEMMER: So moved. 18 19 MR. DELANEY: 20 So moved. 21 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 22 Commission Schlemmer, seconded by 23 Commissioner Delaney; any discussion? All in favor 24 signify by saying aye. 25 AYES RESPOND

8 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 1 2 Opposed? 3 NO RESPONSE 4 MR. WEANER: Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 5 yes. 6 7 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Thank you, Mr. Secretary. At this time, 8 I would like to call on Agency Counsel, Brad. 9 10 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 11 Yes, sir. Your first item today comes from the Bureau of Information and Education. 12 It's on 13 page two of your Agenda. It concerns Prize Money for 14 Working Together for Wildlife and Waterfowl Management 15 Stamp Art Contest. 16 In addition to their high visibility and 17 the attention and goodwill they create, sales from the 18 Working Together for Wildlife and Waterfowl Management 19 Stamp programs now generate annual revenues, monies 20 the Agency uses to help fund important land acquisition and habitat management programs. 21 22 Continued success of both fine-art print programs is very much dependent on the availability of top quality 23 24 wildlife paintings from Pennsylvania's finest wildlife 25 artists.

In the past, only those artists whose 1 2 paintings were selected as first place winners, and whose paintings became the property of the Commission 3 received compensation. More than ten years ago, fees 4 were added for first --- or for second through fifth 5 places. The fees have not been adjusted since then. 6 7 If we are to continue receiving saleable, quality entries in the Working Together for Wildlife and 8 Waterfowl Management Stamp fine-art programs, then we 9 10 need to continue to provide reasonable financial incentives. 11 12 After careful study on the wildlife fine-13 art market, and in consultation with recognized 14 artists and gallery operators, the Staff recommends 15 that on an annual basis for one-time publication rights only, the following cash awards be made to 16 17 other placing entries in both contests; specifically 18 Second Place Award, \$750; Third Place Award, \$500; Fourth Place Award, \$400; and Fifth Place Award, \$250. 19 20 Thank you. 21 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 22 Thank you, Brad. You heard the reading 23 of the commentary. Is there a motion? 24 MR. BOOP: 25 So moved.

The adoption of 17 18 proposed amendments to Chapter 143 by adding Section 413.203a. 19 20 To effectively manage the wildlife 21 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, 22 at its July 9, 2009 meeting proposed the following changes. Amend Chapter 143 by adding Section 143.203a 23 relating to the special elk conservation license 24 25 auction and license issuance process.

11 The Executive Director and Staff 1 2 recommend Final Adoption of this amendment to 58 Pa. Code as shown in Exhibit A on page four of your 3 agenda. 4 5 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 6 Thank you, Brad. You heard the reading 7 of the commentary; is there a motion? 8 MR. WEANER: 9 So moved. 10 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Commissioner Weaner? Second? 11 MR. The next item proposed on page five of 1 2 your Agenda, and it is also an adoption of proposed 3 new amendments to Chapter 141, Section 141.20, and Chapter 147, Sections 147.101 through 147.112a. 4 To effectively manage the wildlife 5 6 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, 7 at its July 9th, 2009 meeting proposed the following changes. Amend Section 141.20 relating to protective 8 material required for falconry, and Sections 147.101 9 10 through 147.112a relating to falconry, to meet the new Federal standards, as well as simplify, reorganize and 11 12 enhance current state regulations pertaining to falconry. The Executive Director and Staff recommend 13 14 Final Adoption of these amendments to 58 Pa. Code as 15 shown on Exhibit B, on page 6 through 19 of your 16 Agenda. 17 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 18 Commissioners, you heard the commentary. 19 Is there a motion? 20 MR. DELANEY: I'll make that motion. 21 22 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 23 Commissioner Delaney. Is there a second? 24 MR. WEANER: 25 Second.

