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PRESIDENT BOOP: Good morning ladies and gentlemen. I welcome you to the Tuesday meeting. This is the business section of our January Commission meeting. I'd like to call the meeting to order and ask you to join us in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

7 (Pledge of Allegiance said.)
8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Just a few preliminary
9 remarks. I'd like to welcome former Executive
10 Director, Vern Ross, who's in the audience today.
11 Welcome, Vern. Thank you for joining us.

We are going to be following, as many of you who have been here in the past, the preprinted agenda, which is up front. If any of you do not have the agenda, there are additional copies up here, if you want to come up and get them. We are going to be following the agenda.

18 It's a smaller group today, of course, 19 than it was on Sunday or yesterday, but we just 20 simply ask you if you have cell phones to turn 21 them off. It's very distracting when they go off 22 during the course of the meeting. Pretty much 23 we've concluded the preliminary remarks. 24 I would call on our Secretary,

25 Commissioner Isabella, to read the roll.

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COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Okay, Mr. 1 2 President. 3 Commissioner Boop. 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Present. 5 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Palone. 6 MRS. PALONE: Present. 7 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Isabella. 8 Present. 9 Commissioner Schleiden. MR. SCHLEIDEN: Present. 10 11 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Schreffler. 12 MR. SCHREFFLER: Present. 13 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Hill. 14 MR. HILL: Here. 15 MR. ISABELLA: Mr. President, all present 16 and accounted for. PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner 17 18 Isabella. 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: We have our minutes from 20 the October meeting, which was held on October 3, 21 2006. 22 Is there a motion that those minutes be 23 approved? 24 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

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1 Is there a second?

2 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Second. 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden. Any discussion? 4 5 (No response.) 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all in favor 7 indicate by saying aye. 8 (Signified aye.) 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 10 (No response.) 11 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 12 President. 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 14 Secretary. 15 For 2007 and including our January 2008 16 meetings, we have the proposed dates. These are 17 printed in the formal agenda for April, June, 18 October of '07 and, also, January of '08. The 19 Commissioners have had these for some time. 20 Is there a motion that the meeting 21 schedule as presented be approved? 22 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Mr. President, 23 wasn't there an issue with the April 16, 17? 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: There was discussion 25 about that and I think if we have a motion and a

second we can talk about that under discussion. 1 2 Is there a motion first? 3 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: So moved. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler. 4 5 Is there a second? 6 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Second. 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Now, is there 8 discussion? COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: I think there was 9 10 an issue on the April dates. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: I believe the discussion 12 that had come up was that fishing season starts on 13 the Saturday, the fourteenth, and this is Monday 14 and Tuesday the sixteenth and seventeenth. I 15 think that was the concern. 16 But there was also concern about changing 17 the dates with respect to the required publication 18 schedules that we need to adhere to. 19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROE: Mr. President, 20 you asked me yesterday evening to look into the 21 dates. In the southeast and halfway through our 22 southcentral region, trout season starts March 31, 23 as a change to the regulations of the Fish and Boat Commission. So there is a split starting 24 25 season this year for the opening of trout. So it

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1 depends upon where are in the State as to when, in
2 fact, that opening date occurs.

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COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President.
 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner
 Schleiden.

6 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: For a number of 7 years now we didn't have that meeting date. I 8 understand we have a problem getting it into the 9 bulletin. So I would suggest, since the Fish and 10 Boat are having their meeting right now, we send a 11 runner over and have them change the starting date 12 of the fishing for us.

13 PRESIDENT BOOP: After the meeting we'll 14 designate you to do that, Commissioner Schleiden.

15 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: I'll be more 16 than happy to do that. Would you like me to go 17 before the end of the meeting now? That's your 18 choice.

19 PRESIDENT BOOP: I think we have a quorum 20 problem if you do that.

21 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Mr. President.

22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner

23 Palone.

24 COMMISSIONER PALONE: We had talked about 25 starting the meeting a little later in the week,

- 6 -1 maybe having it the seventeenth and eighteenth. 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: We did discuss that. I 3 think the appropriate thing would be to offer an 4 amendment, if you want to offer an amendment to do 5 that? 6 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Okay. 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: So your amendment would 8 be what? COMMISSIONER PALONE: For the meeting to 9 10 be April 17 and 18. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: So it would be Tuesday 12 and Wednesday, rather than Monday and Tuesday? 13 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Yes. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there a second to the 15 amendment to the motion by Commissioner Palone? 16 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 18 Is there discussion on the amendment? COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President, 19 20 asking Carl Roe, our Executive Director, do you 21 see a problem with that? 22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROE: One more day 23 either way in that week is not going to make that 24 much of a difference for us, so . . . 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: So you've heard the

- 7 discussion on the amended motion, which would be 1 2 to change the April meeting date for Monday and 3 Tuesday, the sixteenth and seventeenth, to Tuesday and Wednesday, the seventeenth and eighteenth. 4 5 Is there any additional discussion on the 6 amendment motion, the motion as amended? 7 (No response.) 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all those in 9 favor of the amendment motion indicate by saying 10 aye. 11 (Signified aye.) 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 13 (No response.) 14 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 15 President. 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: So the motion as now 17 amended would be to have the meeting on the 18 seventeenth and eighteenth. All in favor of the 19 original motion as amended. 20 (Signified aye.) 21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 22 (No response.) 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: So that date will now be 24 the seventeenth and eighteenth. 25 Is there any discussion with respect to

1 any of the other dates?

2 (No response.)

3 PRESIDENT BOOP: I guess that maybe was a little bit convoluted, but we just did the April 4 separately, but let's do all of the dates now. 5 6 We'll approve all of the dates with the April date 7 as amended. 8 All in favor indicate by saying aye. 9 (Signified aye.) 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 11 (No response.) 12 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 13 President. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner 15 Isabella. 16 If we could move now to page 2 of the 17 printed material, call on counsel, Mr. Pouss, to 18 give us the reading. 19 MR. POUSS: Thank you, Mr. President. 20 The first item on the agenda relates to 21 the State Wildlife Grant Program. 22 Congress appropriated funds under the 23 State Wildlife Grant Program (SWG) directly and 24 exclusively to state wildlife agencies for 25 "wildlife specifies of the greatest conservation

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1 concern."

Pennsylvania is eligible to receive these funds for fish and wildlife projects under the SWG program. We are recommending approval of the two projects listed in Exhibit A.

6 Projects listed in Exhibit A will not 7 require any net reduction in the Game Fund, since both are cooperator projects. The Game Commission 8 9 will simply function as a conduit for these 10 federal funds. If approved, the Game Commission 11 will contact with the organizations and 12 investigators of these projects and pay SWGeligible costs from the Game Fund. 13

14 The Game Fund will be reimbursed by the 15 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Aid 16 program using SWG funds. The Game Commission will 17 receive up to 3 percent of all SWG funds to 18 administer the program.

19 You can see that the two items relating 20 to the SWG program are on page 3 of your agenda in 21 Exhibit A.

22 The Executive Director and staff
23 recommend approval of the State Wildlife Grant
24 projects listed in Exhibit A.

25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Exhibit A is before you.

- 10 -1 Bureau Director Cal DuBrock, from the Bureau of 2 Wildlife Management, is present at the podium and 3 available to answer any questions concerning 4 Exhibit A. 5 Is there a motion to approve? 6 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. Is there a second? 8 9 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Second. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler. 10 11 Is there discussion on the motion? 12 (No response.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Seeing none, all those 14 in favor indicate by saying aye. 15 (Signified aye.) 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 17 (No response.) 18 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 19 President. 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you. 21 Moving to page 4, we're now moving to the 22 Bureau of Wildlife Protection. The Chair would 23 recognize Director Palmer and go back to counsel 24 for the reading with respect to page 4. 25 MR. POUSS: Thank you, Mr. President.

The first item relates to adopted rule
 making, more specifically, relating to proposed
 amendments to Chapters 141, 143 and 147 of Title
 58 of the Pa. Code.

