- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: I'd like to call to order
- 2 the April business meeting for the Pennsylvania Game
- 3 Commission. I'd like to welcome all of you here this
- 4 morning and I'd ask you to join us in the Pledge of
- 5 Allegiance to the flag.
- 6 (Pledge of Allegiance said.)
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: I'd like to make a couple
- 8 brief remarks before we start. For those of you who
- 9 have been here in the past you know and for those of
- 10 you who are joining us possibly for the first time,
- 11 we're going to be following the preprinted agenda,
- 12 which is the green booklet. There are additional
- 13 copies up here if you don't have one and want to come
- 14 and get one before we get started. Please feel free
- 15 to do so.
- 16 The other thing that I would ask is that if
- 17 you do have a cell phone please turn it off. It is
- 18 very distracting to other people participating in the
- 19 meeting if your cell phone goes off and we have to
- 20 listen to your music or whatever you have programmed.
- 21 At this time I'll call on Secretary Isabella
- 22 to read the roll.
- MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Boop.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Present.
- 25 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Palone.

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1 MRS. PALONE: Present.
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- 2 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Isabella.
- 3 Present.
- 4 Commissioner Schleiden.
- 5 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Present.
- 6 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Hill.
- 7 MR. HILL: Here.
- 8 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Schreffler.
- 9 MR. SCHREFFLER: Present.
- 10 MR. ISABELLA: All present and accounted
- 11 for, Mr. President.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- We have available to all the Commissioners
- 14 for some time now the meetings of our January 23,
- 15 2007 meeting. Is there a motion to approve those
- 16 minutes?
- 17 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 19 Is there a second?
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: Second.
- 21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- 22 All in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 23 (Signified aye.)
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 25 (No response.)

- 1 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: At this point I'd like to
- 3 call on Executive Director Roe to make some brief
- 4 remarks concerning a subject of which I think you'll
- 5 have some interest.
- 6 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROE: I usually, as you
- 7 know, make my comments, I did make comments here for
- 8 the afternoon, but I felt it was important for me to
- 9 get this on the record. That is this is the last
- 10 meeting for one of our members of the team here at
- 11 the Pennsylvania Game Commission and that's Barry
- 12 Warner our Director of the Northeast Region.
- Barry has given us 35 years plus other
- 14 military service, probably total of pretty close to
- 15 40 years of public service. He's done a great job.
- 16 He's been a director of a region for almost 15 years
- 17 or more I guess. Hasn't it been, Barry, I guess? I
- 18 just want to publicly say thank you to Barry. It's
- 19 going to be a great loss to the region for sure and
- 20 to the Game Commission.
- I know of nobody else in the Pennsylvania
- 22 Game Commission who puts his heart and soul into the
- 23 work that Barry does. I just want to publicly say
- 24 and for the record, thank you very much, Barry, and
- 25 we surely will miss you.

- 1 (Applause.)
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Barry, and I
- 3 think we as Commissioners all echo Executive Director
- 4 Roe's thoughts. Knowing you, I'm sure you don't want
- 5 to make a speech, so we'll defer that.
- If we could move now to our business for the
- 7 morning, we'll go first to the Bureau of Wildlife
- 8 Management, and I think we have Bureau Director, Mr.
- 9 DuBrock, present, and we'll turn to page 2 of the
- 10 agenda.
- 11 I'll call on Mr. Pouss to read the action
- 12 item that's before us.
- MR. POUSS: Thank you, Mr. President.
- 14 The first item relates to Congress having
- 15 appropriated funds under the State Wildlife Grants
- 16 Program directly and exclusively to state wildlife
- 17 agencies for "wildlife species of greatest
- 18 conservation concern."
- 19 Pennsylvania is eligible to receive these
- 20 funds for fish and wildlife projects under the SWG
- 21 program. We are recommending approval of two
- 22 projects listed in Exhibit A.
- 23 Projects listed in Exhibit A will not
- 24 require any net reduction in the Game Fund since both
- 25 are cooperator projects. The Game Commission will

- 1 simply function as a conduit for these federal funds.
- 2 If approved, the Game Commission will contract with
- 3 the organizations and investigators of these
- 4 projects, and pay SWG-eligible costs from the Game
- 5 Fund. The Game Fund will be reimbursed by the U.S.
- 6 Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Aid program using
- 7 SWG funds. The Game Commission will receive up to 3
- 8 percent of all SWG funds to administer the program.
- 9 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 10 approval of the two State Wildlife Grant projects
- 11 listed in Exhibit A, which is on page 3 of your
- 12 agenda, and relates to "Migration Telemetry for the
- 13 Eastern Red Bat" and "Northern Goshawk Status and
- 14 Response to Forest Management."
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- 16 These are \$27,000 and \$10,000 grants.
- Mr. DuBrock, do you want to offer additional
- 18 comments?
- MR. DUBROCK: I have no comments,
- 20 Commissioner, but I'll certainly entertain questions
- 21 if any members of the Board have any.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Questions by Commissioners?
- 23 (No response.)
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Seeing none, is there a
- 25 motion to approve?

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1 MR. SCHREFFLER: So moved.
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- PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.
- 4 MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 6 Is there any further discussion?
- 7 (No response.)
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all in favor
- 9 indicate by saying aye.
- 10 (Signified aye.)
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 12 (No response.)
- 13 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- Moving to page 4, Mr. Pouss. We're now to
- 16 the Bureau of Wildlife Protection and the Chair would
- 17 recognize Director Palmer.
- 18 MR. POUSS: The next item relates to
- 19 adoption of proposed amendment to §131.6 of Title 58
- 20 of the Pennsylvania Code.
- 21 To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 22 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 23 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 24 change:
- 25 Amend §131.6 (relating to administration of

- 1 police powers by wildlife conservation officers) to
- 2 redirect the extent and manner in which the
- 3 Commission authorizes salaried wildlife conservation
- 4 officers to engage in the administration of police
- 5 powers.
- 6 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 7 final adoption of this amendment to Title 58 of the
- 8 Pennsylvania Code, as shown on Exhibit A, which
- 9 starts on page 5 of your agenda.
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- 11 Do the Commissioners have any questions of
- 12 Mr. Palmer?
- MR. PALMER: I believe, Mr. President, there
- 14 is a floor amendment to make?
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, thank you. We do have
- 16 a floor amendment, which the Commissioners received
- 17 and I believe we all have in our packets.
- Do you want to explain the floor amendment,
- 19 Director Palmer?
- MR. PALMER: Yes. In $\S 131.6(a)(1)$ the last
- 21 sentence as added clarifying language that says,
- 22 "and, in addition, to serve and execute warrants and
- 23 subpoenas for these offenses." This clarification
- 24 essentially makes §131.6 mirror the statute in
- 25 901(a)(17) so that they're concurrent.

- 1 The only other changes to the page are under
- 2 Section (b)(1) "Procedures". There was five words
- 3 added in the last sentence there that states, "only
- 4 to the degree to protect life and property" and the
- 5 underlined language is "in any one or more of the
- 6 following circumstances."
- 7 Again, that's just clarifying language to
- 8 show that the following four sections are
- 9 interdependent, that they are not all have to be
- 10 there at the same time.
- 11 Under (b)(1)(ii) we have an amendment that
- 12 says if "The offense occurs on lands or waters owned,
- 13 leased or otherwise controlled by the Commission."
- 14 That amendment is meant to clarify the fact that the
- 15 Commission owns several properties, such as,
- 16 administrative buildings, such as the Harrisburg
- 17 Headquarters that may not meet the technical
- 18 classification of State Game Lands and we want to
- 19 ensure that it's clear the officers have these
- 20 authorities on those leased properties or
- 21 administrative buildings as well.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Director Palmer.
- Now, if we could go back to the original
- 24 item as it appears, is there a motion for the
- 25 original action item?

- 1 MRS. PALONE: So moved.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- 4 MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- The item is now on the table having been
- 7 properly moved and seconded.
- 8 Is there any discussion on the original
- 9 motion and, if not, then we move to the matter of the
- 10 amendment?
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there a motion to amend
- 13 as presented?
- MRS. PALONE: So moved.
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- Is there a second to the motion to amend?
- MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 19 All those in favor of the amendment, unless
- 20 there's discussion, indicate by saying aye.
- 21 (Signified aye.)
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: The action item has been
- 23 properly amended.
- That was unanimous vote, Mr. Secretary?
- 25 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: The original motion as now
- 2 amended is what we're voting on.
- 3 All those in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 4 (Signified aye.)
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Any opposed?
- 6 (No response.)
- 7 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to the third action
- 9 item which appears on page 6, Mr. Pouss.
- MR. POUSS: Mr. President, that item
- 11 involves the adoption of proposed amendments to
- 12 §§141.63 and 141.66 of Title 58 of the Pennsylvania
- 13 Code.
- 14
- To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 16 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 17 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 18 changes:
- 19 Amend §141.63 (relating to definitions) to
- 20 improve the definition of "cable restraint" by
- 21 permitting the use of 1x19 cable, extending the cable
- 22 length limit to seven feet, more clearly defining
- 23 "relaxing-type lock" and finally, increasing the
- 24 weight rating of the breakaway device to 375 pounds.
- 25 Also, amend §141.66 (relating to cable

- 1 restraints) to permit individuals meeting certain
- 2 statutory license exemptions to participate in cable
- 3 restraint training courses.
- 4 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 5 final adoption of these amendments to Title 58 of
- 6 Pennsylvania Code, as shown on Exhibit B, which is
- 7 page 7 of your agenda.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, you've heard
- 9 the reading of the item that is before us. The Chair
- 10 would just note that Dr. Lovallo is present in the
- 11 audience and he has provided input to the Board,
- 12 along with others, on this issue.
- 13 Is there a motion?
- MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 16 Is there a second?
- 17 MRS. PALONE: Second.
- 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- I note that the item has been properly moved
- 20 and seconded.
- 21 Is there discussion on the item?
- (No response.)
- 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those in
- 24 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 25 (Signified aye.)

