The motion is carried. 4 5 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: The next item this 6 morning concerns the Bureau of Wildlife Protection and 7 the adopted rulemaking concerning7 wildlife resources 8 in the Commonwealth. 9 The Game Commission proposed at its January 30th, 2018 meeting to amend Chapter 141 10 11 Appendix G (relating to hunting hours) to replace the 12 current hunting hours and migratory birds hunting hours table to accurately reflect the dates and hours 13 14 of legal hunting for the 2018 to 2019 15 Hunting/Trapping, License year. 16 The Commission also proposed to amend 17 Section 141.4 (relating to hunting hours) by deleting 18 the hunting hours closure of mourning dove season 19 prior to noon during the first mourning dove season. 20 The text is shown on pages 14 through 16 agenda. 21 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Do we have a motion 22 to accept? 23 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: I move. 24 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Second? 25 COMMISSIONER FOX: Second.

18	and rescind Sections 144.681 through 147.686 to
19	eliminate the baiting permit and reporting
20	requirements. The text is shown on pages 21 through
21	22 of your agenda.

21	The Commission also proposed to amend
22	Section 147.317. To exempt additional individuals
23	from the pheasant permit requirement, including
24	individuals from the pheasant permit requirement,
25	including individuals currently exempted from the

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licensure by statue and also individuals hunting and 1 2 taking privately acquired propagated pheasants on 3 private land. The text is shown on pages 24 through 25 of your agenda. 4 5 6 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Motion to accept? 7 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: So moved. COMMISSIONER KNICK: Presently we do 8 9 have a floor amendment I believe on this particular 10 page one through five. 11 PRESIDENT LAYTON: We'll get there as soon as we get - do we have a motion - do we have a 12 13 second? 14 COMMISSIONER MITRICK: Second. 15 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Discussion? 16 Now, we do have a floor amendment. So I already looked into to add number four. Lawful 17 18 hunting of pheasants by persons that previously 19 acquired a senior lifetime resident hunting license or 20 a senior lifetime resident combination hunting and fur taking license as defined under 2705 of the Act prior 21 22 to May 13th, 2017 when the subchapter first became 23 effective. 24 Do I have a second? 25 COMMISSIONER DALEY: Second.

20	ahead and kind of copy the language of the Legislation
21	that's coming down and just make it a regulation that
22	has moved.
23	Any other comments?
24	COMMISSIONER DALEY: I don't think
25	there was an awful lot of comments from Seniors that

previously held this license, that they didn't think 1 2 they should have had to pay for it. I think if we hadn't been able to 3 4 reduce the price of raising pheasants as much as we did, through our own efforts - I don't think we'd see 5 6 this. But even if we did, this change just makes 7 sense. PRESIDENT LAYTON: 8 Thank you. 9 So we have a motion and a second on 10 the floor. We need a vote to pass the amended rule. 11 COMMISSIONER KNICK: All in favor? 12 \_ \_ \_ 13 AYES RESPOND 14 \_ \_ \_ 15 COMMISSIONER KNICK: Opposed? 16 Motion carried. 17 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: The next item is 18 from the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat Management, it contains the adopted ruling to create the 58 PA Code 19 20 11 Section 135.183.12 relating to archery rangers, to authorized the manners of usage of archery ranges 21 22 established by the Commission. The text is shown on 23 pages 27 through 28 of your agenda. PRESIDENT LAYTON: Do I motion to 24 25 accept.

13	ATTORNEY BECHTEL: The next item
14	before Commission concerns the acquisitions of real
15	estate contract number L-3729, State Game Land Number
16	217 in Carbon County.
17	Wildlands Conservancy, INC. is
18	offering 428 more or less acres of land in East Penn
19	Township, Carbon County adjoining State Game Land
20	Number 217 to the west and National Park Service
21	property to the south as shown in Exhibit RED 1 on
22	page 30 of your agenda.
23	The option price is \$400 per acre to
24	be paid with funds from third-party commitments for
25	compensation of habitat and recreational losses which