5 To effectively manage the wildlife 6 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game 7 Commission, at its October 3, 2006 meeting, 8 proposed the following changes:

9 Amend Chapter 143, Subchapter A, 10 (relating to general); B (relating to appointment 11 of agents); C (relating to antlerless deer 12 licenses); D (relating to bear licenses); E 13 (relating to flintlock - muzzleloader deer 14 licenses); J (relating to migratory game bird 15 license); and K (relating to elk licenses); and 16 Chapter 147, Subchapter R (relating to deer 17 control); and S (relating to bobcat hunting-18 trapping permit) to accommodate the implementation 19 of the Commission's new POS licensing system 20 within this Commonwealth.

Also, amend §141.48 (relating to elk management units), §143.206 (relating to validity of license) and §143.207 (relating to unlawful acts) to redesignate "elk management areas/units" as "elk hunt zones."

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1 It is important to identify that staff 2 has consolidated the above mentioned rule making packages into one item on this agenda even though 3 4 these packages were originally presented as 5 separate proposal at the Commission's October 3, 6 2006 meeting. The purpose of this consolidation 7 was to ensure accuracy and clarity in the regulatory language being considered for final 8 9 adoption in light of the fact that these 10 individual packages amend several of the same 11 provisions. This consolidation is administrative 12 in nature and does not in any way affect the 13 substance of either rule making package. 14 The Executive Director and staff

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14 The Executive Director and stall 15 recommend final adoption of these amendments to 58 16 Pa. Code, as shown in Exhibit A, which is on pages 17 5 through 14 of your agenda.

18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Before asking for any 19 action on this item of the agenda which appears as 20 five through 14, I'd like to call on Executive 21 Director Roe for comment concerning the current 22 recommendation with respect to this item.

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROE: Thank you, Mr.24 President.

25 As many of you know, this proposed rule

1 making change is dealing with Point of Sale system 2 as it moved through and moved forward. Last Fall 3 when we proposed this, we thought Point of Sale was in pretty good shape, although they were 4 5 pretty much behind schedule in a couple of areas. 6 Since that time we believe they've fallen 7 further behind and missed some significant 8 deadlines for us.

9 So we, as a staff, would ask that we 10 table this until April, and see where they are, 11 our contractor is on Point of Sale. If they are 12 where we think they can make their deadline of 13 June 15, we would ask the Board to reconsider at 14 that time, but at the present time table this 15 proposed change until April.

16 PRESIDENT BOOP: So we had had 17 preliminary approval in October, and the 18 recommendation was initially for final adoption, 19 but now the request is to table. So the request 20 of this Executive Director and staff is to table. 21 Do we have a motion? 22 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella

24 has made a motion to table.

25 Is there a second to the motion?

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1 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Second. 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden. 3 Is there discussion or debate on the 4 motion? 5 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Mr. President. 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner 7 Palone. 8 COMMISSIONER PALONE: I'd like to amend 9 that to--10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Excuse me, Commissioner 11 Palone. I believe that what we were told 12 yesterday with respect to the first part has been changed this morning. I think you're doing what 13 14 we thought we were going to do to retain 141.48 15 with respect to the elk zones? 16 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Yes. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Again, just if I could 18 just ask we defer that back to Executive Director 19 Roe. 20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROE: Yes, we had 21 further discussions this morning on that and felt 22 that rather than start piecemealing the package, 23 because there's another portion in there later on 24 that relates to that same part of the title, that

we said just table the whole issue and we'll deal

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1 with that in April, as necessary. 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: I appreciate what you 3 were trying to do, because that's what we did discuss yesterday, but five minutes ago we were 4 indicated it's better to table it all. 5 6 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Then I withdraw my 7 motion. PRESIDENT BOOP: So we have a motion and 8 a second to table this agenda item. 9 10 Is there any additional discussion or 11 debate? 12 (No response.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all those in 14 favor of the motion to table indicate by saying 15 aye. 16 (Signified aye.) PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 17 18 (No response.) COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 19 20 President. 21 PRESIDENT BOOP: We move now to page 15. 22 MR. POUSS: Yes, Mr. President, and that 23 relates to adoption of proposed amendment to 24 \$147.746. 25 To effectively manage the wildlife

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- 16 -1 resources of the Commonwealth, the Game 2 Commission, as its October 3, 2006 meeting, 3 proposed the following change: 4 Amend §147.476 (relating to exceptions 5 for resident Canada geese) to remove the necessity 6 for a person to obtain a joint state/federal depredation permit to control the number of 7 8 resident Canada geese on their property to certain 9 circumstances. 10 The Executive Director and staff 11 recommend final adoption of this amendment to 58 12 Pa. Code, as shown in Exhibit B, which is on pages 13 16 and 17 in your agenda. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioners, you have 15 heard the reading. The action item appears on 16 pages 16 and 17. 17 Do we have a motion? 18 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella 20 has made the motion. 21 Is there a second to the motion to adopt? 22 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Second. 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden. 24 Is there discussion or debate on the 25 motion?

- 17 -1 (No response.) 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 3 in favor indicate by saying aye. 4 (Signified aye.) 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 6 (No response.) 7 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 8 President. 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 10 Secretary. 11 Moving to page 18 of the agenda. 12 MR. POUSS: Yes, Mr. President, the next 13 item relates to adoption of proposed amendments to 14 §§141.41, 141.43 and 141.47. 15 To effectively manage the wildlife 16 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game 17 Commission, at its October 3, 2006 meeting, 18 proposed the following changes: 19 Amend §§141.41 (relating to general), 20 141.43 (relating to deer) and 141.47 (relating to 21 elk) to permit the lawful use of .50 caliber or 22 larger muzzleloading handguns while hunting deer, 23 bear and elk. 24 The Executive Director and staff 25 recommend that this rule making be tabled and that

1 the amendments to \$\$141.41, 141.43 and 141.47 be
2 further considered in the comprehensive rule
3 making package found in Item K of this agenda,
4 which I believe has already been tabled.

5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Now, with respect to the
6 recommendation, the Chair would call on Acting
7 Director Palmer.

8 Mr. Palmer, could you just give a brief 9 explanation as to staffs' recommendation?

10 MR. PALMER: Yes. This is similar to the 11 consolidation that we did in Item A, where this 12 particular set of regulations was up for final 13 adoption, but there's also regulations amending 14 the same section that are up for proposal.

15 So from an administrative process, 16 there's not a substantive change there. It's 17 simply making sure that we have all those sections 18 being amended at one time. So we're recommending 19 taking Section C that was up for final adoption 20 and it has been placed in Item K and included in 21 Item K as a proposal.

22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you for that23 explanation.

24 With that explanation, is there a motion25 to table, as is recommended?

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- 19 -1 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 3 Is there a second? 4 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. 6 Is there debate or discussion on the motion? 7 8 (No response.) 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 10 in favor of the motion to table indicate by saying 11 aye. 12 (Signified aye.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 14 (No response.) 15 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 16 President. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 18 Secretary. 19 We now move to page 21. 20 MR. POUSS: Which relates to the adoption 21 of proposed amendments to §§137.1 and 147.203. 22 To effectively manage the wildlife 23 resources of the Commonwealth, the Game 24 Commission, at its October 3, 2006 meeting, 25 proposed the following change:

- 20 -1 Amend §§137.1 (relating to importation, 2 sale and release of certain wildlife) and 147.203 (relating to pens, shelters and enclosures) to 3 4 eliminate the remaining regulatory language 5 concerning those cervidae livestock activities no 6 longer regulated by the Commission. The Executive Director and staff 7 recommend final adoption of these amendments to 8 Title 58 of the Pa. Code, as shown on Exhibit D. 9 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Exhibit D appears as 11 pages 22 and 23 of the printed agenda. 12 Commissioners have it before you. 13 Is there a motion to adopt? 14 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 16 Is there a second? 17 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. 19 Is there discussion or debate on the 20 motion? 21 (No response.) 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 23 in favor indicate by saying aye. 24 (Signified aye.) 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.