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 2 (No response.)
- 3 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- We could then move to page 8 for the fourth
- 6 action item this morning.
- 7 MR. POUSS: And that relates to adoption of
- 8 proposed amendments to §141.4 of Pennsylvania Code,
- 9 Title 58.
- 10 To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 11 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 12 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 13 change:
- 14 Amend §141.4 (relating to hunting hours) to
- 15 expand legal hunting hours to include the half-hour
- 16 period after sunset for certain species and also
- 17 replace the table of hunting hours with a
- 18 sunrise/sunset table for the 2007-2008 license year.
- 19 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 20 final adoption of this amendment to 58 Pa. Code, as
- 21 shown on Exhibit C, which is page 9 of your agenda.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, you've heard
- 23 the reading of the item.
- Is there a motion?
- MR. ISABELLA: Motion.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- Is there a second?
- 3 MRS. PALONE: Second.
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- 5 Is there discussion on the item?
- 6 MR. SCHREFFLER: Mr. President.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair would recognize
- 8 Commissioner Schreffler.
- 9 MR. SCHREFFLER: My fellow Commissioners,
- 10 although I would like to have more hunting time, I
- 11 urge you not to vote for this motion, and I have some
- 12 reasons for that, which I'd like to express.
- 13 Safety must be our paramount concern and
- 14 this change will substantially increase safety habits
- 15 in my opinion.
- 16 Wounded animals is another concern as it is
- 17 near impossible to track and retrieve wounded or dead
- 18 animals when it is dark. And I've had this
- 19 experience, even with artificial light. In early
- 20 seasons, it would be too warm to wait until first
- 21 light to find these animals.
- I would like to quote from Volume 3, No. 24,
- 23 of Applied Optics, a professional magazine. There's
- 24 an article called "Can Normal Outdoor Activities be
- 25 Carried Out During Civil Twilight," and this was done

- 1 by Dr. Leibowitz and Owens, Professors at Penn State
- 2 University and Franklin and Marshall College, in
- 3 Lancaster.
- 4 And one of the things that it says in there
- 5 is that "At sunset ambient illumination is 30-foot-
- 6 candle. A medium gray object has a 20 percent
- 7 reflectance and have luminance of only six foot-
- 8 lambert, which is 10.76 times foot-candle.
- 9 "Most visual functions depend upon contrast
- 10 sensitivity and are near maximum values at this time.
- 11 Any further reduction and luminance would be expected
- 12 to be gray performance. During the half-hour after
- 13 sunset, which is civil twilight, a small reduction of
- 14 luminance will be gray in acuity, contrast
- 15 sensitivity, accommodation and reaction time as well
- 16 as other aspects of visual recognition.
- 17 "Performance will be impaired more readily
- 18 for darker objects." And I refer to game, which is
- 19 a darker object. Going over the quotes, "In
- 20 addition, absence of shadows during civil twilight
- 21 eliminate an important source of information for
- 22 object recognition and localization."
- 23 This actually refers to a study, two other
- 24 studies done by J. J. Gibson and G. Locklear.
- 25 "Reductions in luminance selectively degrade visual

- 1 recognition and visual guidance functions. Fourfold
- 2 increase in traffic accidents at night during this
- 3 period of time on a mileage basis, a test to the
- 4 special hazard under low luminance level." That's
- 5 the end of the quotes from there.
- 6 There's a second article in Psychology Today
- 7 also where it mentioned that "Selective impairment of
- 8 recognition vision at night to also produce a
- 9 dangerous discrepancy between self-confidence and
- 10 ability." And I end that quote from that article.
- 11 There are some other quotes, other facts
- 12 that I'd like to quote. One is that "The eyes of a
- 13 67-year-old will transmit 67 percent less light than
- 14 the eyes of a 20-year-old." I think this is
- 15 pertinent in the fact that many of our hunters are
- 16 getting up into that age bracket.
- I want to mention to you that there are at
- 18 least 14 other supportive and related studies by
- 19 scientists for this thing. This, I believe, is
- 20 another case. From yesterday, we heard that
- 21 sometimes popular opinion is not supported by
- 22 scientific data. I think this is another case where
- 23 we think we can see well at that time of day. We can
- 24 count the number of antlers on the buck. We know
- 25 what's happening, where it's going.

- 1 Referring back to the Psychology Today
- 2 article, I think our self-confidence exudes our
- 3 ability in that situation. So, therefore, I hope
- 4 that you will take this under consideration in your
- 5 vote.
- 6 Thank you.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner
- 8 Schreffler.
- 9 Are there other Commissioners who want to
- 10 comment on the matter?
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: I also have some safety
- 13 concerns with respect to the issue, which I'm not
- 14 going to address any further, because I think Mr.
- 15 Schreffler has covered those. I also do have some
- 16 concern about the ability to recover animals at this
- 17 time of the day.
- I think I'm also, the additional concerns
- 19 that haven't been mentioned, we're putting a lot of
- 20 hunting pressure on many of our game animals already.
- 21 Half-an-hour extension of time throughout the season
- 22 is a significant amount of additional hunting
- 23 opportunity.
- I know there's quite a bit of concern about
- 25 the, at least in some quarters, about the pressure

- 1 that we're putting on our mature breeding bucks
- 2 during the rut, which are hunted during that period.
- 3 I just think for a lot of reasons that this is not a
- 4 decision that we should make.
- 5 Anyone else want to comment?
- 6 (No response.)
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all in favor
- 8 indicate by saying aye.
- 9 (Signified aye.)
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 11 (Commissioners Schreffler and Boop oppose.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Four-two. Ayes for it, nays
- 13 two.
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: So the matter passes on a
- 15 four to two vote.
- Moving to the next item, the fifth item for
- 17 the today, which begins on page 11.
- MR. POUSS: That item, Mr. President,
- 19 relates to adoption of proposed amendments to
- 20 §§141.41, 141.43 and 141.47 of Title 58 of the
- 21 Pennsylvania Code.
- 22 To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 23 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 24 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 25 changes:

- 1 Amend §§141.41, 141.43 and 141.47 (relating
- 2 to general, deer, elk) to permit the lawful use of
- 3 .50 caliber or larger muzzleloading handguns while
- 4 hunting deer, bear and elk. Also amend §141.43 to
- 5 permit the lawful use of aperture or peep sights
- 6 during the flintlock muzzleloading season.
- 7 Additionally, amend the lawful use and
- 8 possession of both a bow and arrow or crossbow and a
- 9 muzzleloading firearm during the overlaps of the
- 10 early archery and muzzleloader seasons and the late
- 11 archery and flintlock muzzleloading seasons.
- 12 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 13 final adoption of these amendments to Title 58 of the
- 14 Pennsylvania Code, as shown on Exhibit D, which is on
- 15 pages 12 and 13, of your agenda.
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, you've heard
- 17 the reading of the item that is before us. Is there
- 18 a motion to approve?
- MRS. PALONE: So moved.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- Is there a second?
- MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 24 Is there discussion on the action item?
- 25 MR. SCHREFFLER: Mr. President.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair would recognize
- 2 Commissioner Schreffler.
- 3 MR. SCHREFFLER: I would like to offer an
- 4 amendment to this motion to remove all reference to
- 5 muzzleloading handguns in this proposal.
- 6 In reviewing Gun Digest Blackpowder Loading
- 7 Manual, the third edition, I find the key to killing
- 8 power in this phase is, in the blackpowder firearms
- 9 is in a high mass projectile. Even .50 caliber and
- 10 larger appear to be marginal, especially in the light
- 11 of many other variables. Some of these being hunting
- 12 ability, but also the powder propellant types and
- 13 load, the bullet designs and the way it performs.
- 14 It's mentioned in there that there's
- 15 marginal in range and in stocking powder. A quote
- 16 from this book is "The blackpowder revolver is not
- 17 truly a big game proposition. Fifties and up require
- 18 a good shot to where careful hunter to be big game
- 19 worthy."
- The only one that I saw out of there that
- 21 says the Thompson Scout .50 caliber had to use its
- 22 maximum load, about a hundred FFG's grain load to be
- 23 effective as a big game gun, as to be rated as an
- 24 effective big game handgun.
- 25 So I would like you, everyone to consider

- 1 this amendment. I'm making the amendment.
- 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner
- 3 Schreffler.
- 4 We've heard Commissioner Schreffler's motion
- 5 to amend. Is there a second to the motion to amend?
- 6 (No response.)
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, the motion
- 8 fails.
- 9 That takes us back to the original motion.
- 10 Is there further discussion on the original motion?
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, I assume
- 13 we're prepared to vote on the original action item as
- 14 stated.
- 15 All those in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 16 (Signified aye.)
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 18 (Commissioner Schreffler opposes.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Ayes, five. Nays, one.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 21 Moving now to page 14 of the agenda I
- 22 believe our fifth action item for the morning and I'd
- 23 call on Mr. Pouss for the reading.
- 24 MR. POUSS: This item relates to adoption of
- 25 proposed amendment to §141.20.