occurred on State Game lands from previously approved 1 2 projects. 3 The property is located on the north 4 slope of Blue Mountain, is forested with oak, poplar, maple, and white pine along the ridge and transitioned 5 6 into a savannah-type field of green briar and fern 7 interspersed with trees at lower elevations. Acquiring this property will resolve 8 9 in long-standing boundary line dispute with the prior 10 owners. Access is from Blue Mountain Road on the west 11 and Sunset Road on the east. 12 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Do I have a motion 13 to amend? 14 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: I move. 15 PRESIDENT LAYTON: And a second? 16 COMMISSIONER MITRICK: Second. 17 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Any comments? 18 Steve, can you just talk about the third party commitment? 19 20 MR. SUSSENBACH: Sure, so the third 21 parties then commitments are basically for impacts 22 that we have taken on other Game Lands throughout 23 State. Generally from oil and gas activities. 24 So this is a great way to put some 25 acreage back in the hands of hunters and wildlife as

19 well. 1 2 I'm going to give my sincerest 3 gratitude to folks over at DCNR and Wildland's 4 Conservancy, because without them, we just wouldn't have been able to pull this deal off. 5 6 But it's certainly going to offset the 7 impacts that we've had. And we're putting it in a place in the southeast region within fairly easy 8 access to, you know, hundreds of hundreds of hunters 9 10 if not tens and thousands. 11 COMMISSIONER DALEY: It even looks like this connects with parts of 217 with the National 12 13 Park Services. 14 Can hunters go through there or does 15 the Park Service prohibit hunting on that strip of 16 land? 17 MR. SUSSENBACH: Generally, they 18 prohibit hunting on a corridor of the Appalachian 19 Trail. However on some of their additional land to 20 the sides of that they will allow hunting. But there is a restriction or prohibition on the Appalachian 21 2.2 Trail. 23 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Any other comments? 24 Mr. Secretary, call the vote. 25 COMMISSIONER KNICK: All in favor?

6	ATTORNEY BECHTEL: The next item
7	concerns a Non-Surface Use Oil and Gas Cooperative
8	Agreement. Tract 223A-18, State Game Land Number 223
9	in Greene County.
10	Greylock Production Company, LLC with
11	(Greylock) requested the Commission to offer its oil
12	and gas rights under a portion of State Game Land
13	Number 223 for non-surface use development. The
14	proposed tract, containing approximately 724 surface
15	acres of 537.61 oil and gas acres, is located in
16	Whiteley Township, Greene County as shown on Exhibit
17	OGM 1 on page 32 of your agenda.
18	Greylock has a strong privately owned
19	oil and gas lease position surrounding this portion of
20	State Game Land Number 223, has initiated
21	unconventional well drilling and development in the
22	vicinity of the proposed tract, and has the ability to
23	unitize and develop the Commission's oil and gas
24	reserves under the proposed tract by horizontal
25	drilling with no surface use or disturbance to the

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1 game land.

2 The OGM staff has negotiated the 3 proposed terms of the agreement with Greylock in an 4 effort to prudently develop the Commission's oil and gas reserves and simultaneously protect the wildlife 5 6 resources and recreational use of State Game Land 7 Number 223. The terms of the agreement are a 8 9 five-year paid up Non-Surface Use Oil and gas 10 agreement, a \$4,000 per net oil and gas acre bonus 11 payment and 18 percent royalty for all oil gas and other liquids or condensates produced and sold from 12 13 the proposed tract. 14 The bonus payment of approximately 15 \$2,150,440 may be deposited either into the Game Fund 16 or into an interest bearing escrow account to be used for the future purchase of wildlife habitat, lands or 17 18 other uses incidental to hunting, furtaking and 19 wildlife resource management. Future rental and 20 royalties owned the Commission shall be directly deposited into the Game Fund. 21 22 Oil and Gas development will be 23 regulated by the Commonwealth's Oil and Gas 24 Regulations and Commission's Standard Non-Surface Use 25 Oil and Gas Cooperative Agreement.