1 (No response.) 2 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President. 3 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 5 6 Moving to page 24. 7 MR. POUSS: Yes, Mr. President, the next 8 item relates to adoption of proposed amendments to 9 Chapter 147, Subchapter G and §147.146 of Title 10 58. 11 To effectively manage the wildlife 12 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game 13 Commission, at its October 3, 2006 meeting, 14 proposed the following changes: 15 Amend Chapter 147, by eliminating 16 Subchapter G (relating to taxidermy) to eliminate 17 the remaining regulatory language concerning those 18 taxidermy activities no longer regulated by the 19 Commission. 20 Also, amend §147.146 (relating to sale of inedible wildlife parts) to relocate and maintain 21 22 allowances for taxidermists to sell unclaimed 23 specimens under certain conditions. 24 The Executive Director and staff recommend final adoption of these amendments of 58 25

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1 Pa. Code as shown in Exhibit E.

2 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading by Mr. Pouss. You have the recommendation by 3 staff and the Executive Director. The action item 4 5 is on page 25. 6 Is there a motion to adopt? 7 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 9 Is there a second? COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 10 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. 12 Is there discussion or debate on the 13 motion? 14 (No response.) 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 16 in favor indicate by saying aye. 17 (Signified aye.) 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 19 (No response.) 20 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 21 President. 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 23 Secretary. 24 Turning to page 26. 25 MR. POUSS: Mr. President, the next item

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relates to adoption of proposed amendments to
 Chapter 135, Subchapter L, §\$135.221 through
 135.225 of Title 58.

4 To effectively manage the wildlife
5 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game
6 Commission, at its October 3, 2006 meeting,
7 proposed the following changes:

8 Amend Chapter 135, by adding Subchapter L 9 (relating to license for rights-of-way to 10 establish regulations governing the granting of 11 rights-of-way licenses on Commission owned lands 12 and water.

13 The Executive Director and staff
14 recommend final adoption of these amendments to
15 Title 58 as shown on Exhibit F.

16 PRESIDENT BOOP: You heard the reading.
17 This item appears as pages 27, 28 and 29.

18 Is there a motion to approve?

19 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: So moved.

20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.

21 Is there a second?

22 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second.

23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

24 Is there discussion or debate?

25 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Mr. President.

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1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner 2 Palone. 3 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Just to let folks 4 know that we wanted to make a change on page 28. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: We do have a preprinted 6 page. It appears. 7 Are you offering that as an amendment, 8 Commissioner Palone? 9 COMMISSIONER PALONE: I'm not sure if 10 it's an amendment or just a replacement page. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: I believe the white 12 pages are amendments and the blue are 13 replacements; is that correct, Mr. Palmer? 14 MR. PALMER: Yes, Mr. President. 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Well, I'd like to move 16 to amend §135.223 on page 28 relating to the 17 application process and application and processing 18 fee. 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner 20 Palone. 21 Is there a second to the amendment? 22 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second.

23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.
24 Mr. Palmer, would you just very briefly
25 explain the purpose of the amendment?

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- 25 -1 MR. PALMER: The amendment in here was 2 the result of some feedback, basically, just to clean up the language and clarify it a little bit 3 more than as originally published. No substantial 4 5 changes to it. 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: It's a housekeeping item? 7 8 MR. PALMER: Yes. 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there any further discussion or debate on the amendment? 10 11 (No response.) 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: So we're voting on the 13 amendment. 14 All those in favor of Commissioner 15 Palone's amendment indicate by saying aye. 16 (Signified aye.) 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 18 (No response.) COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 19 20 President. PRESIDENT BOOP: And then the main motion 21 22 is now amended. All those in favor of the 23 original motion, as amended, indicate by saying 24 aye. 25 (Signified aye.)

1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 2 (No response.) 3 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 4 President. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: The motion as amended 6 has been adopted. 7 Moving to page 30. 8 MR. POUSS: Mr. President, the item on 9 page 30 relates to adoption of proposed amendments to §§135.41 and 135.181 of Title 58. 10 11 To effectively manage the wildlife 12 resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission, at its October 3, 2006 meeting, 13 14 proposed the following changes: 15 Amend §§135.41 (relating to state game 16 lands) and 135.181 (relating to rifle and handgun 17 ranges) to specifically authorize clay bird 18 shooting activities on Commission owned lands, but 19 only in those areas designated by the Director. 20 The Executive Director and staff 21 recommend final adoption of these amendments to 58 22 Pa. Code, as shown on Exhibit G, which is on page 23 31, of your agenda. 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading

of the action item which appears on page 31. You

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1 see the recommendation of Executive Director and 2 staff. 3 Is there a motion to adopt? 4 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commission Isabella. 5 6 Is there a second? COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Second. 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden. 8 9 Is there any discussion on the motion? 10 (No response.) 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 12 in favor indicate by saying aye. 13 (Signified aye.) 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 15 (No response.) 16 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 17 President. 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Hill and 19 Schreffler, you're with us out there? 20 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: I said aye. 21 COMMISSIONER HILL: Good morning, Mr. 22 President. 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Just hadn't heard from 24 that side. We used to hear from that side all the 25 time.

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1 COMMISSIONER HILL: You don't want us to 2 start.

3 PRESIDENT BOOP: A little levity never 4 hurts.

5 We're now moving to page 32 of the 6 agenda. We're going from adopted rule making now 7 to proposed rule making. We're starting on page 8 32 of the agenda.

9 Mr. Pouss, we'll go back to you.

10 MR. POUSS: That item relates to amending 11 §131.6 of Title 58 of the Pennsylvania Code.

12 An issue that has proven perpetually problematic for the Commission has been the 13 14 exercise of police powers by wildlife conservation 15 officers. Section 901(a)(17) of the act (relating 16 to powers and duties of enforcement officers) 17 provides clear and broad police power authority to 18 wildlife conservation officers acting within the 19 scope of their employment.

20 Despite this broad authorization, 21 however, it is the general policy of the 22 Commission that the primary responsibility of the 23 wildlife conservation officers is the enforcement 24 of the Game and Wildlife Code and that all general 25 law enforcement duties shall remain the

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1 responsibility of the appropriate law enforcement 2 agencies empowered to conduct these activities. 3 In an effort to reduce legal challenges, 4 reduce potential civil liability and also provide 5 recognition to the importance of the relevant 6 competing interests on this issue, the Commission is proposing to amend 58 Pa. Code §131.6 to 7 8 redirect the extent and manner in which it 9 authorizes wildlife conservation officers to 10 engage in the administration of police powers. 11 The proposed amendments and they are on 12 pages 32, 33, 34, and 35, the Executive Director 13 and staff recommend that the Commission approve 14 these changes. 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: We have the action item 16 before us. We've heard the reading. We have the 17 recommendation. 18 Is there a motion to adopt? 19 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 21 Is there a second? 22 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Second. 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler. 24 Thank you.

25 Is there debate or discussion on the

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1 motion? 2 (No response.) 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 4 in favor indicate by saying aye. 5 (Signified aye.) 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 7 (No response.) 8 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 9 President. 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 11 Secretary. 12 Moving to page 36. 13 MR. POUSS: The item on pages 36 and 37 relates to amending §§141.63 and 141.66 of Title 14 15 58 of the Pennsylvania Code. 16 Regulations concerning the use of cable 17 restraint devices were first proposed at the 18 Commission's October 5, 2004 meeting and were 19 finally adopted at its January 25, 2005 meeting. 20 These regulations essentially define the nature of 21 the device, the manner of its use, as well as the 22 time period for its use. Upon final completion of 23 the 2005-2006 furtaking season, staff conducted a 24 survey of all certified cable restraint users to assess use, efficiency, selectivity and capture 25

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1 related injuries or mortalities.