- 1 To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 2 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 3 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 4 change:
- 5 Amend §141.20 (relating to protective
- 6 material required) to permit the posting of 100
- 7 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored
- 8 material within 15 feet of any blind meeting the
- 9 requirements set forth in Section 2308(b)(3) of the
- 10 Game and Wildlife Code in lieu of wearing the
- 11 required 250 square inches of daylight fluorescent
- 12 orange-colored material on the heard, chest and back
- 13 combined.
- 14 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 15 final adoption of this amendment to Title 58 of the
- 16 Pennsylvania Code, as shown on Exhibit E, which is on
- 17 page 15, of the agenda.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- 19 Commissioners, you've heard the reading.
- 20 The item does appear on page 15. Is there a motion?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: So moved.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.
- Is there a second?
- MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

- 1 Is there discussion on the action item?
- 2 (No response.)
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we'll vote.
- 4 All those in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 5 (Signified aye.)
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 7 (No response.)
- 8 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- Now moving to page 16, Mr. Pouss.
- 11 MR. POUSS: The item on page 16 involves the
- 12 adoption of proposed amendment to §147.674 of Title
- 13 58 of the Pennsylvania Code.
- To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 15 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 16 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 17 change:
- 18 Amend §147.674 (relating to issuance of DMAP
- 19 harvest permits) to increase DMAP harvest permit fees
- 20 from \$6.00 to \$10.00 for residents and \$26.00 to
- 21 \$35.00 for nonresidents.
- 22 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 23 final adoption of this amendment to Title 58 of the
- 24 Pennsylvania Code, as shown on Exhibit F, which is on
- 25 page 17 of your agenda.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, you've heard
- 2 the reading. The item is before us. Is there a
- 3 motion?
- 4 MR. SCHREFFLER: So moved.
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there a second?
- 7 MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 9 Is there discussion on the action item?
- 10 (No response.)
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those in
- 12 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 13 (Signified aye.)
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 15 (No response.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- Now moving to page 18, can we have a
- 19 reading, Mr. Pouss?
- MR. POUSS: Yes.
- 21 The item on page 18 relates to adoption of
- 22 proposed amendment to §137.2 of Title 58, of the
- 23 Pennsylvania Code.
- 24 To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 25 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its

- 1 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 2 change:
- 3 Amend §137.2 (relating to release of
- 4 animals) to prohibit the release of any members of
- 5 the suidae family into the wild.
- 6 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 7 final adoption of this amendment to 58 Pa. Code, as
- 8 shown on Exhibit G, which is on page 19, of your
- 9 agenda.
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Director Palmer, I believe
- 11 that there is a proposed clerical change to the
- 12 action item?
- MR. PALMER: Yes, Mr. President.
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: And that's as a floor
- 15 amendment to page 19. Before we take up the matter,
- 16 could you just explain that, please?
- 17 MR. PALMER: Yes. What we wanted to do,
- 18 Director DuBrock brought it to our attention that the
- 19 more appropriate terminology and taxonomy would be
- 20 similar in the commentary. The original had porcine
- 21 family. Director DuBrock brought it to my attention
- 22 the most appropriate would be suidae family, as
- 23 matches the commentary, and that would be the floor
- 24 amendment.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: It's simply a clerical and

- 1 not a substantive amendment?
- MR. PALMER: That's correct, Mr. President.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, the original
- 4 item as read by Mr. Pouss is before us.
- 5 Is there a motion?
- 6 MR. ISABELLA: So moved.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 8 Would you second that, Commissioner Palone?
- 9 MRS. PALONE: Yes.
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: You were both together.
- 11 So it's properly moved and seconded, so the
- 12 item is on the floor. Is there discussion and/or a
- 13 motion to amend?
- 14 MRS. PALONE: I'd like to move.
- MR. ISABELLA: Yes.
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. I
- 17 recognize Commissioner Palone first. You're both
- 18 together again.
- 19 MRS. PALONE: Did you have something
- 20 special?
- MR. ISABELLA: Yes.
- 22 MRS. PALONE: I wanted to make a motion off
- 23 of the amendment. We want to discuss it.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Do you want to discuss it
- 25 before it's amended, Commissioner Palone?

- 1 MR. ISABELLA: We can wait until it gets
- 2 amended.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Let's have your amendment,
- 4 Commissioner Palone.
- 5 So we have a motion to amend in the form
- 6 presented by Director Palmer.
- 7 Is there a second to the motion to amend?
- 8 MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 10 So the motion is now on the floor as
- 11 amended. Do we have discussion?
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President?
- 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: While I see that it's more
- 15 clerical as the information is given, I see the
- 16 change being greater than that, because it avoids
- 17 some misleading wording to the public and to our
- 18 farming community because if you have the word
- 19 domestic or feral hogs in there. While I've always
- 20 supported controlling that problem, I was concerned.
- 21 Some of you may recall at the last meeting about the
- 22 word domestic hogs in there.
- 23 Seeing that change as it is, to me it means
- 24 more than just a clerical change. It's misleading,
- 25 understanding that it gives our people the necessary

- 1 tool, although I think, like once again, PDA is
- 2 really the driving factor and should be, but they
- 3 have no means in which to enforce this on public
- 4 lands.
- 5 So I will not be abstaining and I will be in
- 6 favor of this vote.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Your point is well taken,
- 8 Commissioner Schleiden. I think we all did have some
- 9 concern about the domestic hogs.
- 10 Is there any other discussion?
- 11 Yes, Mr. Schreffler?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: I would just like to
- 13 encourage the other Commissioners to support this. I
- 14 live where these hogs are running wild through the
- 15 habitat and I can see the damage they're doing. I
- 16 want to emphasize the seriousness of this and the
- 17 danger to our game habitat. It's just really
- 18 disconcerting to me, so I encourage the other
- 19 Commissioners to vote for this as amended.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there any other
- 21 discussion?
- 22 Commissioner Isabella.
- MR. ISABELLA: I was just very, very
- 24 concerned that we are going to be enforcing private
- 25 property, private landowners and that's why I raised

- 1 the initial concern with you and I voted against it
- 2 at the last meeting. I understand the intent of this
- 3 and we do have a major problem that could be getting
- 4 much larger than we know in our game lands. I just
- 5 hope that the spirit of enforcement is going to be
- 6 not focused on the private landowner.
- 7 I intend to support it, also.
- 8 That's it, Mr. President.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Do other Commissioners want
- 10 to comment on the item before us?
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, the action item as
- 13 amended is now before us.
- I don't believe we voted on the amendment.
- 15 We were discussing the amendment. So the first vote
- 16 would be on the amendment. All Commissioners in
- 17 favor of the amendment indicate by saying aye.
- 18 (Signified aye.)
- 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Then on the original item
- 23 as now properly amended, all in favor indicate by
- 24 saying aye.
- 25 (Signified aye.)

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 2 (No response.)
- 3 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 5 We now move to the last item for final
- 6 adoption of the original set, which begins on page
- 7 20.
- 8 Mr. Pouss, if you would read the item?
- 9 MR. POUSS: Mr. President, that items
- 10 relates to the adoption of proposed amendment to
- 11 §139.4 of 58 of the Pennsylvania Code.
- To effectively manage the wildlife resources
- 13 of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its
- 14 January 23, 2007 meeting, proposed the following
- 15 change:
- Amend §139.4 (relating to seasons and bag
- 17 limits for the license year) to provide updated
- 18 seasons and bag limits for the 2007-2008 hunting
- 19 license year.
- 20 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 21 final adoption of this amendment to 58 Pa. Code, as
- 22 shown on Exhibit H, which starts on page 21 and goes
- 23 to page 28 of your agenda.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading by
- 25 Mr. Pouss. What I would like to propose as the Chair

- 1 as we do this, as we've done in the past, we'll have
- 2 a motion and a second and then we'll take each page
- 3 to the extent that we can, and then there would be
- 4 any amendments offered on a page by page basis.
- 5 We'll consider all of the amendments collectively
- 6 when we're finished and then we'll vote on the
- 7 original motion.
- 8 Is that acceptable as we've done in the
- 9 past? Indicating we're not voting, but I indicate
- 10 there appears to be a concurrence in that.
- 11 So if we could start, do we have a motion to
- 12 adopt the season and bag limits item?
- MRS. PALONE: Motion.
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- Will you second, Commissioner Isabella?
- MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: You two are confusing me
- 18 here this morning, because you're both together.
- 19 So it's properly moved and seconded. We
- 20 turn first to page 21. I guess the reality is that
- 21 page 21 continues onto page 22. Twenty-one at the
- 22 bottom we're having pheasants and it goes over to the
- 23 second page pheasants continuing. Can we do 21 and
- 24 22 together? Are there any amendments to be offered
- 25 with respect to pages 21 and 22?

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we'll move to
- 3 page 23, which generally covers turkeys and then goes
- 4 down to migratory game birds.
- 5 Do we have any amendments with respect to
- 6 page 23?
- 7 (No response.)
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: None are indicated.
- 9 We go to page 24. If we could go down to
- 10 the end of falconry and then consider deer as part of
- 11 the next several pages?
- 12 Are there any amendments down to the end of
- 13 falconry on page 24?
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Seeing none, we would move
- 16 then to consider the bottom of 24 and page 25, which
- 17 are generally all the seasons and bag limits with
- 18 respect to deer. Of course, I would note that we'll
- 19 be discussing allocations later in the meeting and
- 20 we're not really discussing allocations at this
- 21 point. We're just discussing the seasons and bag
- 22 limits.
- With respect to page 24 and 25, are there
- 24 any amendments?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: Mr. President.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, the Chair would
- 2 recognize Commissioner Schreffler.
- MR. SCHREFFLER: I'd like to amend the
- 4 regular statewide antler/anterless season, commonly
- 5 known as the rifle season, as it applies to Wildlife
- 6 Management Units 2C, 2G, 3C and 4E. I would like it
- 7 to read, "Deer antlered in Wildlife Management Units
- 8 2C, 2G, 3C and 4E to be from November 26 to December
- 9 1" and "Deer antlered and anterless in Wildlife
- 10 Management Units 2C, 2G, 3C and 4E to be from
- 11 December 3 to December 8."
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard Commissioner
- 13 Schreffler's amendment. Is there a second to his
- 14 amendment?
- I will second the amendment.
- So the amendment has been made and properly
- 17 seconded. Is there discussion on the amendment,
- 18 which as I understand it would have a one week buck
- 19 and a second week of buck and then a week of
- 20 concurrent in Management Units 2C, 2G, 3C and 4E.
- 21 Have I properly stated that, Commissioner
- 22 Schreffler?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: That's right. The second
- 24 week would be concurrent. The first week antlered
- 25 only and it would be 2C, 2G, 3C and 4E.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there discussion on the
- 2 amendment? Any discussion by anyone?
- 3 (No response.)
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: On the item I just would
- 5 like to note that I think that the amendment has
- 6 merit for several reasons. Number one, the primary
- 7 concern that we hear from most people who have
- 8 expressed reservations about our current deer
- 9 management program is that they're not seeing deer
- 10 when they're out hunting, particularly with their
- 11 children and grandchildren.
- I think we have the ability, as was
- 13 indicated yesterday by the deer team, through
- 14 allocations to control the harvest. I think this
- 15 would be beneficial in that it would allow in some
- 16 Management Units, if we would take a look, of giving
- 17 people an opportunity to see the deer that are out
- 18 there for that week period when they're out hunting
- 19 for antlered deer.
- I know when I started taking my children
- 21 hunting in the nineties, many times that first day
- 22 and the second day you'd see the same doe or the same
- 23 group of doe. Sometimes all the children would see
- 24 the same animals during the course of the day two or
- 25 three times.

