6 SECRETARY FOX: 1 2 Second. All in favor signify by saying 3 aye. ALL RESPOND AYE 4 5 SECRETARY FOX: 6 Opposed? 7 PRESIDENT HOOVER: That motion carries. 8 ATTORNEY RAUP: 9 10 At this time, we'll move into the first matter up for Commission consideration. This matter 11 comes from the Bureau of Wildlife Management. 12 Ιt concerns the Adopted Rule Making to amend 58 Pa. Code 13 139.4 for the 2016-2017 seasons and bag limits. 14 To effectively manage the wildlife 15 resources and provide hunting and trapping 16 17 opportunities in this Commonwealth during the upcoming license year, the Commission is proposing to amend 18 139.4 relating to seasons and bag limits for the 19 license year, to provide updated seasons and bag 20 limits for the 2016-2017 license year. The 2016-17 21 22 seasons and bag limits have been amended to reflect currently available scientific data, population and 23 24 harvest records, field surveys and professional staff observations, as well as recommendations received from 25

1 staff, organized sporting groups, and members of the 2 agricultural community and others interest in the 3 management of the wildlife resources of this 4 Commonwealth. 7

Proposed changes to small game seasons 5 include making youth and regular seasons for squirrels 6 7 and rabbits concurrent to simplify regulations and expand rabbit hunting opportunity; and making snowshoe 8 hare season dates consistent with statewide --- excuse 9 10 me, consistent statewide to simplify regulations, facilitate species monitoring programs, and reflect 11 the fact the harvest mortality is not a major driver 12 of population trends for this species. 13

14 In regards to wild turkey seasons, in accordance with the Wild Turkey Management Plan 15 guidelines, the Commission is recommending fall turkey 16 17 season reductions in four WMUs that have exhibited declining trends in turkey population indices. 18 Specifically, seasons would decrease from two weeks 19 plus three days to one week plus three days in WMUs 1A 20 and 2A; and from one week plus three days to one week 21 22 in WMU 1B; and from three weeks plus three days to two weeks plus three days in WMU 4C. 23 The only change proposed for black bear 24

seasons is the addition of a four-day extended

firearms season (concurrent with the Wednesday to 1 Saturday of the first week of firearms deer season) in 2 3 WMU 1B. This season in intended to prevent further expansion of bears into the western portion of this 4 WMU where potential for bear-human conflicts is high. 5 6 Concerning furbearer seasons, the 7 Commission is proposing to increase the length of the fisher trapping season from the current 6 days to 12 8 days in the 13 WMUs with open fisher seasons. 9 The 10 text of this amendment is found on pages three through ten of your agenda. 11 12 PRESIDENT HOOVER: At this point we'll accept a motion to 13 approve the proposed dates for seasons and bag limits. 14 15 COMMISSIONER DALEY: So moved. 16 17 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 18 Can I get a second? 19 COMMISSIONER LAYTON: 20 Second. 21 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 22 What we're going to do now is we'll go through these seasons and bag limits page by page. 23 Are there any discussions on page three? 24 Page four? 25 Page five? Page six? Page seven? Page eight? Page

9 nine? 1 COMMISSIONER LAYTON: 2 Mr. President, I move that the section 3 on fishers be amended to include wildlife management 4 area 3B. 5 6 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: 7 Second. SECRETARY FOX: 8 All those in favor signify by saying 9 10 aye. COMMISSIONER LAYTON: 11 Well, let's have a discussion. 12 Let's 13 have Ian talk about that for a second. 14 PRESIDENT HOOVER: Yes. 15 16 MR. GREGG: 17 This is simply to actually correct my 18 error from the January agenda. WMU 3B was included in 19 the past fisher season, and it was intended to be 20 included also in 2016-'17 and that was simply my 21 oversight of not including it in the January agenda, so this will fix that error. 22 23 SECRETARY FOX: Vote on the amendment? All those in 24 25 favor signify by saying aye?