7	Agenda. It concerns the adoption of proposed
8	amendments to Chapter 147 by adding Section 147.558a.
9	To effectively manage the wildlife
10	resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission,
11	at its July 9th, 2009 meeting, proposed the following
12	change. To Amend Chapter 147, by adding Section
13	147.588a relating to political subdivisions as
14	applicants to authorize political subdivisions to make
15	application for an agricultural deer control permit
16	for the limited purpose of managing the agricultural
17	deer control activities occurring on a conglomeration
18	of separate, but otherwise individually eligible
19	properties located within the jurisdictional
20	boundaries of the political subdivision.
21	The Executive Director and Staff
22	recommend Final Adoption of this amendment to 58 Pa.
23	Code as shown on Exhibit C on page 21 of you Agenda.
24	PRESIDENT ISABELLA:
25	Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you

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1 heard the reading of the commentary; is there a motion? 2 3 MR. SCHREFFLER: So moved. 4 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 5 Commissioner Schreffler. Second? 6 7 MR. WEANER: Second. 8 9 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 10 Commission Weaner. Discussion? If no 11 discussion, all in favor signify by saying aye. 12 AYES RESPOND 13 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 14 Opposed? 15 MR. WEANER: Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 16 17 yes. 18 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 19 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 20 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 21 The next item concerns Proposed Rule 22 Making. This rule would amend 58 Pa. Code, Section 23 137.1. Currently, Section 137.1 prohibits the importation of certain species of exotic and native 24 25 wildlife determined to be dangerous or injurious to

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1	the public, native wildlife or native wildlife
2	habitat, such as nutria, bears and primates.
3	This prohibition applies to all persons,
4	including those currently possessing exotic wildlife
5	dealer permits, exotic wildlife possession permits and
6	menagerie permits. The Commission has recently been
7	approached by a number of menagerie permit holders who
8	have alleged that these importation restrictions
9	unnecessarily restrict their ability to import and
10	possess certain popular wildlife, and thus limit their
11	ability to gain a livelihood. These menagerie permit
12	holders have formally requested relief from these
13	importation and possession restrictions.
14	To this end, the Commission is proposing
15	to amend Section 137.1 to exempt menagerie permit
16	holders who possess a USDA Class C Exhibitor permit
17	and who operate their menagerie facilities as their
18	primary means of gaining a livelihood from the
19	possession and importation prohibitions of this
20	section. The text is shown on page 22. The Executive
21	Director and Staff recommend the Commission approve
22	this change to 58 Pa. Code, Section 137.1
23	PRESIDENT ISABELLA:
24	Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you
25	heard that reading of the commentary. Do I have a

17 motion? 1 2 MR. SCHLEMMER: 3 So moved. PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 4 Commissioner Schlemmer. Second? 5 6 MR. WEANER: 7 Second. PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 8 9 Commissioner Weaner. 18 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 1 2 yes. 3 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Thank you, Commissioner. 4 5 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 6 The next item also concerns proposed 7 rulemakings to amend 58 Pa. Code, Section 141.22. In recent years, the Commission has been 8 moving towards a comprehensive restructuring of the 9 10 regulations attending the Code. The goals of the restructuring of the regulations are primarily focused 11 on simplifying and making the language more 12 understandable to its users. 13 14 In January 2009, the Commission completed 15 its efforts to rewrite the regulatory structures relating to the big game seasons. The Commission 16 17 intends to carry the theme set forth in these changes 18 to other chapters of the regulations to establish 19 clear correlations between related seasonal 20 information. 21 In an effort to promote consistency and 22 clarity in the regulations pertaining to small game 23 seasons, as well as expand opportunity and increase participation in small game hunting within this 24 25 Commonwealth, the Commission is proposing to amend

19 1 Section 141.22 as shown on pages 23, 24 and 25 of your 2 Agenda. The Executive Director and Staff recommend 3 the Commission approve these changes to 58 Pa. Code, Section 141.22. 4 5 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 6 Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, is there a motion? 7 8 MR. WEANER: 9 So moved. 10 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Commissioner Weaner. Second? 11 12 MR. SCHREFFLER: Second. 13 14 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 15 Commissioner Schreffler. Any discussion? 16 MR. DELANEY: 17 President Isabella, I'd like to make a 18 motion to amend this proposal. 19 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 20 All right, Commissioner. We have an 21 amendment on the floor. Is there a Second? 22 MR. BOOP: 23 I'll second. 24 MR. DELANEY: 25 It should read the amendment is to change