- 1 The deer is dead the last day of the season.
- 2 It's just dead as if it were shot at 7:30 the first
- 3 morning of the rifle season. So I think that it
- 4 would give an opportunity for more people to enjoy
- 5 the resource. I think since our only real way of
- 6 controlling the herd is through the allocations, if
- 7 we ever do get to the point where we start to allow
- 8 the herd to expand, we're going to have a problem
- 9 with our allocations, unless we can shorten the
- 10 seasons.
- 11 So I think this would give us a good
- 12 opportunity, just for the 22 Management Units, to try
- 13 this. I certainly think that we've achieved our
- 14 goals of herd reduction in many parts of the state,
- 15 so I would encourage other Commissioners to support
- 16 the amendment.
- 17 Other discussion?
- 18 MR. SCHREFFLER: I'll just make one comment.
- 19 I've carefully reviewed the many prescriptions for
- 20 the Wildlife Management Units and I believe that
- 21 these particular units deserve a particular
- 22 prescription in what they and the management of deer
- 23 there for numerous reasons.
- 24 But I think that it only serves to
- 25 demonstrate that we are looking at each Wildlife

- 1 Management Unit individually, looking at it
- 2 carefully. If we see things like the deer herd
- 3 health would be good and the habitat health is good
- 4 and the deer-human conflict might be low, such as
- 5 found in 4E, that we should seriously consider other
- 6 prescriptions in the management of deer in those
- 7 particular units.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: If there's no other
- 9 discussion -- I'm sorry, Commissioner Schleiden.
- 10 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Of course, I read my
- 11 comments in January, and I've listened to both you
- 12 gentlemen and I appreciate your comments.
- But, Dave, you just said something in 2G
- 14 deer health is fair, habitat is poor due to conflict.
- 15 I don't see where doing this is treating. Gentlemen,
- 16 we're not going to hunt these doe the first week
- 17 because the people had the chance to see them.
- 18 But I think that most dedicated hunters and
- 19 people who take their children out are usually
- 20 spotlighting well before the season. So they see
- 21 those deer. They know those deer there. Just so
- 22 happens that they probably weren't in the right place
- 23 at the right time when they got harvested, so they
- 24 didn't see none of them run.
- 25 Unless you forget, we still have the October

- 1 hunt, which is for antlerless. It's also for
- 2 muzzleloader the first couple of days and rifle the
- 3 last three days for what I believe seems moot.
- 4 So the opportunity is there. We do see
- 5 them. We do make the deer smarter in October. I see
- 6 no merit at this point in time, at this point in
- 7 time, which leaves the door open down the road in the
- 8 amendment.
- 9 Those are my remarks.
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Are there other comments or
- 11 remarks by Commissioners before we vote?
- MRS. PALONE: Mr. President.
- 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner Palone.
- MRS. PALONE: First of all, I don't agree
- 15 with Commissioner Schleiden that I'm not sure why he
- 16 picked these particular units to do this, but I'm
- 17 afraid if we just change some of it that extra people
- 18 will come to harvest buck during that first week. We
- 19 might get back to the same dilemma that we used to
- 20 have, in that we harvest too many buck and not enough
- 21 does.
- 22 As far as opportunities for children, my
- 23 husband and I take our three nephews hunting with us.
- 24 In the past, when the seasons were separated, they
- 25 had the first day off of buck season to hunt. If

- 1 they did not get a deer, then they didn't have any
- 2 other opportunities. Now with the concurrent season,
- 3 they can harvest either a buck or a doe, plus have
- 4 some extra Saturdays.
- 5 So I feel that the concurrent season is very
- 6 good for taking the children hunting.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Other comments or remarks?
- 8 (No response.)
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: We're voting now on the
- 10 amendment which would in effect Management Units 2C,
- 11 2G, 3C and 4E.
- 12 All in favor of the amendment as presented
- 13 indicate by saying aye.
- 14 (Commissioners Schreffler & Boop signified
- 15 aye.)
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 17 (Commissioners Isabella, Palone, Schleiden
- 18 and Hill signified nay.)
- 19 MR. ISABELLA: Four/two, Mr. President.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Four/two?
- MR. ISABELLA: Ayes four, nays two.
- 22 MR. SCHREFFLER: You got it backwards. You
- 23 got the vote backwards.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: We're voting on the
- 25 amendment. Two to four or four--

- 1 MR. ISABELLA: Two to four.
- 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: So the amendment as
- 3 presented by Commissioner Schreffler fails.
- 4 Are there other amendments with respect to
- 5 the matter before us, which we're looking at season
- 6 and bag limits for deer?
- 7 I would offer a second amendment, as I did
- 8 in January, and that has to do with the October
- 9 season, which is the muzzleloader and the rifle
- 10 season for antlerless deer in October. Just very
- 11 briefly I would reiterate the remarks I made in
- 12 January.
- 13 These were temporary seasons designed to
- 14 reduce the deer herd. They were never intended to
- 15 become permanent seasons as I've read the literature
- 16 and the minutes from the various meetings. With the
- 17 deer herd at the levels that they're at in many parts
- 18 of the state, it's belief that these seasons are not
- 19 necessary to achieve our harvest objectives. We got
- 20 plenty of allocation numbers in the two-week season
- 21 later, so my amendment is to eliminate the October
- 22 muzzleloader and the rifle season, which is a total
- 23 of a week in October.
- Is there a second to the amendment?
- 25 (No response.)

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, the amendment
- 2 fails.
- I was also going to make another amendment
- 4 to eliminate the first week of the concurrent season,
- 5 but being a realist and seeing what happened to
- 6 Commissioner Schreffler's amendment, I'm not going to
- 7 do that at this time.
- 8 So we'll move to page 26 and if we could,
- 9 again, I realize we're not doing complete pages, but
- 10 if we could do bear and elk together, and then we'll
- 11 take up furtaking after we do bear and elk.
- 12 So we're looking at bear and elk, the
- 13 proposed season and bag limits on page 26. Are there
- 14 any amendments with respect to the proposed seasons
- 15 for bear and elk?
- 16 (No response.)
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, if we could
- 18 then take up furtaking and trapping, which starts on
- 19 the bottom of page 26 and runs through page 28?
- 20 The Chair would recognize Bureau Director
- 21 DuBrock, who is now at the podium. Again, the way
- 22 we've done this before with Director Palmer, I
- 23 believe that we do have an amendment. Again, maybe
- 24 my choice of term's not the best, but I believe again
- 25 is just merely a correction rather than a substantive

- 1 change?
- MR. DUBROCK: That's correct, Mr. President.
- 3 Under "Furtaking Trapping" for the season,
- 4 and this is referring to page 27, for coyotes, foxes,
- 5 opossums, raccoons, skunks and weasels (statewide),
- 6 the dates should be October 21, rather than the
- 7 twenty-second, and a like change for bobcat in the
- 8 Management Units specified. Again, that's under
- 9 trapping, October 21.
- 10 Under "Furtaking Hunting" on page 28, for
- 11 raccoons and foxes (statewide), October 20. For
- 12 bobcat in the Management Units specified, October 20.
- 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Director
- 14 DuBrock.
- If we could then, again, we have our
- 16 original motion back at the beginning so I believe
- 17 the proper procedural issue at this point, is there
- 18 an amendment to furtaking and trapping to reflect the
- 19 amendment to change the date correction as indicated
- 20 by Director DuBrock?
- 21 MRS. PALONE: So moved.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- Is there a second?
- MR. ISABELLA: Second.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

- If there's any discussion, let me know, if
- 2 not all in favor signify aye.
- 3 (Signified aye.)
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 5 (No response.)
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Unanimous, Mr. Secretary?
- 7 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: It is amended as indicated.
- 9 That I believe, ladies and gentlemen, takes
- 10 us to the end of season and bag limits, so if we
- 11 could just go back and refer briefly. We have one
- 12 amendment that passed, which was simply under
- 13 furtaking and trapping for a date correction. I
- 14 believe that's the only amendment with respect to
- 15 this action item that passed.
- 16 That takes us back to the original motion,
- 17 which was made and properly seconded. Before we
- 18 vote, is there any general discussion with respect to
- 19 season and bag limits?
- 20 Of course, for the audience, please remember
- 21 this does not include the allocations, which are
- 22 going to be handled later.
- 23 (No response.)
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: No discussion indicated.
- 25 We're going to vote on the overall package for season