10 ALL RESPOND AYE 1 2 SECRETARY FOX: 3 Opposed? Carried. 4 PRESIDENT HOOVER: Are there any other discussions on page 5 6 nine? 7 COMMISSIONER LAYTON: Mr. President, can we have him address 8 the river otter season as well, please? 9 10 MR. GREGG: Yes. There's another proposed 11 amendment, I believe, it's listed on page 9b, which 12 13 would move the 2017 river otter season from February 14 20 to 22 to February 18-25. What was approved in 15 January was sort of a placeholder because the season 16 wasn't going to take place until February. It's the 17 first season in 50-plus years and we didn't know what 18 to expect. It went well. We ended up extending it 19 one day at a time to the full length of the possible 20 21 season. We still ended up with about half of the 22 harvest, so we thought it was sort of the maximum That worked okay, but by simply making the 23 quota. season a week long right from the start now, we can 24 25 simplify a lot of the communications. Trappers will

1 know in advance exactly how long the season is, and we 2 don't have to have biologists and bureaus and regions 3 checking the numbers every night to make a decision to yes or no on extending the season. So this will just 4 simplify those regulations. 5 6 COMMISSIONER LAYTON: 7 Mr. President, I'd like to make a 8 motion that we amend the river otter season to be from February 18, 2017 through February 25, 2017 and strike 9 10 or until its harvest quota is reached. 11 PRESIDENT HOOVER: Do we have a second on the amendment 12 motion? 13 14 SECRETARY FOX: Second. All those in favor signify by 15 saying aye? 16 17 ALL RESPOND AYE 18 SECRETARY FOX: Opposed? Motion carries. 19 20 PRESIDENT HOOVER: Any discussion on page ten? Page 11? 21 22 According to the point of order we need to return back to take a vote on the overall package as amended. 23 Then at that point we will accept a motion to accept 24 the seasons and bag limits as amended. 25

24	implemented in	2003 to replace the system of multipl	е
25	species-specif	ic management units. The primary	

objective of this new wildlife management unit system was to develop and implement wildlife management decisions on a system of more homogenous units based on physiographic land cover use, human population density and land ownership. Wildlife management unit boundaries were defined in using readily recognizable features on the landscape rather than hard to identify political boundaries.

In 2008, the Commission conducted a 9 10 five-year evaluation of the structure of the wildlife 11 management unit system which resulted in the development and implementation of four WMU map 12 revisions. The Commission has again conducted an 13 14 evaluation of the structure of the wildlife management unit system and has developed the following WMU map 15 16 revision. Expand 5D in the northeast corner to 17 provide a more logical boundary. This proposed change 18 represents a 24,826-acre increase in the size of WMU 5D and the area proposed is shown in magenta on the 19 20 attached map. The text of this amendment can be found on pages 11 through 13 of your agenda. 21 22 SECRETARY FOX: We need a motion to accept that. 23 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 24 25 I'm going to go through it the same as

we just did. We need a motion to accept the proposed
amendment.

14	field staff. And instead of doing this piecemeal over
15	the next couple of years, we decided to go ahead and
16	just fix this entire unit. I know we made a change
17	last year. With this floor amendment we are now adding
18	a section of the unit that will extend up I-476 and
19	across Ridge Road north of the Perkiomen Creek. I
20	believe it's the Perkiomen. Is it the Brandywine
21	Creek? It's not the Brandywine Creek, the
22	Perkiomen I'm not sure of the creek itself. So it's
23	going to run across the Tohickon Creek on the eastern
24	side and then north along 611to Ridge Road. It picks
25	up another 27,022.7 acres that we're moving out of 5C

15 and into 5D, thus, making the boundary clear for 1 future reference. I'll take a motion on the amended. 2. 3 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So moved. 4 5 ATTORNEY RAUP: 6 Correct. And just as a point of order, would this amendment be including a replacement of 7 pages 12 and 13 with the documents that are in front 8 of the Board? 9 10 PRESIDENT HOOVER: That's correct. 11 Okay. I need a second on the motion to 12 amend. 13 14 COMMISSIONER SCHLEMMER: 15 Second. 16 SECRETARY FOX: 17 With a motion and a second, all those in favor signify by saying aye. 18 ALL RESPOND AYE 19 20 SECRETARY FOX: Opposed? The U.S. Fishing Wildlife 5 Service requested permission to release contact 6 7 information for the Pennsylvania waterfowl hunters previously provided by the Commission as part of the 8 HIP program for use in the nationwide waterfowl hunter 9 The Commission has been actively involved in 10 survey. the development of the survey and determined that it 11 will help future waterfowl harvest and habitat 12 management efforts in the Atlantic Flyway. 13 14 Their survey will be conducted by the University of Minnesota having a sample of waterfowl 15 16 hunters derived in part from the 2015 HIP program. 17 The Board of Commissioners of the Commission has authorized the release of the name and address 18 information for a portion of the Commonwealth's HIP-19 20 certified hunters to the University of Minnesota. Specifically, contact information for a random sample 21 22 of up to 3,000 resident, HIP-certified hunters drawn proportionally from those who reported that they 23 hunted for ducks and/or geese during the 2014 hunting 24

25 season.