2 Based upon the results of these post 3 season surveys, staff recommends the following 4 amendments to 58 Pa. Code, §141.63: one, permit 5 the use of one by 19 cable which recent trap 6 testing data now supports; two, extend the cable length by one foot to allow for cable restraints 7 to be set legally in a variety of winter snow 8 9 conditions; three, more clearly define relaxing-10 type lock to reduce confusion for trappers 11 purchasing commercially available devices; and 12 four, increase the weight rating of the breakaway device to improve efficiency and effectiveness of 13 14 these devices when large covotes are captured. 15 It has come to the attention of the 16 Commission that 58 Pa. Code \$141.66 overly 17 restricts the classes of persons that are eligible 18 to be certified through the Commission's cable 19 restraint training course in apparent 20 contravention of certain statutory exemptions 21 found in sections 2706 (relating to resident 22 license and fee exemptions) and 2363 (relating to 23 trapping exception for certain persons) of the 24 act.

In an effort to permit those individuals

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1 who are permitted to trap without license to more 2 fully enjoy their privilege by being eligible to 3 participate in the Commission's cable restraint 4 training course, the Commission is proposing the 5 amendment to 58 Pa. Code \$141.66.

6 The prosed amendments are on pages 36 and 7 37.

The Executive Director and staff 8 9 recommend the Commission approve these changes. 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: With respect to this 11 action item, we do have the replacement page, 12 which I realize not everyone in the audience may have, but I think all the Commissioners have it. 13 14 Dr. Lovallo is present in the audience and he made 15 a presentation on this yesterday for those of you 16 who were here and all the Commissioners did hear 17 that presentation.

18 So with respect to those action items 19 concerning cable restraints is there a motion? 20 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: So moved.

21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler.

22 Is there a second?

23 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second.

24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

25 Is there discussion or debate on the

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1 motion? 2 (No response.) 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 4 in favor indicate by saying aye. 5 (Signified aye.) 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 7 (No response.) 8 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 9 President. 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 11 Secretary. 12 We're now moving to the item on page 38 13 of the agenda. 14 MR. POUSS: Which relates to amending 15 \$141.4 of Title 58 of the Pennsylvania Code. 16 In recent years, there has been interest 17 among hunters to expand legal hunting hours to 18 include the one-half hour period after sunset 19 (evening civil twilight). While the Commission is 20 always looking for appropriate ways to increase 21 hunting opportunity for sporting men and women, 22 the Commission recognizes its responsibility to do 23 so with caution. 24 It is without controversy that the safety

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25 of persons engaged in the activity of hunting, as

1 well a those persons who may be in the vicinity of 2 persons engaged in the activity of hunting, is a 3 paramount concern of the Commission. Due to the 4 rapidly decreasing levels of light during the 5 half-hour period after sunset, staff has 6 determined that permissive hunting occurring 7 during this period has the substantial likelihood 8 of increasing safety hazards associated with 9 hunting activities.

10 Another important factor considered by 11 staff is the likelihood that an expansion of legal 12 hunting hours to include the half-hour period 13 after sunset will create inconsistency in hunting 14 hours for migratory and non-migratory game species 15 due to the Commission's inability to set legal 16 hunting hours for migratory game species outside 17 of the thresholds set by federal regulation.

18 This inconsistency would have the 19 greatest impact on hunters that pursue migratory 20 game species and non-migratory game species at the 21 same time due to the different closing times, but 22 could also cause confusion for other hunters as 23 well.

24 Another factor to this issue is a recent 25 change in federal regulations expanding the

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1 thresholds of legal hunting hours to include the 2 half-hour period after sunset for resident Canada 3 goose hunting. Staff has determined that such an expansion during the September resident goose 4 season would be beneficial because it would 5 6 promote additional harvest of resident Canada 7 geese and assist the Commission in attaining its population goals for resident Canada geese. 8

9 As a result of the aforementioned 10 concerns, staff is opposed to a general extension 11 of legal hunting hours to include the half-hour 12 period after sunset, but is supportive of such an 13 extension that is limited to the September 14 resident Canada goose season. If the Commission 15 determines that either extension is appropriate, 16 staff recommends that the table of hunting hours 17 found within 58 Pa. Code §141.4 be replaced with a 18 sunrise/sunset table that will have cross 19 application to the differing legal hunting hour periods of the various game species. 20

21 The proposed amendments are on pages 39,22 40, 41.

23 And the Executive Director and staff
24 recommend the Commission only approve the
25 extension of legal hunting hours to include the

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1 half-hour period after sunset, as it pertains to 2 the September resident Canada goose season. 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: With respect to this 4 action item, the Commissioners do have a 5 replacement 39 in the booklet. 6 You've heard the reading. The action 7 item is before us and you've heard the recommendation of the Executive Director and 8 9 staff. Is there a motion to approve the item? 10 11 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. Is there a second? 13 14 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. 16 Is there discussion or debate on the 17 item? 18 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Yes, sir. 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler. 20 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: I have to 21 comment on this, because as a hunter I really want 22 this half-hour. It would be nice to have another half-hour. But as I sit here as a Commissioner, 23 24 in a position of responsibility, I have to look at 25 the wisdom of my years, I guess, and so on, and

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1 after a lot of consideration and research, I
2 really feel that a more responsible position is
3 necessary.

I think that safety has to be our paramount concern here. As I look at our population of hunters, we have an aging hunting population, and then I look at some of the research that says things like a hunter who is 60 years' old, his eye collects 67 percent less light than a hunter 20 years of age.

11 I look at the animals and I know from my 12 biological background that animals are made to be 13 camouflaged and reflect little light. This is a 14 period of day when there's little shadow and 15 things start to blend in. I see, as I talk to my 16 wife and friends and so on, who are getting up 17 there in years, they're in their sixties now or 18 fifties, that in low light conditions, and 19 research bears this out, that we concentrate more 20 on the object and see less in the areas 21 surrounding that and in the background.

Even with a telescopic sight the rifle is on, I still think that that peripheral vision is very important in the condition of what's in the back behind what you're shooting. I'm really

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1 concerned about this. I think that as much as we 2 all want this, we have to look at it in a 3 responsible way.

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4 I think it can be more easily handled 5 through a standard more operating procedure for 6 our conservation officers when they're out in the field, being a little more flexible sometimes in 7 this matter. As it pertains to the resident goose 8 9 season being a half-hour later, I consider that to 10 be under different conditions and purpose for 11 different biological purposes.

So, therefore, I encourage my fellowCommissioners to vote against this extension.

14 Thank you.

15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner 16 Schreffler for those comments.

17 Are there other Commissioners who wish to 18 discuss or debate the issue?

19 (No response.)

20 PRESIDENT BOOP: I also would like to 21 comment. I think my general philosophy is to 22 trust our sporting men and women who are out in 23 the field and to allow them to use their own good 24 judgment.

25 There's a couple things about this that

bother me. The first is that staff and the
 Executive Director are not recommending it.

3 The second thing that bothers me a little 4 bit about it is I view this a little bit in the 5 same way you can look at speeding laws. If the 6 speed limit is 55, the police officer will usually 7 give you 64 before he's going to cite you. I**′**m just afraid if we extend this a half-hour, if the 8 9 closing is 4:30, instead of having people shooting 10 at a quarter of five, we're going to have them 11 shooting at a quarter after five. So that bothers 12 me.

13 The final point is that the driving force I believe behind this is the interference that the 14 Fall muzzleloader and rifle season for deer has 15 16 had with our archery hunters, who have been the 17 most vocal in asking for this change. I think if 18 we eliminate it that unnecessary, in my opinion, 19 Fall muzzleloader and rifle season this issue 20 would go away.

Are there any other discussion?
 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: If there's no
 other discussion, I'd like to make an amendment.
 PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay.