- 1 and bag limits.
- 2 All those in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 3 (Signified aye.)
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 5 (Commissioners Schreffler and Boop oppose.)
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Four to two.
- 7 For the record, Commissioner Schreffler and
- 8 I voted no.
- 9 Ladies and gentlemen, that concludes the
- 10 final rule making adoptions for today, I believe.
- 11 With respect to the agenda we have some proposed rule
- 12 making.
- 13 Again, the Chair appreciates the help of
- 14 Director DuBrock, who's just been at the podium.
- 15 Director Palmer is now back from wildlife protection.
- We have three items of proposed rule making
- 17 beginning on page 29. Again, this is proposed rule
- 18 making. We'll go to the first item there.
- 19 MR. POUSS: Thank you, Mr. President.
- The first item involves an amendment to
- 21 Title 58 of the Pennsylvania Code, §147.553.
- 22 Agricultural deer control permits (red tag)
- 23 are generally valid from February 1 through September
- 24 28, each year. However, during the peak fawning
- 25 season, agricultural deer control permits are

- 1 invalidated for a brief period of time. The permits
- 2 have traditionally been invalidated from May 16 to
- 3 July 31, for general crop farming and from May 16 to
- 4 June 30, for vegetable farming.
- 5 Upon further review of the closure dates,
- 6 the Commission has determined that making the shorter
- 7 closure period applicable to general crop farmers
- 8 would provide additional deer control opportunities
- 9 without putting an unjustified demand on deer during
- 10 fawning season.
- 11 You can see the text of the changes on page
- 12 29.
- 13 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 14 the Commission approve this change.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading,
- 16 Commissioners.
- 17 Is there a motion on this item?
- MR. ISABELLA: So moved.
- 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- Is there a second?
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: Second.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- Is there discussion on the item?
- I just under discussion would like to
- 25 comment briefly on this proposed item. Under our red

- 1 tag program, as I understand, this would allow those
- 2 participating in the program, whether they're
- 3 vegetable farmers or general crop farmers, to shoot
- 4 antlerless deer on July 1, where crop farmers in the
- 5 past could not shoot them until August 1.
- 6 Having grown up on a farm, and having
- 7 operated a farm and currently operating a farm, it's
- 8 been my experience that some fawns are certainly
- 9 dropped later than this, but many fawns are on the
- 10 ground the second week of June. The third week of
- 11 June, the mothers leave the babies for a period of
- 12 time when they're out feeding. Having had some
- 13 experience with the red tag farm at my area, even in
- 14 August with twin fawns running around without a
- 15 mother the second week in August, is a bit of a
- 16 public relations problem.
- I just think that this is a public relations
- 18 dilemma that we don't need. Certainly, the farmer
- 19 has the ability year-round except for a limited
- 20 period from May 16 to August 1. This is a
- 21 significant change, because in my opinion and I
- 22 believe that I'm correct on this, there are many more
- 23 crop farmers across Pennsylvania than there are
- 24 vegetable farmers.
- I really question even if it makes sense

- 1 biologically whether this is a policy decision we
- 2 want to make. The incident from Lancaster County
- 3 just recently demonstrated a policy issue,
- 4 significance of some of the things we do here at the
- 5 agency.
- 6 So I'm sympathetic as a farmer to crop
- 7 damage losses, but I, for one, really don't want to
- 8 see those fawns running around in July, when someone
- 9 shot their mother a day or two before. So I'm just
- 10 going to oppose it for that reason.
- 11 Any other discussion?
- 12 (No response.)
- PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all in favor of the
- 14 proposed rule making indicate by saying aye.
- 15 (Signified aye.)
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed.
- 17 (Commissioners Boop and Schreffler oppose.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Ayes four, nays two, Mr.
- 19 President.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 21 Moving to the next proposed rule making, the
- 22 second of these items, which begins on page 30.
- 23 MR. POUSS: That items relates to a proposed
- 24 amendment to Title 58, §141.15.
- 25 Section 2503 of the act (relating to loaded

- 1 firearms in vehicles) generally prohibits any person,
- 2 not otherwise authorized, from having a loaded
- 3 firearm of any kind in, on or against any conveyance
- 4 propelled by mechanical power. This prohibition is
- 5 intended primarily to protect the safety of persons
- 6 traveling in such conveyances as well as others who
- 7 may be in the vicinity of the same.
- 8 Similar to the hazards associated with
- 9 having more traditional firearms loaded in a vehicle,
- 10 loaded crossbows or muzzleloaders also have the
- 11 potential of causing serious injury or death to
- 12 persons in a vehicle as well as others who may be in
- 13 the vicinity of the same if an intended or unintended
- 14 discharge occurs.
- 15 The Commission has determined that it is
- 16 necessary to limit the various and potential harms
- 17 associated with this type of conduct. Therefore, the
- 18 Commission is proposing to amend §141.15 in the
- 19 manner set forth below in an effort to extend the
- 20 application of Section 2503 to prohibit "loaded"
- 21 crossbows or muzzleloaders in, on or against any
- 22 conveyance propelled by mechanical power.
- 23 You then can see the text of the proposed
- 24 changes.
- 25 The Executive Director and staff recommend

- 1 the Commission approve these changes.
- 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading by
- 3 Mr. Pouss. The matter is before us.
- 4 Is there a motion?
- 5 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 7 Is there a second?
- 8 MR. SCHREFFLER: Second.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.
- 10 Is there discussion on the item?
- 11 (No response.)
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those in
- 13 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 14 (Signified aye.)
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 16 (No response.)
- 17 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- Mr. Pouss, moving to page 31, the last item
- 20 of proposed rule making.
- 21 MR. POUSS: Yes, Mr. President, that relates
- 22 to an amendment of §141.18 of Title 58 of the
- 23 Pennsylvania Code.
- 24 Each year the Commission is asked to review
- 25 the potential permissive use of certain devices for

- 1 hunting or trapping purposes that are otherwise
- 2 prohibited by statute or regulation. As part of the
- 3 review process, the Commission generally considers to
- 4 what degree the use of a given device might
- 5 negatively impact principles of resource
- 6 conservation, equal opportunity, fair chase or public
- 7 safety.
- 8 Two devices have recently been presented to
- 9 the Commission for consideration: muzzleloading
- 10 firearms using an electronic impulse to trigger
- 11 discharge; and illuminated nocks for arrows and
- 12 bolts. After thoughtful review of these
- 13 aforementioned devices, the Commission has determined
- 14 the use of these devices for hunting purposes would
- 15 be acceptable due to their negligible impacts to the
- 16 abovementioned principles.
- 17 You can then see the text of the proposed
- 18 changes.
- 19 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 20 the Commission approve these changes.
- 21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- 22 Commissioners, you've heard the reading. Is
- 23 there a motion?
- MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

- 1 Is there a second?
- 2 MR. HILL: I'll second it.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Hill.
- 4 Is there discussion on the action item?
- 5 (No response.)
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all in favor
- 7 indicate by saying aye.
- 8 (Signified aye.)
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 10 (No response.)
- 11 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 13 That completes the second of the agenda
- 14 dealing with proposed rule making.
- We would now move to page 32, where before
- 16 us we have the matter of hunting license revocations
- 17 and convictions.
- 18 The Chair would recognize Director Palmer.
- 19 MR. PALMER: Thank you, Mr. President.
- We have one change to the revocation list
- 21 that the Commissioners were provided. Revocation No.
- 22 135, Joel Dulla, (ph) and Revocation No. 274, Joseph
- 23 Rugawitz, (ph) we're requesting be removed from the
- 24 revocation list for consideration.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: I think if the Bureau is

- 1 requesting the removal from consideration by the
- 2 Board, I don't think we need to vote on that if
- 3 you're asking that they be removed.
- 4 So the list that remains with those two
- 5 names removed will be what we'll be voting on?
- 6 MR. PALMER: That's correct, Mr. President.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Commissioners did
- 8 receive this packet in advance of the meeting.
- 9 Presumably, we've all had a chance to look over the
- 10 list.
- 11 Is there a Commissioner prepared to make a
- 12 motion to approve these revocations and convictions
- 13 as listed?
- MR. ISABELLA: Motion, Mr. President.
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Mr. Isabella.
- 16 Is there a second?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: Second.
- 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.
- 19 Is there any discussion on this item of
- 20 business?
- 21 (No response.)
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we will vote.
- 23 All in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 24 (Signified aye.)
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.

- 1 (No response.)
- 2 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you.
- 4 Thank you, Director Palmer and Director
- 5 DuBrock. I guess we'll be hearing from Director
- 6 DuBrock later in the morning.
- 7 We now recognize Mr. Capouillez, from our
- 8 Bureau of Habitat Management, and we're going to move
- 9 now to the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat Management.
- 10 MR. PALMER: Mr. President, we have one
- 11 additional for the administrative hearings.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay, that was not part of
- 13 our packet or was it?
- MR. PALMER: Does that need a separate
- 15 motion, a separate vote?
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Were the Commissioners
- 17 provided?
- MR. PALMER: We can revisit that. We'll
- 19 provide those on the break.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you.
- 21 Again, I understand the reason we wanted to
- 22 do these now is so that the people affected would
- 23 know where they stood before the new license year
- 24 started, so I know your department was under some
- 25 pressure to get those to us.