This item was previously approved by 1 2 notational vote, and therefore no further Board action 3 is necessary. The next item up for consideration 4 concerns the Proposed Rule Making to amend 58 Pa. Code 5 6 133.5. The Commission is proposing to amend 133.5 to 7 reclassify porcupines as furbearers, and also permit 8 porcupines to be hunted with a hunting license or 9 hunted and trapped with a furtakers license. The text 10 of this amendment can be found on page 15 of your 11 agenda. PRESIDENT HOOVER: 12 Can we have a motion? 13 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: 14 So moved. 15 16 SECRETARY FOX: 17 Second? 18 COMMISSIONER SCHLEMMER: 19 Second. 20 SECRETARY FOX: All those in favor signify ---. 21 22 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: I'd like a discussion 23 SECRETARY FOX: 24 25 Discussion?

2	Any discussion on the amendment?
3	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM:
4	I'd like to have some discussion on
5	this issue. We had some commentary yesterday from the
6	Mammal Technical Committee regarding this issue.
7	There's some concern about reclassifying porcupines as
8	furbearers. I guess I would like to make it clear that
9	this regulation authorizes hunting and trapping of
10	porcupines, but at least in the coming year there will
11	be no trapping season. We have not specified the
12	season. And I know we're putting some burden on Dr.
13	Lavallo here, but the Commissioners have a very high
14	trust in Dr. Lavallo. I don't think we've ever argued
15	with a single recommendation he has made.
16	If, in the coming year, he doesn't feel
17	comfortable recommending a trapping season through the
18	system, a trapping season doesn't need to take place.
19	We're authorizing a trapping season. We're not
20	mandating a trapping season. The Commissioners are
21	not mandating a management level for porcupines.
22	We're providing tools out there to manage them, so
23	we're putting the burden on Dr. Lavallo's shoulder to
24	get us through this.
25	But it's an important point because

1 even though we're authorizing for trapping, there will 2 not be trapping in this current year because we're not 3 provided a season. Next year will be dependent upon the recommendation of the Bureau of Wildlife 4 Management. 5 6 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 7 Is there any other discussion? Mr. 8 Secretary, call the vote. 9 SECRETARY FOX: 10 A motion has been made and seconded. All those in favor signify by saying aye. 11 12 ALL RESPOND AYE 13 SECRETARY FOX: 14 Opposed? Motion carries. 15 ATTORNEY RAUP: The next item up for the Board's 16 17 consideration is from the Bureau of Wildlife 18 Protection. This proposal concerns the adopted rule making to amend 58 Pa. Code 141.4 for the 2016-'17 19 20 hunting hours. To effectively manage the wildlife 21 22 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission proposed at its February 2nd, 2016 meeting to amend 23 Section 141.4, Appendix G, to replace the current 24 25 hunting hours table and migratory bird hunting hours

21 1 table to accurately reflect the dates and hours of legal hunting for the '16-'17 hunting/trapping license 2 The text of this amendment can be found on 3 year. pages 16 through 19 of your agenda. 4 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 5 6 Motion to approve? 7 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: So moved. 8 SECRETARY FOX: 9 10 Second? 11 COMMISSIONER SCHLEMMER: Second. 12 SECRETARY FOX: 13 14 All those in favor signify by saying 15 aye? 5	where the language in 131.6 was found to be
6	restrictive to the point where district attorneys did
7	not feel comfortable allowing officers to prosecute
8	certain violations outside the Game and Wildlife Code,
9	even though those violations were detected during Game
10	Commission operations. So the addressing of this
11	language basically provides our officers the
12	opportunity to do those prosecutions other than Game
13	Law without necessarily having to turn that
14	prosecution over to another agency, which in most
15	cases don't want to deal with those violations that
16	we've discovered.