25 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: I'd like to

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1 offer the amendment that this only includes the 2 extension of legal hunting hours one half-hour 3 after sunset and pertains to the September 4 resident goose season and not in a general ruling. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there a second to 6 Commissioner Schreffler's amendment? 7 (No response.) 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, the 9 amendment fails. 10 Is there any other motion to amend? 11 (No response.) 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: We're back to the main motion. The main motion is to extend for a half-13 14 an-hour as stated. 15 All those in favor indicate by saying 16 aye. 17 (Signified aye.) 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 19 (Commissioners Schreffler and Boop 20 signified nay.) 21 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Can we have a 22 show of hands? 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: All in favor indicate by 24 saying aye. Please raise your hands. 25 (Commissioners Hill, Schleiden, Palone

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1 and Isabella raise hands.)

2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed? 3 (Commissioners Schreffler and Boop 4 opposed.) 5 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Ayes are four. The nays are two, Mr. President. 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: The motion carries. 7 8 Moving to the next agenda item, which is 9 on page 42. Mr. Pouss. 10 MR. POUSS: Yes, Mr. President. 11 The next item relates to amending 12 §§141.41, 141.43 and 141.47 of Title 58. 13 The Commission has received a number of 14 requests from hunters to permit the lawful use of muzzleloading handguns to hunt various big game 15 16 animals. Currently, all muzzleloading handguns 17 are prohibited for use while hunting any big game 18 animals. The Commission has determined that use 19 of muzzleloading handguns would be reasonable so 20 long as their use is limited to deer, bear and elk 21 and to .50 caliber or larger firearms only. 22 The Commission has received a number of request from hunters to permit the lawful use and 23 possession of both a bow and arrow or crossbow and 24 a muzzleloading firearm during the overlaps of the 25

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early archery and muzzleloader seasons and the 1 2 late archery and flintlock muzzleloading seasons. 3 Currently, 58 Pa. Code §141.43 (relating 4 to deer) prohibits the possession of any firearm 5 while hunting during the early and late archery 6 seasons with a bow and arrow or crossbow. The 7 Commission has determined that the dual use and possession of both a bow and arrow or crossbow and 8 9 a muzzleloading firearm during the overlaps during 10 the early archery and muzzleloader seasons and the 11 late archery and flintlock muzzleloading seasons 12 would be permissible only to the extent that the 13 person is in possession of both a valid archery 14 license and valid muzzleloader license and meets 15 the greater protective material requirements for 16 the muzzleloader season, if applicable.

17 The Commission has also received requests 18 from certain hunters to permit the lawful use of 19 aperture or peep sights during the flintlock 20 muzzleloading season. Currently, 58 Pa. Code 21 §141.43 (relating to deer) prohibits the use of 22 aperture or peep sights during the flintlock 23 muzzleloading season.

24The Commission has determined that the25use of aperture or peep sights during the

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flintlock muzzleloading season would be 1 2 permissible since their use is consistent with 3 18th century technology and therefore would not 4 undermine the traditional nature of the flintlock 5 muzzleloading season. 6 You can see the proposed amendment on 7 pages 42 through 44 of your agenda. The Executive Director and staff 8 9 recommend the Commission approve these changes. 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading 11 of the action item, which is before us. 12 Is there a motion to approve? 13 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 15 Is there a second? 16 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. 18 Is there debate or discussion on the 19 item? 20 Commissioner Schreffler. 21 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Yes. As I had 22 previously done, I would like to offer an 23 amendment to exclude muzzleloader handguns from 24 this proposal. My feeling that these handguns 25 have more from effectiveness as I look at the

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1 information that's been supplied to me by our 2 staff. 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: We have heard the proposed amendment. Is there a second to the 4 5 proposed amendment? 6 (No response.) 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none the amendment fails. 8 9 Is there further discussion or additional motions to amend? 10 11 (No response.) 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we're 13 voting on the main motion. All those in favor 14 indicate by saying aye. 15 (Signified aye.) 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 17 (Commissioner Schreffler opposes.) 18 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Ayes five, nays 19 one. PRESIDENT BOOP: The matter passes and we 20 21 move to the next agenda item, which is on page 45. 22 MR. POUSS: It relates to the amending of \$141.20 of 58 Pa. Code. 23 24 The Commission has received a number of 25 calls from hunters regarding protective material

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1 requirements for hunters hunting from artificial 2 or manufactured blinds during the deer, elk or 3 bear seasons. These hunters have pointed out that 4 there is a conceptual conflict in requiring 5 hunters to wear protective material inside a blind 6 where its visual effectiveness is severely 7 diminished.

8 These hunters have requested the ability 9 to post protective material outside the blind, 10 where it is more ready observable, in lieu of 11 wearing the required amount of protective material 12 on their person in the blind.

13 Since the posting of protective material outside of an artificial or manmade blind that 14 15 conceals movement from within is undeniably more 16 consistent with the safety interests involved, the 17 staff has determined that permitting hunters to 18 post a minimum of 100 square inches of protective 19 material within 15 feet from the blind in such a 20 manner that it is visible in a 360-degree arc is 21 acceptable.

22 The changes reflecting that can be seen23 on page 45 of the agenda.

24 The Executive Director and staff25 recommend the Commission approve this change.

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1 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the 2 reading. The agenda item is before the Board. Is there a motion? 3 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: So moved. 4 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler. 6 Is there a second? 7 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 8 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Debate or discussion on 10 the motion? 11 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Mr. President. 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes. We recognize Commissioner Isabella. 13 14 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Thank you. 15 Rich, just want to get it on the record, 16 because I know there's going to be just a little 17 bit of confusion. A lot of these blinds have 18 orange built in where you can unzip it and pull 19 out like an orange streamer. I think they are over the 100 square inches; is that permissible? 20 21 MR. PALMER: As long as it would be 22 visible with the 360-degree arc, yes. 23 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Because a lot 24 of these blinds you get them on four sides, orange 25 protrudes out.

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- 47 -1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Any other discussion or 2 debate on the motion which is on the floor? 3 (No response.) 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all those in 5 favor indicate by saying aye. 6 (Signified aye.) PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 7 8 (No response.) 9 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. President. 10 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 12 Secretary. 13 Moving now to page 46 of the agenda. 14 MR. POUSS: Relates to amending §147.674 15 of 58 Pa. Code. 16 Since the implementation of the DMAP 17 program in 2003, harvest permit fees for residents 18 and nonresidents have remained unchanged. 19 However, operating costs throughout the agency have increased significantly, especially since the 20 21 last license fee increase that occurred in 1999. 22 Given the added recreational opportunities that 23 DMAP harvest permits offer and the nominal cost currently associated with them, an increase in 24 25 permit fees is being proposed to better represent

- 48 -1 the value of the privilege and improve funding for 2 the management of wildlife resources. The Executive Director and staff 3 4 recommend the Commission approve this change. PRESIDENT BOOP: You heard the reading. 5 6 The item is before you on page 46. We have the recommendation of the Director and staff. 7 Is there a motion? 8 9 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: So moved. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden. 10 11 Is there a second? 12 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 13 Is there debate or discussion on the 14 15 motion? 16 (No response.) 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 18 in favor indicate by saying aye. 19 (Signified aye.) 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 21 (No response.) 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: So that's unanimous, Mr. 23 Secretary. 24 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 25 President.

PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to page 47.
 MR. POUSS: Mr. President, the item on
 page 47 relates to amending \$143.243 of 58 Pa.
 Code.

5 There are many administrative realities 6 that must be addressed in implementing the deer hunting provisions of the Mentored Youth Hunting 7 8 Program regulation adopted last year. After 9 considerable staff discussion about implementing 10 procedures and the issues of accurate harvest 11 assessment, the potential population impacts of 12 additional legal and illegal harvest of antlered 13 deer not subject to antler restrictions, and the 14 potential implications to our hunting heritage 15 traditions, we feel we must ask this Board to 16 withdraw its plan to allow the taking of antlered 17 deer by mentored youths in the 2007-2008 hunting 18 license year.

We simply need more time to consider alternatives and the potential benefits and costs to the agency, the resource and the citizens of the Commonwealth. This action would be accomplished by amending 58 Pa. Code \$143.243 as shown below.