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1	PRESIDENT LAYTON: Do I have a motion
2	for this Act?
3	<u>COMMISSIONER HOOVER:</u> So moved.
4	PRESIDENT LAYTON: Second?
5	<u>COMMISSIONER MITRICK:</u> Second.
б	PRESIDENT LAYTON: Any comments?
7	Mr. Secretary?
8	<u>COMMISSIONER KNICK:</u> All in favor?
9	
10	AYES RESPOND
11	
12	COMMISSIONER KNICK: Opposed?
13	Motion carries.
14	PRESIDENT LAYTON: All right.
15	At this time we will move on to the
16	Deer Allocations for the 2018 - 2019 Hunting Season.
17	We are going to do this by Wildlife Management Unit,
18	and each Commissioner that is assigned to that
19	Wildlife Management Unit will offer up his suggestions
20	for Allocations.
21	In the areas that do not have
22	Commissioners currently seated, we'll just take turns.
23	They've been assigned to Commissioners.
24	Commissioner Daley, if you'd start
25	with 1A, please?

23 COMMISSIONER DALEY: Sure. So if we 1 2 look at the report that was put together for us and 3 you go through that report, you'll see all the various measures of forest health, deer health, and fawn to 4 doe ratios 5 6 And then as Commissioners, we look at 7 that as well as social impacts that we are aware of in our areas. So if you look at this year, the 8 biologists would suggest 48,000 down from 52,000 we 9 10 allocated last year. Looking at the numbers, I would agree with that 48,000. 11 12 PRESIDENT LAYTON: So 48,000 for 1A? 13 Okay. 14 Commissioner Daley 1B? 15 COMMISSIONER DALEY: All right. 16 Similarly, the harvests have been up 17 there since 2009. The population's been up since 2010 18 forest health is now declining. So we're looking to try to hold the population stable. Our biologists have 19 20 suggested 37,000. I agree with that number. PRESIDENT LAYTON: 21 2A - 2A is in the 22 southwest region of Pennsylvania. Last year we had an allocation of 50,000. We did have an outbreak of EHD 23 24 in that area. So I'm going to recommend that we set 25 next year's allocation to 49,000.

24 2B, again, an area that's vacant. 1 2 Last year's allocation was at 60,000. The 3 recommendation this year is 58,000, which is a 4 reduction of 2,000. And we're going to go with a recommendation of 58,000. 5 6 2C, which happens to be in my 7 District. Last year, the allocation was 31,000. The recommended allocation for this year is 44,000. 8 Again, there's issues in 2C. Part of that area is in 9 10 the disease management area number 2. 11 We have some issues in the northern 12 part of the county with getting samples for CWD. So 13 I'm going to go with the recommended allocation of 44,000. 14 15 2D, also an area in the southwest 16 where we've done some significant reductions through 17 the years on allocations. We see that the numbers are 18 starting to grow - deer numbers are growing. We've had some - actually we had some complaints from 19 20 farmers in the area about deer numbers. 21 Last year's approved allocation was 22 55,000, the recommendation this year is for 63,000. 23 And I would suggest we approve the recommendation of 24 63,000. 25 2E, again, in my District. Last year

we were 22,000, the recommendation for this year is 1 2 23,000. There are no issues with deer numbers in 2E, 3 would like to go with the recommendation of 23,000. 4 Commissioner Daley, 2F, if you would, please? 5 6 COMMISSIONER DALEY: 2F's kind of an 7 oddball to look at. It's got some very effective hunters it takes 3.3 licenses to tag a deer there. 8 We've had some increase in the population to the and 9 10 the fawn to doe ratio is starting to drop. I think given all the factors if you look at 2F, we stay with 11 the recommended 23,000. 12 13 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Commissioner Daley, 14 will you take 2G as well, please? 15 So in 2G, the COMMISSIONER DALEY: 16 population's certainly increased there. We're getting 17 a lot of - certainly from farmers, we're getting a lot 18 of input, they're seeing a lot of crop damage. Last year we allocated 25,500. The recommended by our 19 20 biologist is 39,000, which is a drastic increase. We've decided to cut that drastic 21 22 increase. I'm thinking 30,000 should be a good number 23 there. 24 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Okay. 25 Commissioner Daley, 2H.