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1	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM:
2	I'd like to ask Randy we're talking
3	about electronic sights. What about the use of night
4	vision scopes? There was a recent case in the news
5	about a lady who shot a coyote who was in a contest
6	and the sight that she was using was determined to be
7	an illegal sight. How did that sight that she used
8	compare to what we're talking about there?
9	MR. SHOUP:
10	I think, if I recall that particular
11	case, I believe that that was a night vision scope
12	that was mounted on a crossbow, and this particular
13	language does not authorize the use of night vision
14	scopes. This strictly is a rangefinder scope, which
15	as far as the agency has always allowed the use of
16	handheld electronic rangefinders, even though they
17	were not added to the list of approved electronic
18	devices. The widespread use of those items, the
19	acceptance of those handheld electronics devices,
20	rangefinders, kind of led over into the scope ground
21	with the technology changes that exist regularly in
22	the hunting world. So in order to clarify the fact
23	that the agency accepts electronic rangefinders, both
24	handheld and scope mounted, that's the purpose of this
25	regulatory change.

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1	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM:
2	So we're not authorizing the electronic
3	night vision devices and we're not authorizing any
4	devices that project a beam like a red dot, like a
5	laser?
6	MR. SHOUP:
7	Correct. That is correct. Those will
8	continue to be prohibited.
9	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM:
10	Are there any others in those
11	categories other than night vision devices or red
12	laser sights that were not permitted? I know that we,
13	by the rule, prohibited everything that we don't
14	permit?
15	MR. SHOUP:
16	Correct. The general prohibition is
17	found in 131.6 on Electronic Devices. And in 141.18,
18	the section we're dealing with here, is the list of
19	approved devices. That list of approved devices
20	currently includes manually operated firearms that use
21	an electronic impulse to detonate the firing of the
22	power charge, electronic sound amplification devices
23	for hearing purposes, e-collars and radios, beeper
24	collars for dogs, for being able to recover and trap
25	your dog, and what is commonly referred to Lumenok or

a device that's on the end of a crossbow bolt or an 1 arrow that illuminates when the arrow is launched. 2 And also, as you can see here on page 3 23, the electronic crow decoy as used for harvesting 4 crows are allowable. And now we have handheld and 5 scope rangefinders. That's the inclusive list. 6 7 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Thank you. 8 9 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 10 Any other questions? Mr. Secretary, call the vote. 11 12 SECRETARY FOX: We have a motion and a second. 13 A]] those in favor signify by saying aye. 14 15 ALL RESPOND AYE 16 SECRETARY FOX: Opposed? Motion carries. 17 ATTORNEY RAUP: 18 The next item up for the Board's 19 20 consideration concerns the Adopted Rule Making to 21 amend 58 Pa. Code Section 141.41. To effectively 22 manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, 23 the Commission proposed at its February 2nd, 2016 24 meeting to amend 141.41 to prohibit the possession of 25 an expired, revoked, suspended or invalid hunting

As the Board is aware, the 17 Pennsylvania Game Commission submits its regulations 18 for approval to the Attorney General's Office pursuant to statutory law. And that review process uncovered 19 20 some concerns with the Attorney General's Office with 21 the extent of this language. 22 As you're aware, this language was 23 drafted from language that was already found and contained within Section 2323 of the Game Code. 24 25 However, based upon the Attorney General's concerns,

the Commission staff determined that this language 1 2 could be removed to satisfy their concern without affecting the underlying purpose of the proposal as it 3 was identified by the Board. So in order to alleviate 4 their concern and their tolling memo, we struck this 5 language in this floor amendment that is now subject 6 7 to your review under this floor amendment. As Commissioner Layton has identified, 8 the language being removed is the language bracketed 9 10 on floor amendment page 25, the green page in front of you, which removes "or while in the fields, forests or 11 12 on the waters or highways within or bordering the Commonwealth." That text will be removed from the 13 proposal on this final adoption. 14 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 15 Thank you. Any discussion? 16 17 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: Mr. President, I'd like to have a 18 little discussion. We received quite a few comments 19 on this subject and we have had some discussion here 20 yesterday and some testimony from people who came and 21 22 addressed this issue. There are two things. One is we have people are not only violating the law by 23 carrying extra tags and they're planning on killing 24 extra deer. Then we also have people like me that 25

sometimes forget that we actually have all of their
licenses for the last five years in their pocket,
someplace or other.