2 The Executive Director and staff 3 recommend the Commission approve this change. 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: You have heard the 5 reading. You see the recommendation. 6 Is there a motion for this amendment? 7 (No response.) 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, the motion 9 to amend fails. I just would like to make a brief comment 10 11 and I don't necessarily speak for all the 12 Commissioners and any Commissioner who is here can 13 add to what I'm about to say. 14 I think this Board feels that we've made 15 a commitment to the youth of Pennsylvania last 16 year. We realize the difficulty that this may 17 cause for staff, but we simply feel this is 18 something that we need to do. We are simply 19 asking staff to work with us to accomplish this. 20 Do any Commissioner want to add to those 21 comments? 22 (No response.) 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: We move to the next item, page 48. 24 25 MR. POUSS: Mr. President, that item

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relates to amending \$137.2 of Title 58 of
 Pennsylvania Code.

3 Wild boar, Russian boar or feral hog all 4 refer to a breed of pigs that are believed to have 5 been brought into this state by hunting preserves. 6 Many of these feral hogs have either escaped or been intentionally released into the wild where 7 8 evidence suggest that they are successfully 9 reproducing. The Commission's participation in 10 Pennsylvania's Invasive Species Council has 11 resulted in a collaborative determination that 12 feral hogs are an invasive species that must be 13 eliminated and kept out of the wild.

14 Feral hogs are known to pose a number of 15 threats to the health, safety and welfare of 16 wildlife, wildlife habitat, private property, 17 humans and Pennsylvania's agricultural industry. 18 The Commission is currently taking a number of 19 steps to help combat this growing problem, but it 20 recognizes that eliminating feral hogs from the 21 wild cannot be successful if their continued 22 release into the wild is not restricted. 23 Therefore, the Commission is proposing to amend 58 24 Pa. Code §137.2 to prohibit the release of any 25 feral hogs into the wild.

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1 You can see the proposed amendment on 2 page 48 of the agenda. 3 The Executive Director and staff 4 recommend the Commission approve this change. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading 6 of the action item which is before you. Is there a motion? 7 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Motion. 8 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. Is there a second? 10 11 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Second. 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there discussion or debate on the motion? 13 14 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President? 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner 16 Schleiden. 17 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Yes, while I 18 obviously support the concept of what we're trying 19 to accomplish here, I'm a little concerned about it on Item (b) where we're referencing domestic. 20 21 I just think that maybe we might have a problem 22 there and I'm not certain it might be even a 23 conflict with PDA on this and, therefore, I'll be 24 abstaining from this vote. 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Are there other

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1 Commissioners who wish to debate or comment on the 2 motion?

This is proposed rule making. The motion 3 is before us. If it's adopted, we will have an 4 5 opportunity for comment and together a consensus 6 before final adoption. As someone with a farm 7 background, I do share some of Commissioner 8 Schleiden's concerns, but I think that we'll adopt 9 it and we'll continue to review the matter until 10 April, if the vote is in favor. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: All those in favor 12 indicate by saying aye. 13 (Signified aye.) 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 15 (Commissioner Isabella voted nay.) 16 (Commissioner Schleiden abstains.) 17 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Can we just have 18 a show of hands? 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: All those in favor 20 indicate by raising their right hand. 21 (Commissioners Boop, Palone, Schreffler, 22 and Hill raise hands.) 23 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Nay. 24 (Commissioner Isabella raises hand.) 25 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Four ayes, one

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1 nay and one abstention.

PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr.
 Secretary.

I appreciate your comment on that matter,
Mr. Schleiden, and we recognize your expertise in
this area.

7 Moving now to Item No. 49, which is8 before us on both page 49 and 50.

9 I believe everyone has this before them, 10 Mr. Pouss. I know this is a lot of reading for 11 you. If you want to paraphrase a little bit I'm 12 sure we'll all bear with you.

MR. POUSS: To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth and provide hunting and trapping opportunities in the Commonwealth during the upcoming license year, the Commission is proposing to amend 58 Pa. Code \$139.4 to provide updated seasons and bag limits for the 2007-2008 license year.

Although 2007-2008 seasons and daily season and possession limits are similar to those in 2006-2007, the 2007-2008 seasons and bag limits have been amended to conform to current available scientific date, population and harvest records, field surveys and professional staff observations, 1 as well as recommendations received from the 2 staff, organized sporting groups, members of the 3 agricultural community and others interested in 4 the wildlife resources of the Commonwealth.

5 For small game seasons, staff recommends 6 expanding either sex pheasant hunting to include 7 WMUs 5C and 5D given the proportion of land in 8 non-pheasant habitat, the rate of land conversion 9 and little change for reversing the trend in any 10 significant way in these two WMUs.

Also, given the diminished status of wild quail populations, we do not recommend changes in bobwhite season length or hunt areas until we have a bobwhite quail management plan completed. At that time proposals to expand quail hunting or close it statewide will be considered.

17 Fall, either sex turkey harvest can 18 substantially influence turkey population trends, 19 which we control by hunting season length. The 20 wild turkey management plan outlines decision 21 criteria for setting fall turkey season lengths. 22 Based on these criteria and turkey population and 23 harvest index trends, it is proposed that the fall 24 season in three WMUs (2A, 2F and 2G) be reduced on 25 week and the existing fall turkey seasons

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1 maintained for the 2007 fall seasons.

Staff also proposes extending the 2008 spring gobbler season an additional day to allow hunters to take advantage of the entire Memorial Day holiday weekend.

6 This proposal also includes expanded deer hunting seasons in WMU's 2B, 5C and 5D, our most 7 8 developed areas in the state. The Commission's 9 "Plan to reduce deer-human conflicts in developed 10 areas" calls for expanding archery seasons in WMUs 11 2B, 5C and 5D to reduce deer populations and deer-12 human conflicts. A mid-September archery season opener is proposed for these WMUs along with the 13 14 additional taking opportunities in December 15 through the end of January 2008.

16 The elk hunting season's proposal 17 recommends expanding the September hunt from one 18 to four weeks. Given the small area (only Hunt 19 Zone 1), the amount of private property and 20 limited hunter access to property, and the 21 continuing elk-human conflicts this more flexible 22 season will allow hunters greater opportunity to 23 take elk impacting farmers, provide bull hunting 24 opportunity coinciding with the rut, allow hunters 25 a greater opportunity to choose a cow if the

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1 opportunity presents itself, and keeps hunters in 2 a defined area away from easily accessible public 3 lands.

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4 Finally, for furbearers, proposals 5 recommend closing several seasons on Sundays (e.g. 6 mink) that were previously closing on Saturdays to expand recreational opportunities, and add WMU 2A 7 to the bobcat hunt/trap area. As the next license 8 9 year is approaching, the Commission is proposing 10 to amend §139.4 to provide updated seasons and bag 11 limits for the 2007-2008 seasons.

12 The Executive Director and staff 13 recommend the Commission approve the proposed 14 2007-2008 hunting seasons and bag limits amendment 15 as shown on pages 51 through 58 of your agenda.

16 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading 17 of the item. With the consent and approval of the 18 rest of the Board, what I would propose doing is 19 what we've done in the past is we do these on a 20 page by page basis. I think it would make it 21 easier and we can proceed in a more logical 22 fashion.