26 COMMISSIONER DALEY: it has always 1 2 fluctuated between always a question there between 6 3 and 7,000 tags. Looking at it, I think that it can 4 hold some more deer than it has. So we're going to go with a 6,000 number this year which is down from last 5 6 year. 7 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Okay. Commissioner Knick, 3A? 8 9 COMMISSIONER KNICK: 3A, last year we 10 had 20,000, this year we're going with 22,000 for the 11 recommendation. 12 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Okay. Commission Knick, 3B? 13 14 COMMISSIONER KNICK: 3B, last year we 15 had 30,000. This year recommended was 29,000 we are 16 going to go with 29,000 for the recommendation. 17 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Commissioner Fox 18 3C? 19 COMMISSIONER FOX: We received a 20 significant amount of crop damage in 3C. We're going to go with that recommendation of 38,000. 21 22 PRESIDENT LAYTON: And Commissioner 23 Fox, 3D? - I'm sorry, Commissioner Knick? Oh, 24 COMMISSIONER KNICK: Last year we had 25 25,000 in 3D it's stable. The recommendation of

25,000 this year we will stay with the 25,000 as 1 2 recommended. 4A in the heart of 3 PRESIDENT LAYTON: 4 the CWD area, we have held steady at 30,000 allocations over the past several years but that's 5 6 been supplemented by DMA permits. 7 And now that we've eliminated DMA permits in just doing township issues, the 8 recommendation this year is for 38,000. And I agree 9 with that number, I'll recommend that we go with that 10 11 38,000. Commissioner Mitrick? 12 13 COMMISSIONER MITRICK: 4B, the 14 recommendation is 26,000, last year was also 26,000 15 and we'll leave it at that. A portion of that is also within Disease Management Area 2, so we certainly 16 17 don't want to decrease that allocation. 18 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Commissioner Hoover 19 4C? 20 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: We had an allocation of 29,000 approved by the Board last year. 21 22 The recommendation this year is the 35,000. I have seen an increase in deer, so maybe there's some 23 24 possibilities there I'm going to raise it to 30,000 25 this year.

28 PRESIDENT LAYTON: 4D, Mr. Mitrick? 1 2 COMMISSIONER MITRICK: That's not me. 3 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Who's 4D? 4 I'll take 4D. So 4D, there's really 5 no change, the recommendation last year - the allocation last year was 34,000. The recommendation 6 7 for this year is 34,000, we'll just keep it the same. 4E, Commissioner Fox, is that you? 8 9 COMMISSIONER FOX: Yes. 10 PRESIDENT LAYTON: It's mostly you. 11 COMMISSIONER FOX: Mostly me, mostly me. Yeah, there's an increasing population with a 12 13 32,000 recommendation which stays at 32,000. PRESIDENT LAYTON: 14 5A? 15 COMMISSIONER MITRICK: We're going to go with the recommendation of 22,000. Last year was 16 17 22,000. You also have 5B? 18 PRESIDENT LAYTON: 19 COMMISSIONER MITRICK: Correct. 20 Last year's recommendation was 57,000 this year's is 58,000. We're going to go with the 21 22 recommendation of 58,000. 23 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Commissioner Hoover 24 5C? 25 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: We've pretty

well - since we've changed the unit around we've left 1 2 it at 70,000, we're going to go ahead and leave it at 3 70,000 again this year. 4 PRESIDENT LAYTON: And Commissioner 5 Hoover, 5D? 6 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: We've seen some 7 reduction in the number of deer in 5D as a whole, we're going to reduce it by 2,000 we'll have 28,000. 8 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Gentleman, we have 9 a motion to accept the allocations for the 2018-2019 10 11 hunting season? 12 COMMISSIONER DALEY: So moved. PRESIDENT LAYTON: Second? 13 14 COMMISSIONER FOX: Second. 15 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Any comments? 16 All those in favor - I'm sorry. Mr. 17 Secretary? 18 COMMISSIONER KNICK: All in favor? 19 \_ \_ \_ 20 AYES RESPOND 21 \_ \_ \_ 22 COMMISSIONER KNICK: Opposed? 23 Motion carries. 24 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Now, we move onto 25 the Elk Allocations. Matthew, you might want to step