Our officers surely can use their 4 discretion and sort out people like me from people 5 that have a clear intent to violate the law, and we do 6 7 issue two warnings for every citation now. So this will probably and surely be the first year or two 8 increase some of our warnings. But there's an issue 9 10 here that goes with this -that is hunters carrying 11 tags for family members. If a kid is old enough to go shoot a deer, he should be old enough to carry his own 12 tag. And we are finding people out there and citing 13 people who are carrying other's tags they're out 14 15 hunting and they have a pocketful of tags that go beyond the tags that they're allowed to possess. 16 17 So this is an issue that we're going to address, and we're truly counting on officer 18 discretion to keep people like me out of jail and 19 really get the true violators, because this is an area 20 21 that forever has been an issue there's always been 22 violators who are carrying other people's tags, erasing their tags. When you pull their tag out, it's 23 all funny and erased all over it. 24 So we know it's a law enforcement issue, and that's why we're supporting 25

32 it. 1 2 PRESIDENT HOOVER: 3 Is there any other discussion on this amendment? 4 5 SECRETARY FOX: 6 We have a motion on the floor, made and 7 seconded. All of those in favor signify by saying 8 aye. ALL RESPOND AYE 9 10 SECRETARY FOX: Opposed? 11 12 ATTORNEY RAUP: The next item up for the Board's 13 14 consideration concerns Adopted Rule Making to amend 58 15 Pa. Code Section 143.50. To effectively manage the 16 wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the 17 Commission proposed at its February 2nd, 2016 meeting 18 to amend Section 143.50 to allow nonresidents to submit applications for antlerless deer licenses on 19 20 the third Monday in July one week after resident applications. The text of this amendment can be found 21 22 on page 27 of your agenda. 23 PRESIDENT HOOVER: Do we have a motion? 24 25 PRESIDENT LAYTON:

16	change. Originally, the proposal was to allow them to
17	apply at the same time as we allowed our residents to
18	apply for an antlerless tag. We received some
19	comments from our partners, and we came up with an
20	amendment to that proposal to allow them to begin on
21	week two. It seemed that our partners agreed with us.
22	It seemed to be something that makes sense as we look
23	at the sale of the antlerless tags, it's not going to
24	harm any of the residents of Pennsylvania. There
25	hasn't been correct me if I'm wrong, we didn't

have a unit sell out on week one of the antlerless 1 2 sale. 3 So we just think that this gives our out-of-state hunters who we believe the majority of 4 them are former Pennsylvania residents coming home to 5 6 hunt with their family anyway, just gives them the 7 opportunity to apply for a tag if they're going to be 8 here during the antlerless season. It puts them on a more fair playing field. 9 10 PRESIDENT HOOVER: Is there any other discussion? 11 Mr. 12 Secretary? 13 SECRETARY FOX: 14 We have a motion on the floor. It's 15 been moved and seconded. All those in favor signify 16 by saying aye. 17 ALL RESPOND AYE 18 SECRETARY FOX: Opposed? Motion carries. 19 20 ATTORNEY RAUP: The next item up for the Board's 21 22 consideration concerns the Proposed Rule Making to amend 58 Pa. Code Section 135.41. The Commission has 23 observed a dramatic, if not explosive, increase in the 24 popularity and use of unmanned aerial devices commonly 25

1	referred to as drones all across the Commonwealth
2	during the past year. This increase has unfortunately
3	resulted in unintended uses on lands designated as
4	State game lands that compromise the purposes for
5	which these lands were acquired. These activities
6	range from the degradation of the natural and scenic

8	disturbance and harassment activities.
9	The Commission is also concerned that
10	the use of these devices on State game lands may
11	expand to interference with lawful hunting and
12	trapping activities in the future. The Commission is
13	proposing to amend Section 135.41 to prohibit the
14	operation of drones on or over lands or waters
15	designated as State game lands. The text of this
16	amendment can be found on page 28 of your agenda.

3	who would have them for presentation today which will
4	make this meeting move a lot faster than it has in the
5	past. So we will deal with Antlerless Allocations at

24	one point, but the other commissioners to explain how
25	we got these numbers, where we got these numbers, why

1 we need to be at these numbers. And through those 2 discussions, we've come up with some minor adjustments 3 that we all can agree upon for once in this process. 4 So again, to the staff of Wildlife 5 Management to Director Laroche, to the members of the 6 Deer Committee, thank you for making this probably the 7 easiest process that we've gone through as far as 8 allocation.