1 the references on page 24, to .22 caliber under 2 permitted devices, subparagraph One and prohibitions subparagraph One to reflect .23 caliber. 3 COMMISSIONER BOOP: 4 I'll second Commissioner Delaney's 5 amendment. 6 7 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 8 Seconded by Commissioner Boop. Any discussion? With that, all in favor of the amendment 9 10 signify by saying aye. AYES RESPOND 11 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 12 13 Opposed? 14 MR. WEANER: 15 Mr. President, the vote on the amendment 16 is unanimously yes. 17 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 18 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. Now, 19 Commissioners, we're going to vote on the amended 20 motion. All in favor signify by saying aye. 21 AYES RESPOND PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 22 23 Opposed? 24 COMMISSIONER WEANER: 25 Mr. President, the vote on the motion is

1 also unanimously yes.

2 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 3 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 4 The next item concerns amendment of 58 5 Pa. Code, Sections 147.902 and 147.904. 6 7 In July 2009, the Commission added Subchapter Y to Chapter 147 to relocate, consolidate 8 and more clearly define the permitting process for 9 10 persons interested in guiding other hunters or trappers for certain designated species. 11 The 12 Commission has recently been approached by a number of 13 houndsmen who have formally requested the expansion of 14 this newly created subchapter to authorize commercial 15 coyote guiding activities on State game lands. 16 The Commission is proposing to amend Sections 147.902 and 147.904 to specifically authorize 17 18 property permitted individuals to engage in commercial 19 coyote guiding activities on State game lands. The 20 text appears on page 26 of your Agenda. The Executive 21 Director and Staff recommend the Commission approve 22 these changes to 58 Pa. Code, Sections 147.902 and 23 147.904. 24 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 25 Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, is there

22 a motion? 1 2 MR. BOOP: 3 So moved. PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 4 Commissioner Boop. Second? 5 6 MR. SCHLEMMER: Second. 7 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 8 9 Commissioner Schlemmer. Any discussion? 10 All in favor signify by saying aye. AYES RESPOND 11 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 12 13 Opposed? 14 MR. WEANER: 15 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 16 yes. 17 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 18 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 19 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 20 The next item concerns hunting license 21 revocations for convictions. Proposed recommendations 22 to revoke the hunting and fur-taking privileges of the 23 individuals convicted of violating the Game and Wildlife Code. 24 25 The Commission, under authority of the

Game and Wildlife Code, may revoke any hunting license 1 2 and fur-taker's license and deny any person the right to secure a license or to hunt and fur-take anywhere 3 in the Commonwealth, with or without a license, if 4 said licensee or person has been convicted, or signed 5 an acknowledgement of violating any provision of the 6 Game and Wildlife Code. The Commission may revoke 7 such licenses for a period of not to exceed three 8 years for the first offense; for a second or 9 10 subsequent offense, for such period of time as the Commission shall determine. 11

Persons denied the right to hunt or furtake in the Commonwealth through this action, are notified by Certified Mail that revocation will commence July 1, 2010, and continue for such period of time as set forth following the individual's name. The symbol RA means the revocation was added to an existing revocation.