up because we're going to ask questions. Not hard 1 2 ones but questions. 3 Okay. 4 So this is a hard one, talk about the new - if you would, the new hunt zone and the changes 5 6 that were made there. Were you able to do that? 7 MR. SCHNUPP: Probably not as efficiently as somebody else. 8 9 Dave, do you want to talk about that? 10 Let me get somebody up here that's better at answering 11 that. 12 MR. MITCHELL: Elk hunt zone 14, which 13 is the new hunt zone. The Elk herd is expanding to 14 the north and east. That would be the herd that's up 15 around Kettle Creek State Park. 16 Actually I have the numbers back in my 17 folder. But I think our minimum count we counted 81 18 Elk that are residing right now in Elk Zone 14. So it has a good population and it's increasing. 19 20 And I believe that the numbers that 21 were put in there, it will be able to sustain hunting 22 pressure and still allow that herd to grow. 23 The changes we made around Elk hunt 2.4 Zone 7 were - there were some boundaries that used 25 really small roads to get to game lands there. They

31 were essentially like two track roads. 1 2 It was very easy to walk across them 3 without seeing them. So we went to the more established township roads just to make those 4 boundaries a little bit clearer. 5 6 And what we were going to do is, one 7 of the reasons that it was the way it was because some of the viewing areas at Winslow Hill and also at the 8 Woodring Farm. But we're going to post those viewing 9 10 areas closee to Elk Hunting. 11 So we don't have to worry about any conflicts with hunters and Elk viewers. But it's 12 13 going to make the actual boundaries of the Management 14 Hunting Guidelines much clearer so we don't have 15 people accidentally shooting Elk. 16 PRESIDENT LAYTON: All right. 17 So let me go down through these 18 numbers if I can. I'll go by hunt zone and then we'll 19 do totals at the end. 20 So hunt zone 2, the recommendation is 2 antlered, 25 antlerless for a total of 27. 21 22 Hunt zone 3, 2 antlered, 5 antlerless, 23 total of 7. Hunt zone 4, 2 antlered, 5 antlerless, total of 6. Hunt zone 5, 3 antlered, 3 antlerless for 24 25 a total of 6.

Hunt zone 6, 2 antlered, 7 antlerless, 1 total of 9. Hunt zone 7, antlered zero, antlerless 2 3 zero for a total of zero. Hunt zone 8, 2 antlered, 7 antlerless, 4 total of 9. Hunt zone 9, 2 antlered, 7 antlerless, 5 total of 9. 6 7 Hunt zone 10, 2 antlered, 11 antlerless for a total of 13. Hunt zone 11, 2 8 antlered, 2 antlerless, total of 4. 9 10 Hunt zone 12, 3 antlered, 17 antlerless for a total of 20. Hunt zone 13, 2 11 antlered, 6 antlerless, total of 8. 12 Hunt zone 14, 2 antlered, 4 13 antlerless, for a total of 6. The total number of 14 15 antlered is 26, the total number of antlerless is 99 16 for total of 125 Elk. 17 Do I have a motion to accept? 18 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: Just for clarification on Elk zone 12, you stated 3 antlered 19 20 and it specifically says 2 recommendations. 21 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Twelve (12)? 22 That's not what I have. 23 Doctor Rosenberry, can you clarify zone 12 for us, please? 24 25 DOCTOR ROSENBERRY: Three, 17 and 20.

33 Three, 17, and 20. 1 PRESIDENT LAYTON: 2 COMMISSIONER DALEY: Table 2 is wrong. 3 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Okay. 4 Do we have a motion to accept the 5 allocations? 6 COMMISSIONER DALEY: I have a 7 question, but I don't know if it would be for you or someone else. Elk Zone 5, or Hunt Zone 5, in 2016 we 8 had 24 tags in the zone, in 2017 we dropped it to 10 9 10 an din 2018 we want to drop it to 6? Is there 11 something wrong in that zone? It just seems like a 12 huge change. We have about a quarter of what we had two years ago. 13 14 DR. ROSENBERRY: That was the end of 15 two years ago that we - there was a lot of complaints 16 17 COMMISSIONER DALEY: Is that like Weedville? 18 19 That's the Weedville DR. ROSENBERRY: 20 area, yes. So we had a lot of tags in there, there was some success. We had an extended season because 21 22 hunters weren't able to use the tags. Last year, then 23 it was cut down a little bit further. 24 And we're not seeing as many Elk in 25 that zone. There's still Elk there, but the numbers