PRESIDENT HOOVER:

9

10 I would also like to point out that as you look at the chart, there is a big difference in 5C 11 and 5D in the allocations requested. The recommended 12 13 allocations for 5C was 90,000. During today's meeting 14 we did move a large section of 5C into 5D, which allowed us to reduce the allocation as to where we 15 were last year at 70,000. We remained the same at 16 17 70,000 last year in 5C, but we increased the allocations in 5D to 30,000 which should eliminate a 18 lot of the issues that we ran into last year. 19

I do want to point out at this point that we recommend that anyone applying for allocations this year do so during the first week so that the complaints of I didn't get mine are eliminated this year. We did get those complaints last year because people in the past in 5C and 5D and I believe in 2B,

where there were allocations left throughout the 1 2 entire season, that didn't occur this year. The allocations were basically taken up in the first week 3 that they went over the counter and were gone. So in attempt to eliminate that, I'm asking everyone to make 5 6 sure that they deal with that upfront this year, you 7 know, get your applications in first and secure your allocations during the first week. 8 The yellow line to the right is the 9 10 allocations that we approved, that we are approving 11 today, and they pretty much mirror what was approved for the 2015-16 season as well, with the minor 12 changes. 13 So at that point, Mr. Secretary, 14 any other discussion? 15 16 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: 17 I always have something to say. Ι would support this process. I do have some 18 19 reservations. There are a few things I want to point 20 out. One is 3A. Representative Godshall was here yesterday and testified about the lack of deer in 3A, 21 22 which I personally don't agree with, but the staff has 23 recommended that we increase the deer population in 24 Unit 3A. And I know that we're criticized for only wanting to kill every deer, but this is a case where 25

1 we're recommending a reduction of 4,000 licenses in 3A 2 which is a relatively small unit on the northern 3 border.

In 2G, the recommended allocation here 4 is 1,000 less than what it was last year, and I think 5 about 4,000 less than what the staff recommended the 6 7 state population. That will result in a further increase in the deer population in 2G. And my 8 observations and our data support that the population 9 10 has grown substantially in 2G over the last four or 11 five years. This is going to be a further increase to the population. There is the point, and I've been 12 talking to our field staff out there, where we're 13 going to get overpopulated sometime in the future if 14 we allow the increases to continue, we're going to get 15 16 to a point where we're going to have to have a sharp 17 cutback.

So we've got to look at revising that 18 process. The deer program is up for review. 19 We're going to be working on revising that very soon. We'll 20 21 be getting input from all of our stakeholders as we 22 did last time, and one of the concerns is going to be starting this deer program at a time when the 23 population came down, the habitat recovered, we've 24 allowed the deer to recover, and we're still looking 25

1 for the magic number. And if we had the magic number, 2 it would be pretty easy for us to just go forward and say to our biologists just get the deer herds to the 3 magic number and we're all going to be happy. 4 We're working towards that, and I think --- I really feel we 5 made a lot of progress of getting there. 6 We're 7 looking at the habitat impact and we're not seeing many of them turn red. We have a couple units that if 8 we had the map up there, that are red, and the local 9 10 deer impacts are unacceptable. And I believe we're going to have others. The Commission has been working 11 with the staff to look at those if those areas have 12 turned red and let's move them toward green; we have 13 14 26 units at least. We don't need to study all 26 units. But we have about three or four that are 15 problem units. I think 3D is one of our problem units 16 17 where we really need to look at that and see why, with everything we've done there, we still have very low 18 deer numbers overall in that unit. 19

So anyhow, overall I feel very good for in that we made good progress. We allowed the herd to come back. We have to be very careful about not letting the herd come back too far where we get into too many deer where we go back to the cycles of the old days, so that's all I have to say.

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1	PRESIDENT HOOVER:
2	Thank you, Commissioner Putnam. Any
3	other comments?
4	COMMISSIONER DALEY:
5	Yeah. I'd like to say that, you know,
6	as much as I agree with Dave that you need that magic
7	number, there is no magic number. The magic number is
8	going to depend on the habitat of each one of the
9	WMUs. So the magic number in 2G is not going to be
10	the same as 1A or 1B. And if you look at those
11	particular units like 1A or 1B where we have antler
12	restrictions of four per side to get a buck, it is
13	because we've got really good food there. So right
14	now we're in the 34 deer per square mile range but
15	there's other parts of the state that they won't be
16	able to handle that. So when we go to look for this
17	magic number, the magic number is going to depend on
18	where you are.
19	PRESIDENT HOOVER:
20	Thank you. Any other discussion? Mr.
21	Secretary, would you call the vote?
22	SECRETARY FOX:
23	There's a motion on the floor. We have
24	a second. All those in favor signify by saying aye.
25	ALL RESPOND AYE