- Bill, good morning.
- MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Good morning, sir.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: We're going to now turn to
- 4 page 33 of the agenda.
- 5 Mr. Pouss, would you tell us about the next
- 6 item of business?
- 7 MR. POUSS: The first item is a land
- 8 acquisition, Option No. 50005.
- 9 Fifty more or less acres of land in Haycock
- 10 Township, Bucks County, adjoining State Game Lands
- 11 No. 157, which is Exhibit RED 1. There are no
- 12 reservations. The option price is \$82,000 lump sum.
- The money is to be paid from funds escrowed
- 14 by Ladnar, Inc., with respect to mining operations on
- 15 State Game Lands No. 264. The acquisition of this
- 16 property is being made possible through partnerships
- 17 with the Natural Lands Trust and Bucks County.
- 18 The property is mostly forested with mature
- 19 tree species comprised of tulip poplar, mixed oaks,
- 20 ash, beech and maple. There is a small three-acre
- 21 wetland located along Stony Garden Road. An unnamed
- 22 tributary to Haycock Creek runs through the property.
- 23 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 24 the option listed above be accepted and the
- 25 Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat

- 1 Management to proceed with the acquisition of this
- 2 tract.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- There is a map attached. It's page 34,
- 5 which shows the action item that is before us. Mr.
- 6 Capouillez is available to answer any questions.
- 7 Is a Commissioner prepared to make a motion?
- 8 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 10 Is there a second?
- 11 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Second.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- 13 Is there discussion on this item?
- MR. ISABELLA: I'd like to make a comment,
- 15 Mr. President.
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes. The Chair recognizes
- 17 Commissioner Isabella.
- MR. ISABELLA: Yeah, this property here, as
- 19 the description states, was well worth over \$1
- 20 million. A developer could have acquired this land,
- 21 but this acquisition prevents encroachment on our
- 22 State Game Lands and our range there. Our team did a
- 23 good job.
- Thanks, Bill.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Any other Commissioner wish

- 1 to comment?
- 2 Commissioner Schreffler?
- 3 MR. SCHREFFLER: I just want to say this is
- 4 great. I think the more land that we can acquire
- 5 near population centers to provide the opportunity
- 6 for many of those families in that area to experience
- 7 hunting and so on is wonderful. I think it's a real
- 8 need that we have to expand our land holdings near
- 9 population centers.
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you for those
- 11 comments.
- 12 Any other Commissioner wish to comment?
- 13 (No response.)
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, we'll vote. All in
- 15 favor of this first item of business from the Bureau
- 16 of Wildlife Habitat Management indicate by saying
- 17 aye.
- 18 (Signified aye.)
- 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- Moving to page 35.
- MR. POUSS: Mr. President, the next item is
- 25 Option No. 50008. Thirty acres more or less of land

- 1 in Shade Township, Somerset County, near State Game
- 2 Land No. 93, Exhibit RED 2, which is page 36 of your
- 3 agenda, from Waste Management, Inc. This donation is
- 4 made possible through the Wildlife for Everyone
- 5 Endowment Foundation and will provide additional
- 6 protection of the Flight 93 flight path from
- 7 development.
- 8 The detached tract is a man-made wetland
- 9 designed and constructed as mitigation for
- 10 replacement wetlands impacted by a nearby landfill.
- 11 Presently, the wetland is functioning very well and
- 12 provides waterfowl habitat opportunities.
- 13 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 14 the donation listed above be accepted and the
- 15 Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat
- 16 Management to proceed with the acquisition of this
- 17 tract.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- 19 Again, we have a map on page 36 depicting
- 20 the tract in question.
- 21 Is there a motion?
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: So moved.
- 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- Is there a second?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: Second.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.
- 2 Is there discussion?
- 3 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President.
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair recognizes
- 5 Commissioner Schleiden.
- 6 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Serving on the Board of the
- 7 Wildlife For Everyone Foundation, I want to
- 8 acknowledge, I saw that Mr. Jim Gebicki, from Waste
- 9 Management is here. Jim, would you stand up? I want
- 10 to thank you and your company for stepping forward
- 11 and making this donation.
- 12 Waste Management provides a very important
- 13 and sometimes unpopular service to the public
- 14 nationwide. They've work very hard. We've seen
- 15 their ads, but they've worked very, very hard to do
- 16 it in a conservation-minded way. They work hard to
- 17 be a good neighbor.
- 18 A number of us went down to this particular
- 19 area, toured the properties that were given to us as
- 20 a conduit to the Game Commission. I came away very
- 21 impressed. They're very good neighbors down there.
- 22 They work very hard to being good neighbors. We're
- 23 just happy to be a conduit for this donation.
- I think, Bill, did you mention Ducks
- 25 Unlimited was working on this as well?

- 1 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Yes, sir. It's my
- 2 understanding they've allocated about \$18,000 towards
- 3 improving the waterfowl habitat in the area on that
- 4 tract as well.
- 5 MR. SCHLEIDEN: This property there's a lot
- 6 of money spent on it, literally millions of dollars
- 7 to make it a good wetlands. Again, we want to
- 8 recognize Waste Management for that effort and the
- 9 effort of all these partners that are coming
- 10 together. It's just wonderful.
- I think the foundation is excited about
- 12 working with you more in the future, of working to
- 13 help the public have more land as to enjoy. We thank
- 14 you for the service you also give.
- 15 (Applause.)
- 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: I would want to echo on
- 17 behalf of the Board Commissioner Schleiden's
- 18 comments, but I also would like to note Commissioner
- 19 Schleiden is very modest. We'd like to publicly
- 20 acknowledge the Wildlife For Everyone Endowment
- 21 Foundation and all that they do. I know at least one
- 22 other Board member is here. If it were not for
- 23 Commissioner Schleiden and some of the other people
- 24 that have been involved with that, this opportunity
- 25 probably would not have been possible. So I think we

- 1 ought to thank them as well.
- 2 For those of you who don't know about the
- 3 Wildlife For Everyone Endowment Foundation, please
- 4 there's a Web site. There's a lot of information.
- 5 You can certainly talk to Commissioner Schleiden
- 6 about it.
- 7 Thank you again, sir.
- 8 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Wildlifeforeveryone.org.
- 9 (Applause.)
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay, we have the item
- 11 before us. We've had some discussion. If there's no
- 12 other discussion, we're going to vote on this second
- 13 action item from the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat
- 14 Management.
- 15 All those in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 16 (Signified aye.)
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 18 (No response.)
- 19 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- Now moving to page 37, Mr. Pouss.
- MR. POUSS: Yes, Mr. President.
- The next item involves a land exchange with
- 24 Arcadia Industrial Corporation, which has agreed to
- 25 an exchange involving two lots totaling 1.67 acres,

- 1 being part of Sate Game Land No. 262, situate in
- 2 Montgomery Township, Indiana County, shown on Exhibit
- 3 RED 3, which is I believe page 38 of your agenda.
- 4 Arcadia Industrial Corporation desires to
- 5 expand its current manufacturing facilities. The
- 6 Commission already has limited use of the property
- 7 because of safety zones from the current facilities.
- 8 In exchange, Arcadia Industrial Corporation
- 9 will transfer 6.68 acres in Grant Township, Indiana
- 10 County, which is shown on Exhibit RED 4, which is
- 11 page 39 of your agenda. The 6.68 acres adjoining
- 12 State Games Lands No. 262 is forested riparian
- 13 habitat and will provide additional road frontage
- 14 along a state highway locally known as Pine Vale Road
- 15 and protects a portion of Little Mahoning Creek, a
- 16 trout stream.
- 17 The staff has reviewed this proposal and has
- 18 determined it to be of equal or greater value for the
- 19 benefit of wildlife.
- 20 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 21 this land exchange be approved and the Commission
- 22 authorize the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat Management
- 23 to proceed with the exchanges indicated above.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss.
- 25 From the reading you'll note that this

- 1 involves two land exchanges, one in Indiana County
- 2 and one in Westmoreland County.
- 4 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 6 Is there a second?
- 7 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Second.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.
- 9 Is there discussion on the item?
- 10 (No response.)
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we'll vote.
- 12 All in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 13 (Signified aye.)
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 15 (No response.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 18 Turning to page 41.
- 19 MR. POUSS: The next item involves a
- 20 resolution endorsing cooperative wind energy
- 21 agreements.
- 22 WHEREAS, the Pennsylvania Game Commission
- 23 seeks to coordinate wind energy projects with wind
- 24 energy developers in order to work collaboratively to
- 25 ensure that wind energy development project sites are

- 1 developed in both an environmentally conscientious
- 2 manner and with best regard for the conservation of
- 3 the Commonwealth's wildlife resources; and
- 4 WHEREAS, pursuant to the jurisdiction
- 5 granted by 34 Pennsylvania Consolidated Statute §101
- 6 et seq. the Game and Wildlife Code, the Commission
- 7 has the authority to protect, propagate, manage and
- 8 preserve the game or wildlife of this Commonwealth
- 9 and to enforce, by proper actions and proceedings,
- 10 the laws of the Commonwealth relating thereto; and
- 11 WHEREAS, both the Commission and Cooperators
- 12 support renewable energy initiatives and are
- 13 dedicated to arriving at uniform guidance, in the
- 14 absence of comprehensive state regulations, on how
- 15 best to avoid, minimize, and/or potentially mitigate
- 16 adverse impacts to wildlife resources; and
- 17 WHEREAS, the Commission and Cooperators, in
- 18 an effort to best avoid, minimize and/or mitigate
- 19 potential adverse impacts with specific intent to
- 20 birds and mammals, have entered into Cooperative
- 21 Agreements in an effort to standardize wildlife
- 22 monitoring protocols and wildlife impact review
- 23 methods associated with wind energy development
- 24 projects in a mutually beneficial and flexible manner
- 25 and with high regard to both parties' goals,

- 1 objectives and purviews.
- Now, therefore, be it resolved that the
- 3 Commission endorses the Cooperative Wind Energy
- 4 Agreements which are currently pending final
- 5 execution by the Commission and Cooperators, as well
- 6 as those Agreements which may be executed in the
- 7 future.
- 8 The Executive Director and staff recommend
- 9 the resolution shown above be accepted.
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading of
- 11 the item as presented. We, as a Board, are being
- 12 asked to endorse by resolution these wind energy
- 13 agreements.
- I believe, although I'm sure the
- 15 Commissioners all understand, maybe for the benefit
- 16 of those in the audience, Bill, could you just
- 17 comment briefly on this for us, please?
- MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Yes, sir.
- 19 This is a collaborative effort that came out
- 20 of some statewide initiatives for which the Game
- 21 Commission was the lead with regard to the bats and
- 22 birds impacts. It's a voluntary agreement in that
- 23 there's really no regulations or permitting mechanism
- 24 that exist within the state which are encompassing
- 25 actual reviews and monitoring from wind energy