In accordance with the Administrative Agency Law, the person placed on revocation have the opportunity for an Administrative Hearing concerning the hunting license revocation. If an Administrative Hearing is requested, a petition for review must be filed at the Commission Headquarters within 30 days from the date of the notice. Unless deemed in the

1 best interest of the Commission by the Director or a designee, hearings shall be conducted at the central 2 office. Hearings are conducted in accordance with the 3 General Rules of Administrative Practice and 4 5 Procedure, and the hearing itself is conducted in 6 accordance with Chapter 35 of the Rules and Chapter 7 145 of the Pennsylvania Code. The Executive Director and the Wildlife 8 Protection Director recommend that the Commission 9 10 revoke the hunting and fur-taking license privileges of the persons named by the Bureau of Wildlife 11 12 Protection. Such revocation shall become effective 13 July 1, 2010, and shall continue for such period of 14 time and under the conditions set forth following each 15 individual's name. 16 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 17 Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you 18 heard the commentary. Is there a motion? 19 MR. DELANEY: 20 So moved. 21 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 22 Commissioner Delaney. Second? 23 MR. WEANER: 24 Second. 25 PRESIDENT ISABELLA:

25 Commissioner Weaner. Any discussion? 1 This item here also includes this supplemental that 2 we've received, the blue copy. Does every 3 Commissioner have it? 4 5 MR. WEANER: 6 Yes. 7 MR. DELANEY: Yes. 8 9 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 10 Okay. Any discussion on that? 11 NO RESPONSE PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 12 13 All in favor signify by saying aye. 14 AYES RESPOND 15 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 16 Opposed? 17 MR. WEANER: Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 18 19 yes. 20 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 21 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 22 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 23 The first item to come before the 24 Commission with regard to real estate is the report on 25 an Executive Session that was held September 3rd,

1 2009. The Board of Commissioners met on September 3rd of 2009 and discussed an auction of a tract of land consisting of 71 plus or minus acres of land on State Game Land Number 118 in Walker Township, Huntingdon County offered by Beverly Beeper (phonetic). Staff was approved to bid at the auction to purchase the property.

The property is entirely forested over 8 gently rolling terrain and is accessed by a 16-foot 9 10 purported right-of-way into the property. Acquiring this property would provide vital access into this 11 portion of the State game lands 118, which is 12 13 currently inaccessible due to physical constraints and 14 no legal access. The Bureau of Wildlife Habitat 15 Management attended the auction on September 30th, 2009, and was successful in acquiring the property for 16 17 \$250,000.

The next item for real estate concerns 18 19 acquisition. This would be Contract Number 3557, 20 State Game Lands Number 211, Dauphin County. The Harrisburg Authority has offered the 21 22 Game Commission two easements across property owned by 23 the Authority in Rush Township, Dauphin County to 24 allow administrative and public access into State Game 25 Lands Number 211 as shown on Exhibit RED-1 on page 29

of your Agenda. The price of the easement is \$13,000 1 2 lump sum. The easements begin at State Route 325 and end at State Game Land Number 211. One of the 3 easements will be approximately 2,000 feet by 50 feet 4 for 2.3 acres, and the second will be approximately 5 2,600 feet by 50 feet totaling, or 2.98 acres. 6 7 The purpose of the easements is to allow lawful access purposes, including habitat management 8 and timber hauling, law enforcement and lawful 9 10 hunting, fur-taking and recreation pursuant to the Game and Wildlife Code. The Harrisburg Authority 11 12 shall retain the right of ingress, egress and regress

13 over the easements. Each party shall be responsible 14 for any maintenance. Any damage shall be the 15 responsibility of the party causing the damage. The right-of-ways will provide vital access to portions of 16 State Game Lands Number 211 previously inaccessible 17 18 due to physical terrain and lack of legal access. 19 The Executive Director and Staff 20 recommend the contract listed above be accepted, and the Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife 21

Habitat Management to proceed with the acquisition of these easements.

1 contract number 3558 involving State Game Lands Number 2 214 in Crawford County, Number 54 in Jefferson County, 3 Number 283 in Clarion County, Number 62 in McKean 4 County and Number 44 in Elk County.

For years, the Pennsylvania Game 5 Commission and the Department of Conservation and 6 7 Natural Resources, two of the largest landowners in the Commonwealth, have acquired lands for public use, 8 but have differing primary objectives and uses for 9 10 these lands. As land has been acquired, situations have arisen over the years in which contrasting land 11 12 use policies and regulations that cause confusion for 13 the general public, and a decreased ability for each 14 agency to meet its management and public recreational 15 qoals.