23 So unless there's an objection to that 24 procedure, we'll turn to page 51.

25 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President,

1 may I suggest that we make a motion and a second 2 and then under discussion go page by page so we 3 can just do those as an amendment? 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: That's an acceptable 5 alternative, yes. 6 So let's do that then. We'll have an 7 overall motion for seasons and bag limits. Is there a motion to adopt? 8 9 COMMISSIONER PALONE: So moved. 10 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone, and 12 Commissioner Isabella a second; is that acceptable 13 to the two of you? 14 (Indicates yes.) 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay, so now we'll go to 16 discussion and we'll go page by page as was 17 suggested by Commissioner Schleiden. 18 Page 51. This is generally looking at 19 what's considered to be small game. Is there 20 discussion or debate on page 51? 21 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President. 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, the Chair would 23 recognize Commissioner Schleiden. 24 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Yes, sir. Under 25 squirrels (combined species) the last date, which

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- 59 -1 is now stated December 26 to February 2, I would 2 like to offer the amendment on that to read 3 February 9. 4 And then under rabbits, Cottontail below, 5 same dates December 26 to February 2, changed 6 February 2 to February 9. 7 That's my amendment. PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard 8 9 Commissioner Schleiden's amendment which would 10 generally extend the late small game season for 11 squirrel and rabbit for one week, is there a 12 second to that amendment? 13 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 15 You've heard the amendment and the second 16 to the amendment. 17 Is there discussion or debate on the 18 amendment? 19 (No response.) 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those 21 in favor of the amendment on page 51 as stated 22 please indicate by saying aye. 23 (Signified aye.) 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 25 (No response.)

1 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 2 President. 3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 4 Secretary. 5 Moving to page 52. This is primarily for 6 pheasants, quail, hares and woodchucks. It is 7 before you. 8 Is there any discussion or debate with 9 respect to page 52? 10 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair would 12 recognize Commissioner Schleiden. 13 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Under the title 14 species Ringneck pheasant at the bottom we have 15 the same dates, December 26, February 2. My 16 amendment is to change February 2 to February 9, 17 to be consistent with small game. 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the 19 amendment. 20 Is there a second to the amendment? 21 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 23 Is there discussion on the amendment? 24 (No response.) 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair would just

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- 61 comment with respect to Commissioner Schleiden's 1 2 amendment. None of the Management Units that 3 would be so affected with respect to the February extension for pheasants are either of the 4 5 Management Units where we have the restoration 6 effort ongoing in Commissioner Palone and my 7 areas. 8 You've heard the motion to amend and the 9 second. All those in favor of the amendment 10 11 indicate by saying aye. 12 (Signified aye.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 14 (No response.) 15 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 16 President. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 18 Secretary. 19 We move now to page 53, which is 20 generally the provisions with respect to turkeys 21 and migratory birds. 22 Is there discussion or debate with respect to page 53. 23 24 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President. 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair would

1 recognize Commissioner Schleiden.

25

2 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: I have an amendment to offer the third line down Wildlife 3 Management Units 2C, 2E, 4A and 4B that would stay 4 the same. What I've done is removed 2G and 4D and 5 6 moved them down to the next line Wildlife 7 Management Units 2D, 2G, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 4C, 4D 8 and 4E. 9 So I've added 2G and 4D to October 27 to 10 November 17. 11 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the 12 amendment, which if I understand it would in 2G 13 and 4D extend the fall turkey season by one week. 14 Is there a second to the amendment? 15 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 17 Is there discussion or debate on the 18 amendment? 19 (No response.) 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: I would like to comment, 21 2G and 4D are also in the regions of the state 22 that I represent as a Commissioner. As I've said 23 earlier today and on previous occasions, I don't 24 like to go against staff recommendation, but these

are in the areas where we are having so much

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1 difficulty with camps being closed and hunters not 2 having opportunity for other big game species, so 3 I am inclined to support Commissioner Schleiden's 4 amendment for that reason.

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5 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President, 6 my reasoning for the 2G, 4D was that I noticed in 7 our report yesterday that we started in 1995 and 8 drew a straight line across the 2006, you'll find 9 that the three-week season had apparently no 10 effect on the increase of the flock or the 11 decrease of the flock.

12 That's my reasoning for that, although I 13 respect your reasoning as well.

In 4D, I noticed also that the spring harvest had increased, even though it appeared that the population by the summer count was somewhat below the peak of several years ago. But I'm also aware that we're short of a lot of people out in the field to do the count and that's how we do the summer count.

21 That's the reasoning for my amendment.
22 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the
23 amendment and the second. You've heard the
24 discussion.

25 Is there any additional discussion or

1 comment by any of the other Commissioners before 2 we vote? 3 (No response.) 4 PRESIDENT BOOP: Voting on the amendment. All those in favor of the amendment 5 6 indicate by saying aye. 7 (Signified aye.) 8 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 9 (No response.) 10 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 11 President. 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you. 13 We turn page 54 of the agenda, a variety 14 of species listed there. 15 Is there any discussion or debate with 16 respect to any of the proposed seasons and bag 17 limits as set forth on page 54? 18 (No response.) 19 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, is there a 20 motion to approve? 21 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 22 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Is there a second? 24 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Properly and moved and

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1 seconded.

2 Any discussion? 3 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Yes, sir. I 4 don't believe it's necessary unless there's an 5 amendment on a page to approve the page. 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay, it's part of the 7 general motion. Point well taken. Point of order appreciated by the Chair. 8 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to page 55. 10 You see what's set forth on page 55. Any 11 discussion or debate with respect to page 55? 12 (No response.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: With respect to page 55, I would like to offer an amendment. It will be 14 15 the first of two amendments that I'll make with 16 respect to this page. 17 The October muzzleloader and rifle 18 season, as I can determine from the research I 19 have done was a temporary measure designed to 20 address a situation and it was never intended, 21 from the literature, to become a permanent season. 22 This early muzzleloader rifle season, as 23 the testimony and the letters and the e-mails that 24 I have received, interfered with our regular 25 archery season and with deer numbers in many areas

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of the state at a historic low, I see no
 scientific or biological justification for this
 season continuing.

I would move the amendment to strike this
season from the seasons and bag limit proposal for
'07/08. That would be my amendment.

7 That amendment appearing to fail, my 8 second amendment has to do with the two-week 9 concurrent rifle season that starts on the twenty-10 sixth and runs till December 8. I don't need to 11 give you the background. I think everyone in this 12 room is aware.

Hunter dissatisfaction. Hunters are a major stakeholder group that this agency is supposed to represent is at an all-time high, as high as 90 percent in many areas of the state. Deer numbers appear to be at least at a 50-year low in most areas of the state.

Any adjustments that we need to make with respect to the size of the deer herd can certainly be made by the allocation process that we will do in April. I can see, based on where I sit, no scientific or biological justification for a twoweek statewide season.

25 So I am moving that the concurrent season

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1 be limited to the second week of the season in all 2 Management Units except for 2B, 5C and 5D, which 3 result in a statewide one-week buck season and a 4 second week of buck and a concurrent doe season 5 for six days.

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6 We have our license increase stalled in 7 the legislature for two years with no hope of it 8 moving forward unless we make changes. I think 9 it's irresponsible not to make changes in light of 10 current circumstances.

11 So that is my amendment.

12 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: All that's your 13 amendment, sir, or is that your comment?

14 PRESIDENT BOOP: My comment and my 15 amendment.

16 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President.
17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Are you seconding my
18 motion?

19 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: No, sir. I
20 wanted to ask.

21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, sir, let's see if 22 there's a second first, then you can comment. 23 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Well, I think 24 you made your comment with the amendment, sir. 25 May I make a comment without giving you a second? 1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Sure.

2 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Thank you, sir.
3 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: I have before me
4 an issue of a book called "Game News".

5 PRESIDENT BOOP: I've seen it.

6 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: This one is
7 September of 1950. It's special issue Number 1.

8 My comment on this would be, I'd like to 9 read to you, and remember, this was 1950, and it 10 was a book, a special edition written by a guy by 11 the name of Roger Latham.

12 I'm not going to read the entire 13 introduction, but I think it speaks to your 14 comments and concerns of our sportsmen, who I have 15 a great deal of respect for.

16 I read as follows: "Probably the most 17 formidable problem which has confronted the Game 18 Commission during the past 30 years," now, 19 remember, this was written in 1950, "the past 30 20 years and one which has serious hampered 21 scientific management (seriously hampered 22 scientific management) has been the opposition of 23 well-meaning (and I repeat well-meaning) but 24 uninformed deer hunters.