- 1 development.
- 2 Wind energy development has taken a
- 3 forefront on a lot of the landscape across
- 4 Pennsylvania in the recent two years. So this effort
- 5 sets in place in absence of those regulations a
- 6 better means of monitoring, as well as accessing
- 7 potential impacts to bats and birds and minimizing
- 8 and mitigating those impacts.
- 9 There's going to be a press release with
- 10 regard to the Cooperators that have signed in.
- 11 That's going to occur at 2 o'clock this afternoon.
- 12 Again, this is something that these Cooperators not
- 13 having to do, but voluntarily stepped forward to do
- 14 the right thing, the higher and better use of the
- 15 energy resource, as well as the cooperation with the
- 16 Game Commission.
- 17 So it's been a long effort and it's been
- 18 very rewarding based on the amount of Cooperators I
- 19 have there listed.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is this going to be a
- 21 public press conference, Bill?
- MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Yes, sir, at 2 o'clock.
- 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Where will that be at 2
- 24 o'clock?
- MR. CAPOUILLEZ: That will be right here in

- 1 this room, sir.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: In this room, so anyone who
- 3 is interested would be able to attend?
- 4 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Yes, sir.
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay, I hope that that
- 6 explanation was further helpful, at least for the
- 7 people in the audience, but for the Commissioners who
- 8 are being asked to endorse, you have the item before
- 9 you.
- 10 Is there a motion?
- 11 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 13 Is there a second?
- MRS. PALONE: Second.
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- 16 The matter has been properly moved and
- 17 seconded.
- 18 Is there any discussion?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: Yes.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner
- 21 Schreffler.
- MR. SCHREFFLER: I would just like to
- 23 commend the efforts of our Bureau Director Capouillez
- 24 in taking the lead in this matter and recognizing for
- 25 that. He's been primarily the person responsible for

- 1 it.
- Thank you.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, sir, your comments are
- 4 well noted and I'm sure we all concur.
- 5 Any other comments?
- 6 (No response.)
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: All in favor indicate by
- 8 saying aye.
- 9 (Signified aye.)
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 11 (No response.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: That takes us to page 42 of
- 14 the agenda. The item that remains are the allocation
- 15 matters. We do have a lot of handouts.
- I think probably now would be the
- 17 appropriate time to take a morning break. So I have
- 18 about ten of. Let's try to meet back at five after
- 19 and we'll take up the allocations.
- 20 (Recess 9:50 A.M.)
- 21 (Reconvened 10:07 A.M.)
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: As we mentioned earlier in
- 23 the meeting, we're now going to turn to the matter of
- 24 the allocations. We did have a presentation
- 25 yesterday afternoon that was open to the public.

- 1 Many of you were here for that, but what we plan to
- 2 do is with the 22 Management Units we're going to
- 3 entertain a motion and a second and then we're going
- 4 to go through each Management Unit individually to
- 5 see if there are any amendments. When we complete
- 6 that process, we're going to vote on the overall
- 7 package involving all 22.
- 8 So first of all, the Chair would recognize
- 9 Bureau Director DuBrock, and Dr. Rosenberry is here.
- 10 Chris, maybe if you'd be willing to share the podium
- 11 or be over there in that area so if there's specific
- 12 questions directed to you from the Board you can help
- 13 us?
- To get started, I'll ask first of the Board,
- 15 is there a motion to approve the allocations for
- 16 2007-2008 as presented yesterday afternoon and as set
- 17 forth in the packets that we all have before us?
- MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- MRS. PALONE: So moved.
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Again, I'm going to give it
- 21 to Commissioner Isabella with a second to
- 22 Commissioner Palone, if that's agreeable.
- 23 So it's properly moved and seconded. I
- 24 believe now we'll turn to 1A, which is the first of
- 25 the Management Units. We do have our Wildlife

- 1 Management Unit map up here for those in the
- 2 audience. Hopefully, you can see it. I think many
- 3 people are now familiar from the Digest because we've
- 4 been working with this system for some time.
- 5 One(A), the recommended allocation is 42,000
- 6 for 2007-2008. Are there any amendments with respect
- 7 to 1A?
- 8 (No response.)
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we move to
- 10 1B, where the recommended allocation is 30,000.
- 11 Again, as with 1A, this is the same allocation as was
- 12 recommended and approved for last year.
- 13 Any amendments with respect to 1B?
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to 2A, recommended
- 16 allocation is 60,000. The allocation for the
- 17 previous '06/07 was 55,000. Is there any discussion
- 18 for the proposed amendment?
- 19 (No response.)
- 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: No amendment with respect
- 21 to 2A.
- 22 Moving to 2B, the recommended allocation is
- 23 68,000, which is the same for the previous season.
- 24 Any amendment with respect to 2B?
- 25 (No response.)

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to 2C, recommended
- 2 allocation is 49,000, the same as for 06/07. Is
- 3 there an amendment with respect to 2C?
- 4 (No response.)
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to 2D, recommended
- 6 allocation is 56,000, the same as `06/07. Are there
- 7 any amendments with respect to 2D?
- 8 (No response.)
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Two(E), 21,000 recommended,
- 10 the same as '06/07. Any amendment with respect to
- 11 2E?
- 12 (No response.)
- 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Two(F), recommended
- 14 allocation is 28,000, the same as previously set.
- 15 Any amendment with respect to 2F?
- 16 (No response.)
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Two(G), recommended
- 18 allocation is 26,000. Previous allocation was
- 19 19,000. I think this was discussed yesterday.
- 20 That's a 37 percent increase. Is there an amendment
- 21 with respect to 2G?
- (No response.)
- 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Going to 3A, recommended
- 24 allocation of 29,000, which was the same as `06/07.
- 25 Amendment with respect to 3A?

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to 4E,
- 2 recommendation 38,000. Previous it was 38,000. If
- 3 there's no one else I would like to offer an
- 4 amendment with respect to 4E. Four(E) is the only
- 5 Management Unit that we have in the state where the
- 6 deer health is good.
- 7 Of course, habitat is good and our deer-
- 8 human conflicts are above, so we have positives in
- 9 all three areas of the deer health. Reproduction for
- 10 one-year-olds is fair, but as we heard yesterday,
- 11 although this includes all or a part of eight
- 12 counties in the central or the eastern center of the
- 13 state, that was based on a sample size of 13 animals.
- 14 It takes now the full period to sell out the
- 15 allocations. We had no red tag harvest at all in
- 16 '06, and DMAP utilization was low. It is decreasing.
- 17 If there's any Management Unit that would seem
- 18 appropriate to allow the herd to increase, all the
- 19 factors would seem favorable from the criteria that
- 20 we're using.
- 21 This is also my home county area, which I'm
- 22 very familiar, and my amendment would be to reduce
- 23 the allocation to 30,000, which is a modest
- 24 reduction, in my opinion, and my amendment would be
- 25 to reduce the allocation to 30,000.

- I understand we've not had a Citizen
- 2 Advisory Committee and that's the only thing that was
- 3 indicated we're waiting for, but I think we, as a
- 4 Board, can make the political and the social decision
- 5 before the CAC would meet.
- 6 So that's my amendment.
- 7 Is there a second to the amendment?
- 8 MR. SCHREFFLER: Second it.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Seconded.
- 10 Is there discussion on the amendment?
- 11 MRS. PALONE: Mr. President.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.
- MRS. PALONE: Thank you.
- 14 Our objective in this Wildlife Management
- 15 Unit is to stabilize the population. I feel if we
- 16 decrease the doe allocation that our population may,
- 17 in fact, increase. I also feel that right now the
- 18 deer herd health and, of course, habitat health is
- 19 good. If we increase the population of the deer
- 20 there, that those two things will not remain good.
- 21 That they could be degraded sometime in the future.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden?
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: Yes, sir.
- I'm kind of interested in knowing how you
- 25 came up with 30,000, since I know how staff came up

- 1 with 38,000? Is that just a number that you feel
- 2 comfortable with?
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Well, my understanding,
- 4 and, again, I could be corrected by Dr. Rosenberry,
- 5 that it takes three to four tags to kill an
- 6 antlerless deer in that area. Correct me if I'm
- 7 wrong, and I think that that would allow a modest
- 8 increase of about 2,000 animals, spread over an
- 9 eight-county area, which I don't really consider to
- 10 be a significant impact.
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: Well, that's what I was
- 12 looking at as well, because the 38,000 over an eight-
- 13 county area is only roughly about 4,500 permits on
- 14 average, although it may be that some people hunt
- 15 more in one area in that unit than others.
- 16 So that's why I was asking.
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: That was the rationale.
- 18 MR. HILL: I'd like to make a few comments.
- 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Sure, Mr. Hill.
- 20 MR. HILL: I'm looking at these numbers as
- 21 well and I take it from your comment that the
- 22 recommendation is based on political and social
- 23 factors, not biological ones.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: I think it can also be
- 25 based on biological as well, because we have all of

- 1 the factors pointing to the positive. The only
- 2 thing, as Dr. Rosenberry, if I understood him
- 3 yesterday that we're waiting on that would make a
- 4 recommendation increase, would be a Citizens Advisory
- 5 Committee, which has simply not been scheduled in
- 6 that Management Unit.
- 7 So I think it's on all three. It's
- 8 biological, political and social.
- 9 MR. HILL: But qualitative biological, not
- 10 quantitative; right?
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Well, I guess we can get
- 12 into that esoteric debate, but I'll let you have the
- 13 word on that.
- MR. HILL: Well, I think that it was brought
- 15 up yesterday. I guess I don't understand the
- 16 distinction as well either, because if you look at
- 17 deer health by WMU, we're barely, the fawns were
- 18 barely in that category above this line. I can't
- 19 with my bifocals see the difference, but I think
- 20 that's an important distinction.
- 21 If we're going to mix political and social
- 22 factors with science, at some point where do we mix
- 23 so much we lose the science? That's hard.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: I guess my response to that
- 25 is that in my humble opinion we've lost the political

- 1 and social for the last five years and science has
- 2 trumped us for five years. Can't political and
- 3 social play a small percentage in the equation?
- 4 MR. SCHLEIDEN: Well, it did for 70 years.
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Well, that may be and
- 6 pendulums swing and sometimes they swing too far.
- 7 MR. HILL: I'm just confused over the
- 8 quantitative and qualitative, I guess.
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: I'll leave that for the
- 10 scientists.
- MR. HILL: I have.
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Anyone else have comments
- 13 on the amendment?
- 14 (No response.)
- 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: So we have the amendment on
- 16 the floor. We have the comment. All those in favor
- 17 of the amendment which would reduce the allocation in
- 18 4E to 30,000 indicate by saying aye.
- 19 (Commissioners Schreffler and Boop signified
- 20 aye.)
- 21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 22 (Commissioners Isabella, Hill, Schleiden and
- 23 Palone indicate nay.)
- MR. ISABELLA: The ayes two, nays four.
- 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.