16 As part of a decade-long discussion, the two agencies have prepared the following series of 17 18 exchanges aimed at easing conflicts while enhancing 19 the two separate agencies' abilities to meet their 20 independent objectives. In fact, since 1987, the two 21 agencies have been working collaboratively through a 22 cooperative agreement on management of a large portion 23 of the Pymatuning Wildlife Management Area, in which 24 portions are designated as State Game Land Number 214 25 and Pymatuning State Park. Likewise, the two agencies

1 recently have been working collaboratively on the 2 management of DCNR surface ownership of State Game 3 Land Number 283 where the PGC has easement ownership 4 rights.

5 In addition to the two major exchanges 6 involving portions of Pymatuning State Park and the 7 State Game Land Number 283, the two agencies are 8 taking time to address other smaller exchanges that 9 will also enhance the ability of each agency to 10 address recreational infrastructure needs, which also 11 will benefit the general public's use of these lands.

12 A breakdown of each exchange is as 13 follows. DCNR agrees to cause to be conveyed to the 14 Game Commission, a tract of land, which is a portion 15 of Pymatuning State Park in North Shenango, Sadsbury and Pine Townships, Crawford County, adjacent to State 16 Game Land Number 214, containing 4,248 acres as shown 17 18 on Exhibit RED-2 on page 32 of your agenda, 19 conditioned by DCNR and the Game Commission to allow 20 for potential trail use agreement on the abandoned 21 railroad grade located to the north of the property. 22 In addition, a two-acre tract of land 23 more or less adjacent to State Game Land Number 54 in Heath Township, Jefferson County as shown on Exhibit 24 25 RED-3 on page 33 will also be conveyed to the Game

Commission. DCNR will retain currently-owned interior infrastructure such as the septic sand mounds, the house, the garage, the stowaway, the Spillway, the bowl area, the sluice gates, the water well and the picnic areas as shown on Exhibits RED-4 and RED-5, on pages 34 and 35 of your Agenda.

The Game Commission and DCNR agree to a 7 shared use of the existing water well, septic sand 8 mound and related infrastructure. But each agency is 9 10 retaining a protective right for future use in the event that either agency abandons their respective 11 future use. DCNR will retain ownership of the lands 12 13 currently leased to the University of Pittsburgh and 14 the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission to include 15 the Linesville State Fish Hatchery and its affiliated infrastructure, as well as the land 100 feet 16 perpendicular from the shore into the sanctuary water, 17 18 commencing at and including the Linesville Creek as 19 shown on Exhibit RED-6 on page 36.

In exchange, the Game Commission agrees to cause to be conveyed to DCNR, five tracts of land or surface easement rights constituting a part of State Game Land Number 283 in Farmington, Highland and Mill Creek Townships, Clarion County, containing 4,573 plus or minus acres, accepting a right-of-way 50 feet

1	in width to the Game Commission as shown on Exhibit
2	Red Seven on page 37. In addition to partaking number
3	54 in Heath Township, Jefferson County calculated that
4	181 acres shown on Exhibit Red Eight on page 38, a
5	part of state game land number 62 in Hamlin Township
6	in Keane County containing ten acres, accepting a
7	right-of-way of access into the Game Commission on
8	state game land number 62 through Kinzua Bridge State
9	Park, Exhibit Red Nine on page 39, and a part of state
10	game land number 44 in Spring Creek Township, Elk
11	County calculated at 52 acres shown on Exhibit Red 10
12	on page 40 will be conveyed to DCNR. The lands being
13	transferred to DCNR will remain open to public funding
14	and partaking in perpetuity to the extent allowed by
15	law. The Executive Director and Staff recommend the
16	contract listed above to be accepted and the
17	Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat
18	Management to proceed with these exchanges.
19	PRESIDENT ISABELLA:
20	Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you
21	heard the reading of the commentary. Is there a
22	motion?
23	COMMISSIONER DELANEY:
24	Mr. President, I'll make that motion.
25	PRESIDENT ISABELLA:

33 Commissioner Delaney. Second? 1 2 COMMISSIONER MARTONE: I'll second it. 3 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 4 Commissioner Martone. Discussion? 5 Bill, 6 can you just expand on what Brad said in the 7 commentary and just give a little historical of where we are today? 8 9 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: 10 Sure, I'd be happy to. This exchange, pontooning land at the park area, there's a water 11 12 fountain management project in the program that's gone 13 on here for years. We've worked cooperatively with 14 DCNR. A lot of the area is open water for water 15 fountain management. There are some draw down opportunities there for water fountain management. 16 17 But there's other uses that are going on there, along 18 with the Linesville Hatchery or the wall, as well as 19 some of the recreational uses for DCNR. They have a 20 carp feeding station there that is well-known and 21 publicly prestigious in that area. 22 There's been a lot of opportunity with 23 regard to doing management. But having that land and 24 having that acquisition ability has been an issue both 25 with us and DCNR for our mission, as well as for

1 theirs. And Clarion River, where a lot of these lands 2 owned from the Game Commission go into DCNR; you heard 3 Jim Grace speak earlier as far as recreational uses, 4 there's canoeing, horseback riding, camping, those 5 types of things. A lot of stuff that are secondary 6 uses on game lands that in some instances aren't even 7 permitted with regard to Title 34.

Now there's an opportunity for the 8 general public to be able to reap those recreational 9 10 benefits, and for both agencies to actually meet their objectives as far as management. The Kinzua Bridge 11 State Park area, that parcel allows for DCNR to drill 12 some water wells which are needed for some of that 13 14 infrastructure. And then Ford Island, which has been 15 a big issue and the opportunity, we have an I&E building up on Ford Island. We don't own the land; 16 17 DCNR owns the land. Our ability to put more money 18 into preparing that and fixing that building up, you 19 know, again, is conducive that we own the land. So 20 just a lot of issues that have been ongoing for years, 21 just as lands have been acquired and management goals 22 have been in the area. This just cleans everything up. And it's certainly a win-win and a benefit for 23 24 everyone.

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PRESIDENT ISABELLA:

35 Commissioners, any other questions? 1 2 Commissioner Delaney? 3 COMMISSIONER DELANEY: Bill, this land exchange, as far as I can 4 see, is probably one of the biggest land changes the 5 6 Game Commission has ever done. I have the Deputy 7 Secretary here with us today. I absolutely --- I'm thrilled to see the cooperative effort that both 8 agencies have done on this to, first of all, create 9 10 better wildlife habitat and create more opportunities for our sportsmen and sportswomen. So I commend DCNR 11 12 and your staff, the entire staff here for trying to 13 make this happen. I realize that this has been years 14 in the working, and it seems like it's finally coming 15 to some fruition. So I appreciate the work that you 16 have done, that your staff has done and the Deputy 17 Secretary with DCNR. 18 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: 19 Thank you. 20 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 21 Commissioners, any further questions? 22 Commissioner Schlemmer. 23 COMMISSIONER SCHLEMMER: 2.4 I have one comment. And I'd just like to 25 for the benefit of sportsmen, reemphasize the fact

1 that all these lands that are being transferred to 2 DCNR will remain open to the public hunting and fur 3 taking in the future. So they're not losing any rights. 4 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: 5 That's correct. 6 7 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Anymore comments, Commissioners? 8 With that, let's end this long saga. All those in favor 9 10 signify by saying aye. AYES RESPOND 11 PRESIDEN<u>T ISABELLA:</u> 12 13 Opposed? 14 MR. WEANER: 15 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 16 yes. 17 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 18 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 19 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 20 The next item also concerns an exchange 21 of contract number 3559, State game land number 40 in 22 Carbon County, some State game land number 221 in 23 Monroe County. MFT Real Estate, LLC has proposed a 24 land exchange of three acres of State game land number 40, the east side burough of Carbon County, for 25

1 expansion of their adjoining business as shown on 2 Exhibit Red 11 on page 42. This particular three 3 acres is detached from State game land number 40 by PA 4 Route 534.