and the complaints aren't there, so that's why it was 1 2 cut this year. 3 COMMISSIONER DALEY: Okay. 4 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Okay. 5 So now we need a motion to set the allocations? 6 7 COMMISSIONER DALEY: So moved. 8 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Second? COMMISSIONER FOX: Second. 9 10 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Any other discussion? 11 12 Mr. Secretary, call the vote. COMMISSIONER KNICK: All in favor? 13 14 \_ \_ \_ 15 AYES RESPOND 16 \_ \_ \_ 17 COMMISSIONER KNICK: Opposed? Motion is carried. 18 19 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Thank you. 20 So now we have two resolutions that need to be read and accepted in. 21 22 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: Thank you, Mr. 23 President. 24 The first resolution, I'll read the 25 tax resolution of the Board of Commissioners.

35 Whereas, the Commonwealth has 1 2 experienced consistent declines in hunting 3 participation by both resident and non-resident 4 hunters over the past several decades, with both the number of licenses sold and revenues generated 5 experiencing steady declines; and whereas, youth 6 7 participation is vital to maintaining the longstanding tradition of hunting in the Commonwealth. 8 And whereas, Sunday hunting can be an 9 10 effective means of recruiting new hunters and 11 retaining current hunters by increasing the value of the hunting license through offering additional 12 13 opportunities to spend time in the field. And whereas, the Commission recognizes 14 15 that it can effectively double the number of hunting 16 days for youths during the school year by offering 17 Sunday hunting. 18 And whereas, many residents of this Commonwealth seek hunting opportunities and hunting 19 20 leases in neighboring states that offer Sunday 21 hunting. 22 And whereas, the Commission recognizes 23 that Sunday hunting will help keep Pennsylvania 24 hunters in Pennsylvania. And whereas, the 25 Commonwealth has a longstanding tradition of hunting

1 camps and clubs.

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2	And whereas, Sunday hunting can
3	effectively double the number of hunting days for camp
4	owners and club members. And whereas, Sunday hunting
5	has the potential to generate a substantial increase
6	in non-resident license sales and the accompanying
7	revenue for the Pennsylvania Game Commission.
8	And whereas, hunting license sales and
9	their associated federal matching funds are the
10	primary revenue source for the Pennsylvania Game
11	Commission in carrying out its mission, including
12	maintaining 1.5 million acres of State Game Lands and
13	acquisition of additional public lands, research and
14	management of wildlife and providing information and
15	education to the public.
16	And whereas, Sunday hunting has the
17	potential to provide substantial economic benefits to
18	rural areas and businesses by increasing money spent
19	by hunters on lodging, food, gas, and other incidental
20	items.
21	And whereas, Sunday hunting could
22	effectively generate \$629 million in additional
23	spending and create 5,300 new jobs, resulting in \$18
24	million in additional sales and income tax.
25	And whereas, the mission of the

37 Pennsylvania Game Commission is to manage wildlife and 1 2 its habitat for future and current generations - or I 3 should say for current and future generations. 4 And whereas, Sunday hunting which is currently permitted to control a growing population of 5 6 coyotes, will provide the biologists of the 7 Pennsylvania Game Commission new tools to manage wildlife populations. 8 And whereas, the 47 states that 9 10 currently permit Sunday hunting, have not experienced 11 any discernable impact on the health or vibrancy of 12 game populations. And whereas, the Board of 13 14 Commissioners recognizes that the authority to permit 15 Sunday hunting lies entirely with the General Assembly of Pennsylvania. And whereas, if the General Assembly 16 17 repeals the restrictions on Sunday hunting, thus 18 giving the authority to regulate Sunday hunting to the Board of Commissioners, the Board recognizes the many 19 20 stakeholder groups that any actions on Sunday hunting will affect and will endeavor to engage these 21 22 stakeholders before passing any new regulations in 23 regard to Sunday hunting. Now, therefore, be it resolved, that 24 25 the Board of Commissioners of Pennsylvania Game