- 1 Moving to 5A, the recommended allocation
- 2 there is 22,000. The '06/07 was 25,000. There's a
- 3 3,000 reduction there. Is there any amendment with
- 4 respect to 5A?
- 5 (No response.)
- 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, moving to 5B,
- 7 recommended allocation is 53,000, the same as 06/07.
- 8 Is there any amendment with respect to 5B?
- 9 (No response.)
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Five(C) recommended
- 11 allocation is 84,000. The '06/07 allocation was
- 12 79,000. Any amendment there?
- 13 (No response.)
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Five(D), recommended
- 15 allocation is 20,000, '06/07 was twenty. Any
- 16 amendment with respect to that Management Unit?
- 17 (No response.)
- 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we have the
- 19 allocation numbers before us for all 22 units. No
- 20 amendments that have passed, so we would be I guess
- 21 at this point entertaining any additional discussion
- 22 or comments on the overall motion, which would be to
- 23 approve the recommended allocation numbers for the 22
- 24 Management Units.
- 25 Is there any additional discussion?

- I just would like to note as discussion and,
- 2 again, I guess it gets us back into the political,
- 3 social, biological. On March 5, some of us as
- 4 Commissioners attended the House Budget Legislative
- 5 Committee. I may not have the correct title there.
- 6 We heard from about 20 Representatives on a
- 7 bipartisan basis, who all, I believe represent about
- 8 50,000 constituents, really pleading for this Board
- 9 to make some adjustment to our Deer Management
- 10 Program.
- 11 These allocation numbers, if we approve them
- 12 as stated, again, I may not be exactly correct, but I
- 13 think about 6,000 more than we had in '06/07. Living
- 14 in the political environment professionally I just
- 15 wonder how wise that is when the legislature which
- 16 controls the budgetary process that affects
- 17 everything we do here at this agency, not just deer,
- 18 which enables us to function, whether it's really
- 19 wise in light of almost the pleading that we had from
- 20 the legislators to make some modest changes? Do we
- 21 really want to approve an allocation package that not
- 22 only does not do that, but increases the allocations
- 23 over last year?
- I just am concerned that that's politically
- 25 not wise.

- 1 If there's no other discussion, all those in
- 2 favor of the motion to approve the allocations as
- 3 recommended by the Bureau of Wildlife Management
- 4 indicate by saying aye.
- 5 (Commissioners Isabella, Palone, Schleiden
- 6 and Hill indicate aye.)
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 8 (Commissioners Boop and Schreffler oppose.)
- 9 MR. ISABELLA: Ayes four, nays two, Mr.
- 10 President.
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: That completes the
- 12 allocation as part of the business. Thank you.
- 13 Again, Dr. Rosenberry and Mr. DuBrock, I
- 14 expected there would be more questions. I appreciate
- 15 your willingness to be here to answer them.
- I'm now going to go back to Director Palmer,
- 17 the Bureau of Wildlife Protection. We do have
- 18 remaining on our agenda there are some Administrative
- 19 Hearing matters that we need to take up yet. I know
- 20 that Mr. Palmer's bureau has worked very hard to get
- 21 this to us for the April meeting and we really
- 22 pressed them, but, again, in fairness to the people
- 23 affected, we wanted to have these determinations
- 24 before the new license season begins.
- 25 So before us we have a blue packet of

- 1 material that probably the people in the audience do
- 2 not have, but we have, one is for revocations to
- 3 remain, some are to be reduced and some are to be
- 4 rescinded.
- 5 Without reading the individuals' names, Mr.
- 6 Pouss, we're going to do this one by one, so would
- 7 you start with those that remain?
- 8 MR. POUSS: The first one, which is labeled
- 9 A, do you need the explanation, the commentary?
- 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Just give us a summary.
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Administrative hearings are
- 12 held to review hunting and furtaking revocations for
- 13 those persons who file a petition requesting a
- 14 review, in accordance with the Administrative Agency
- 15 Law.
- 16 The Commission was furnished a copy of the
- 17 Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law, and
- 18 Recommendations of the Hearing Officer. The Findings
- 19 of Fact set forth the circumstances surrounding this
- 20 matter.
- 21 The Executive Director recommends that the
- 22 Commission approve the Findings of Fact, Conclusions
- 23 of Law, and Recommendation of the Hearing Officer
- 24 Lehman, allowing the revocation period to remain as
- 25 originally ordered for each of the individuals

- 1 listed.
- 2 There are nine individuals listed to have
- 3 the revocation period remain the same.
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, the matter
- 5 is before you.
- 6 Is there a motion?
- 7 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 9 Is there a second?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: So moved.
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.
- 12 All in favor indicate by saying aye.
- 13 (Signified aye.)
- 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Those opposed.
- 15 (No response.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: I believe with respect to
- 18 page two, the summary would be the same. It's just
- 19 reduced for the three individuals indicated?
- 20 MR. POUSS: Yes. The recommendation is, and
- 21 each one has a different reduction. One it would be
- 22 reduced from three years to one year. The second one
- 23 would be reduced from three years to one year and the
- 24 third one would be reduced from six years to four
- 25 years.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: The matter is before you,
- 2 Commissioners. Is there a motion?
- 3 MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
- 5 Is there a second?
- 6 MRS. PALONE: Second.
- 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Any discussion?
- 8 (No response.)
- 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all in favor
- 10 indicate by saying aye.
- 11 (Signified aye.)
- 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed, same sign.
- 13 (No response.)
- MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 16 And the last of these items would be for
- 17 five individuals, which the revocation period would
- 18 be rescinded, Mr. Pouss?
- 19 MR. POUSS: Yes. That is the recommendation
- 20 of the Hearing Officer that all five individuals have
- 21 their revocations rescinded.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Motion?
- MR. ISABELLA: Motion.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Second?
- MR. SCHREFFLER: Second.

- 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella made
- 2 the motion. Commissioner Schreffler seconded it.
- 4 (No response.)
- 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all in favor
- 6 indicate by saying aye.
- 7 (Signified aye.)
- 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.
- 9 (No response.)
- 10 MR. ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President.
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: We've now completed the
- 12 formal agenda for today. We are under new business.
- Does any Commissioner have any item of new
- 14 business that he or she wishes to bring before the
- 15 Board?
- 16 Yes, Commissioner Isabella?
- 17 MR. ISABELLA: Under new business, I would
- 18 like the Wildlife Management Committee and the deer
- 19 people to consider one experimental Wildlife
- 20 Management Unit to further allocate the basic
- 21 managerial concept of our existing Deer Management
- 22 Program and report back with possible recommendations
- 23 in October of 2007.
- 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: As I understand it,
- 25 Commissioner Isabella, this would then be for the

- 1 '08/09 hunting season?
- MR. ISABELLA: Yes, Mr. President.
- 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard Commissioner
- 4 Isabella's request. I don't believe that requires
- 5 formal action in terms of the vote, unless you're
- 6 requesting a vote.
- 7 Other Commissioners have comment or remarks?
- 8 Yes, Mr. Schleiden.
- 9 MR. SCHLEIDEN: I don't believe we vote on
- 10 new business. I think it was just a request.
- 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Right. I just wondered if
- 12 anyone else wanted to comment on it.
- MR. SCHLEIDEN: As I understand,
- 14 Commissioner Isabella, you're asking staff to take a
- 15 look at this with the Wildlife Committee
- 16 Commissioners to take a look at the possibility of
- 17 that next season that may or may not come about, but
- 18 they'll have an opportunity to report back to us in
- 19 October and give us our suggestions as they see and
- 20 meet your requirements as well?
- 21 MR. ISABELLA: That's correct, Commissioner.
- 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Anyone else want to comment
- 23 on Commissioner Isabella's matter?
- 24 Would certainly support any effort in this
- 25 area. I just hope there's time.

- 1 Anyone else have any other matters of new 2 business? 3 (No response.) PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none--4 5 MR. ISABELLA: I'm sorry, Mr. President, 6 just the dates of next meeting. PRESIDENT BOOP: I'm going to do that. The 7 dates for the next meeting are already previously established as June 25 and June 26, at 8:30 A.M. 9 10 We'll be here for our June meeting. 11 If there's no other business, we're going to 12 adjourn. 13 There will be a press conference in this 14 room because of the training class being active so 15 the members of the media that want to stay, I will be 16 having a press conference immediately after the 17 meeting.
- 18 If there's nothing else, we're adjourned.
- 19 (Meeting adjourned 10:31 A.M.)