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1	SECRETARY FOX:
2	Oppose? Motion carries.
3	PRESIDENT HOOVER:
4	All right. We'll move onto Elk
5	Allocations. Mr. Secretary?
6	SECRETARY FOX:
7	Do we have a motion?
8	COMMISSIONER LAYTON:
9	Motion to accept.
10	COMMISSIONER PUTNAM:
11	Second.
12	PRESIDENT HOOVER:
13	Any discussion on the motion?
14	COMMISSIONER LAYTON:
15	Yes. Mr. President, do you have the
16	changes from last year to this? Can you go over those
17	before we vote because we have more allocations this
18	year.
19	MR. GREGG:
20	It's slightly more overall, that's
21	correct. I think rather than well, would you like
22	me to read down through each individual one just to
23	try to summarize a little bit?
24	PRESIDENT HOOVER:
25	Okay.

1	MR. GREGG:
2	Okay. All right. So the units that
3	changed in terms of bull tags, Hunt Zone 2 went from
4	two to three; 3, 4 are the same; Zone 5 goes from
5	three to four; 6 and 7 are the same; Zone 8 goes from
6	one to two; 9 is the same; 10 goes from two to three;
7	and 11, 12 and 13 are all the same. That's the bull
8	tag allocations.
9	For cow tags, Zone 2 goes from 19 to
10	22; Zone 3 actually decreases from six to four; 4 and
11	5 are the same; Zone 6 goes from five to six; Zone 7
12	is the same; Zone 8 goes from five to eight; Zone 9
13	goes from five to seven; Zone 10 goes down from 11 to
14	seven; and Zones 11 and 12 are the same; and Zone 13
15	goes from three to four. So when you add all those
16	up, the bull tags go from 21 in 2015 to 25 recommended
17	for 2016. And cow tags go from 95 approved in 2015 to
18	99 recommended in 2016. Grand total goes from 116
19	tags in 2015 to 124 in 2016.
20	PRESIDENT HOOVER:
21	Thank you. What I'd like to point out
22	is that we, the Commission, is serious about its elk
23	population. It is hopefully expanding. We're trying
24	to get the herd to expand and have it to go north and
25	that would be the best scenario for us. It is an

economic driver for the area and we will always keep 1 2. that in our mind when we're making decision on the elk population. Is there any other discussion? 3 COMMISSIONER PUTNAM: 4 Mr. President, I think this is a 5 success story. I'll point out that the staff in the 6 7 northcentral region is very serious about working with the population up there. We've had some issues with 8 elk causing damage in Dents Valley . We went in and 9 10 addressed it. It's a true success story and to follow 11 through, we had a problem. We went in. We addressed 12 it and we addressed numerous ways including harassment of the elk, trying to saw the antlers off the elk 13 which we thought would be a cure all, but that turned 14 out to be a cure-all for only a short time and the elk 15 came back. But the staff has really worked with the 16 17 people up there. And we see these numbers, and we only take a couple of minutes to go through them and 18 approve them, but there's a tremendous amount of work 19 that's gone into every one of those units, talking 20 about where they have issues, - an elk problem, trying 21 22 to balance the value of the elk with the type of damage they can cause. I know we look around the elk 23 visitor's center there, there's a very distinct browse 24 25 line which in wildlife is a no-no as you have your

1 population that high. We made some adjustments in 2 sizing that hunt zone around them to shrink that 3 somewhat to allow them more pressure on those animals 4 to try to keep that herd from getting too far out of 5 control.

We also have had expansion by the elk. 6 7 We had previous efforts when we tracked elk, moved them and they didn't stay where we put them. 8 Now, on their own, the elk have moved over to the Kettle Creek 9 10 Valley which there is a substantial population over I think it's about 40 animals that went 11 there now. 12 over there and we're expecting that's going to represent a major expansion out in that direction. 13 14 I know the people, directors included, when I met with people up in Lock Haven who are 15 concerned about economic development. Well, if they 16 can get that herd to Lock Haven if that herd will 17 expand in that area, it will be a significant tourist 18 attraction. And frankly, I think some of them thought 19 it was the maximum as far as the elk viewers that they 20 can tolerate. And we sure see a lot of businesses 21 22 that have sprung up in that area that are all based on elk. So I think we got quite a success story here. 23 The fact that these numbers are going up, the herd is 24 going up, are all good indicators. 25