In exchange for the aforesaid three 5 acres, MFT Real Estate, LLC has agreed to transfer 50 6 acres more or less of land located in Barrett 7 Township, Monroe County. The property is an indenture 8 into State game land number 221 and is shown on 9 10 Exhibit Red 12 on page 43. The gently sloping track is forested with mixed oats and low bush blueberries 11 12 in the understory. The Executive Director and Staff 13 recommend the contract listed above be accepted, and 14 the Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife 15 Habitat Management to proceed with this exchange. 16 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 17 Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you've 18 read the commentary. Is there a motion? 19 COMMISSIONER SCHLEMMER: 20 So moved. 21 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 22 Commissioner Schlemmer. Second? 23 COMMISSIONER BOOP: 24 Second. 25 PRESIDENT ISABELLA:

38 Commissioner Boop. Any discussion? 1 No All in favor signify by saying aye. 2 discussion. 3 AYES RESPOND PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 4 Opposed? 5 6 MR. WEANER: 7 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously 8 yes. 9 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 10 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. Ladies and 11 gentlemen, that concludes our business end. 12 Commissioners, any new business? 13 MR. ROE: 14 I don't have any new business. I would 15 just like to say something if I could. 16 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 17 Yes, Commissioner. 18 MR. ROE: 19 Are you about finished? 20 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 21 Yes. 22 MR. ROE: 23 This isn't really new business but, you 24 know, it's the beginning of October; this is our time, 25 folks. I mean, it's a great year out there this year.

1	And I just would encourage everybody to get in the
2	outdoors; you know? As I have an opportunity to
3	travel around the country and in Canada, and we talk
4	to outfitters and we talk to guides, and they love
5	Pennsylvania hunters. I mean, we have we've got
6	one of the best hunting cultures certainly in the
7	lower 48, and a great agency. And we're not going to
8	get these days back for the next five months, so don't
9	miss out. You know, a friend of mine has a sign in
10	his hunting cabin; if you're too busy to go hunting,
11	you're just too busy. So let's get our Ned Smith is
12	gone for the day signs out, and let's get out there
13	and enjoy it this year. I hope everybody has a safe
14	and enjoyable hunting season.
15	PRESIDENT ISABELLA:
16	Thank you, Commissioner. I have some new
17	business. And since Cal is not here, I guess it
18	to you.
19	ATTORNEY BECHTEL:
20	Absolutely.
21	PRESIDENT ISABELLA:
22	What I would like is the Wildlife
23	Management and I guess Wildlife Protection Bureaus to
24	look into the feasibility of extending the late
25	archery season to end on January 23rd. That should

coincide with the ending of flintlock season, which 1 ends on January 23rd. 2 3 ATTONEY BECHTEL: You're talking about 2010-2011 season? 4 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 5 6 Yes, Commissioner. Yes ---. 7 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: I got it. 8 9 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 10 Commissioners, any other new business? 11 MR. SCHLEMMER: 12 Just commentary. 13 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: Commissioner. 14 15 MR. SCHLEMMER: 16 Thank you for hosting us here in 17 Philadelphia. 18 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 19 Thank you. I'm glad nobody got mugged. 20 MR. SCHLEMMER: 21 And thank you most by the southeast 22 division for this treat --- the officers, so forth. 23 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 24 Any other comments from the 25 Commissioners? That's it; adjournment. Oh, I'm

1 sorry. Yes, our next Commission meeting is January 2 24th, 25th and 26th, 2010 in Harrisburg. Is that date 3 okay with the Commissioners? Okay, that's --- we got that squared away. So we will proceed with those 4 dates. Adjournment. Can I have a motion for 5 6 adjournment? 7 MR. BOOP: So moved. 8 9 PRESIDENT ISABELLA: 10 Commissioner Boop, so moved.