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1	Commission does hereby urge the General Assembly of
2	Pennsylvania to repeal the prohibition on Sunday
3	hunting in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

20	ATTORNEY BECHTEL: The Commissioners
21	have a second resolution, I'll read that entirely
22	also. The resolution of the Board of Commissioners,
23	whereas, The Pennsylvania Game Commission has received
24	numerous solicitations from various industrial wind
25	energy developers interested in erecting wind turbines

on State Game Lands over the past few years. 1 2 And whereas, the Commission recognizes 3 the significant value of exploring alternative 4 energy resources and renewable energy initiatives within this Commonwealth. 5 And whereas, the Commission has 6 7 determined that the protection of wildlife habitat values and their associated recreational use of State 8 Game Lands are one of the Commission's highest 9 10 priorities. 11 And whereas, the Commission has further determined that evaluation and approval of 12 13 wind energy projects on State Game Lands must be 14 completed in strict accordance with the mandates of 15 the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. Section 101 et 16 seq., the Code to ensure the protection and 17 conservation of the Commonwealth's wildlife resources 18 and promotion of recreational opportunities on State 19 Game Lands. 20 And whereas, Article I, Section 27 of 21 the Pennsylvania Constitution, Pa. Constitution 22 Article 1, Section 27, mandates that the public natural resources of the Commonwealth, including State 23 24 Game Lands and their associated flora and fauna, are 25 the common property of all the people, including

generations yet to come; and whereas, The 1 2 Commonwealth, including the Board of Game 3 Commissioners, as trustee of the public natural 4 resources, is charged with conserving and maintaining those resources for the benefit of all the people. 5 6 And whereas, the Commission drafted 7 quidance in 2005 to aid in its evaluation of proposed wind energy development on State Game Lands; and 8 whereas 19 State Game Lands have been targeted by 9 10 industrial wind energy developers since 2005, some 11 multiple times. 12 And whereas, to date, all of the wind 13 energy proposals submitted to the Commission were 14 determined to have a high probability of adversely 15 impacting wildlife resources and the recreational uses 16 associated with State Game Lands and were therefore 17 not approved. 18 And whereas, the Commission has recognized the need to provide a clear policy 19 20 concerning the potential for future wind energy development on State Game Lands; and whereas, the 21 22 Commission has generally determined that the high probability of adverse impacts to wildlife resources 23 24 and recreational uses caused by wind energy 25 development on State Game Lands is incompatible with

its mandates under the Code to protect, propagate, 1 manage and preserve the game and wildlife of the 2 3 Commonwealth and promote recreational opportunities on 4 State Game Lands. Now therefore, be it resolved, that 5 6 the Board of Commissioners of the Pennsylvania Game 7 Commission does hereby declare as policy that wind energy development on State Game Lands to be 8 inconsistent with the responsibilities of the 9 10 Pennsylvania Game Commission under both the Game and 11 Wildlife Code and Article I, Section 27 of the Pennsylvania Constitution. 12 Given under the hand and seal of the 13 Board of Commissioners of the Pennsylvania Game 14 15 Commission on this 24th day of April, 2018. 16 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Do we have a motion 17 to accept the resolution? 18 COMMISSIONER HOOVER: So moved. 19 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Second? 20 COMMISSIONER FOX: I second. 21 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Any comments? 22 COMMISSIONER DALEY: I do. We 23 discussed this at length, if you recall. 24 I think, you know, if you were a wind 25 energy developer, and you had an outstanding piece of

42 habitat that you wanted to exchange for some game 1 2 land, that would be the mechanism, we're prohibiting 3 it by this resolution. That's fair. 4 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Thank you. Any 5 other comments? 6 Mr. Secretary? 7 COMMISSIONER KNICK: All in favor? 8 \_ \_ \_ 9 AYES RESPOND 10 \_ \_ \_ 11 COMMISSIONER KNICK: Opposed? 12 Motion carried. 13 PRESIDENT LAYTON: Is there any other new business? 14 15 Our next working group meeting will be 16 held June 4th, 2018. The Next Commission meeting will be July 30<sup>th</sup> and 31st, of 2018. Immediately following 17 18 this will be a press conference in the cafeteria executive session if it is needed.