25 "This lack of confidence in the ability

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of the Commission and its trained personnel to
 formulate and carry out sound management practices
 has created an undesirable relationship between
 the hunter and the Game Commission.

5 "Even more important, this act of 6 opposition has endangered the future of this sport 7 in Pennsylvania."

8 I've read this and many other articles 9 and it's probably why I've been steadfast in 10 supporting our staff and this particular issue, 11 and I do know that they have made adjustments 12 through the allocations. They explained that they 13 were going to do that.

14 Therefore, I don't consider my support of 15 that being irresponsible. I recognize that the 16 legislature has been involved in this and I 17 respect the individuals down there when they have 18 to react to the constituents, but I think that 19 this is an issue that really needs to be decided 20 by the Board, the staff, along with the input of 21 our sportsmen.

22 Thank you, sir. That's my comment.
23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Well, I don't think this
24 is the appropriate forum maybe to get into an
25 ongoing debate this morning. We respect each

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1 other's views. We respectfully disagree. I'm a 2 business person. Everything in life is a 3 pendulum. This pendulum had swung too far at one point. It's obviously, in my opinion, swung too 4 5 far the other way. 6 All we're asking is that we make some 7 adjustments to accommodate what's going on, on the ground. Come hunt with me on public land, any one 8 9 of you. I did for five days this past season. 10 Conditions are deplorable. 11 Is there a second to my amendment? 12 (No response.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, we don't need to 14 vote on 55. We're moving to 56. 15 This is generally bear, elk and beaver. 16 I believe with respect to bear we were to have a 17 replacement page. Acting Director Palmer, that's being 18 19 passed out. Acting Director Palmer, would you 20 just please explain the replacement page and how 21 it relates to bear? 22 MR. PALMER: The replacement page 23 reflects what was presented yesterday by Mark 24 Fernak (ph) what his concerns over Unit 3D and 25 changing the seasons allocation there.

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- 71 -1 There is one mistake here though. The 2 line above it still needs 3D removed from it. PRESIDENT BOOP: Okay, so just we'll 3 strike that. So in effect then we're going to, in 4 3D the extended bear season will be Wednesday 5 6 through Saturday; is that correct, Director Roe? EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROE: That's correct. 7 November 28 to December 1. 8 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: We have the replacement 10 page. With the replacement is there discussion or 11 debate on page 56? 12 (No response.) 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, I don't think we 14 need to take any action on 56. It will be part of 15 the general motion. 16 Then we go to page 57. With respect to 17 page 57, is there discussion or debate with respect to page 57? 18 19 (No response.) 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, we'll go 21 to page 58. 22 Acting Director Palmer, with respect to 23 the floor amendment, I believe in light of the 24 earlier action that that will not be necessary? 25 MR. PALMER: It will be.

1 PRESIDENT BOOP: It will be necessary, 2 okay. 3 MR. PALMER: On footnote items three and 4 seven. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Could you just briefly 6 explain that to us? 7 MR. PALMER: As a result of the proposal for the hunting hours that passed, we would 8 9 recommend that also footnotes No. 3 and seven, on 10 page 58, be changed to reflect the proposal that 11 is moving forward for final adoption so that they 12 can proceed together. 13 PRESIDENT BOOP: Very good, thank you. 14 In light of that explanation, do I hear a motion for the floor amendment as presented on the 15 16 white handout we have? 17 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: So moved. 18 PRESIDENT BOOP: Mr. Schleiden. 19 Is there a second? 20 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 21 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 22 Is there any discussion or debate on the 23 amendment? 24 (No response.) 25 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all those

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1 in favor indicate by saying aye.

2 (Signified aye.)

3 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.

4 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr.
5 President.

6 PRESIDENT BOOP: That completes, I 7 believe, the individual review of the pages for 8 seasons and bag limits.

9 I think that takes us back to the overall 10 motion which was made and seconded, various pages 11 have been duly amended. So what we would be doing 12 at this point would be voting on the overall 13 seasons and bag limits as the individual pages may 14 or may not have been amended in the course of our 15 business here this morning.

16 So is there any additional discussion or 17 debate on the overall season and bag limit action 18 item? This is proposed rule making. It will be 19 finally adopted in April.

20 (No response.)

21 PRESIDENT BOOP: All those in favor
22 indicate by saying aye.

23 (Signified aye.)

24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign.

25 (Commissioner Boop opposed.)

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1 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Ayes five, nays
2 one.

3 PRESIDENT BOOP: I think the next, while 4 Acting Director Palmer is at the podium, the next 5 agenda item for members of the Commission. We do 6 have some revocation matters, which we have a 7 handout and, also, on page 59, I think we'll take 8 this item and then we'll take our morning break. 9 So, Mr. Pouss, if we could go to page 59, 10 please?

MR. POUSS: Okay. That item relates to hunting license revocation/convictions. Proposed recommendations to revoke the hunting and furtaking privileges of the individual convicted of violating the Game and Wildlife Code.

16 The Commission, under the authority of 17 the Game and Wildlife Code, may revoke any hunting 18 license and furtaker's license and deny any person 19 the right to secure a license or to hunt and furtake anywhere in the Commonwealth, with or 20 21 without a license, if said licensee or person has 22 been convicted or signed an acknowledgment of 23 violating the Game and Wildlife Code. The Commission may revoke such licenses for a period 24 25 not to exceed three years for the first offense,

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for a second or subsequent offense, for such
 period of time the Commission shall determine.

3 Persons denied the right to hunt or 4 furtake in the Commonwealth, through this action, 5 are notified by Certified Mail that the revocation 6 will commend July 1, 2007. The symbol "RA" means 7 the revocation was added to an existing 8 revocation.

9 In accordance with the Administrative 10 Agency Law, the person placed on revocation has 11 the opportunity for an Administrative Hearing 12 concerning the hunting license revocation. If an 13 Administrative Hearing is requested, a petition 14 for review must be filed at the Commission 15 Headquarters within 30 days from the date of 16 notice.

17 Unless deemed in the best interest of the 18 Commission by the Director or a designee, hearings 19 will be conducted at the central office. Hearings 20 are conducted in accordance with the General Rules 21 of Administrative Practice and Procedure and also 22 with Chapter 35 of the rules and Chapter 145 of 23 the Pennsylvania Code.

24 Recommendation: The Executive Director25 and Wildlife Protection Director recommend the

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1 Commission revoke the hunting and furtaking 2 license privileges of the persons named by the 3 Bureau of Wildlife Protection. Such revocation shall become effective July 1, 2007, and shall 4 5 continue for such period of time and under the 6 conditions set forth following each person's name. 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading 8 of the action item. I believe all Commissioners 9 in advance of the meeting received a list of the 10 individuals who are affected by this item. I 11 think there was a typographical matter involving 12 one name that Acting Director Palmer corrected, so I believe we have the information before the 13 14 Board. 15 Is there a motion to adopt? 16 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 18 Is there a second? 19 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Second. 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schreffler. 21 Any debate or discussion on the motion? 22 (No response.) 23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none, all in 24 favor indicate by saying aye. 25 (Indicates aye.)

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- 77 -1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 2 (No response.) 3 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 4 President. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Motion carried. 6 We're going to take our break for the 7 morning. We will come back at 10:20. I ask you 8 to be in your seats. I'd like to get started. 9 Hopefully, we'll be finished by noon. 10 I will proceed with the Bureau of 11 Habitat Management when we come back. 12 We're adjourned. 13 (Recess 9:55 A.M.) 14 (Reconvened 10:20 A.M.) 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: We're reconvening the 16 meeting. 17 I've mentioned a couple times about 18 replacement pages that were referred to. Those of 19 you who didn't already receive them, they're up 20 front here. Feel free to come up and get them 21 either now or during the course of the rest of the 22 morning. 23 We're moving to the Bureau of Wildlife 24 Habitat Management. The Chair is pleased to 25 recognize our Director William Capouillez, who is

1 here. Bill, if it's not Zimmerman or Martin, I
2 struggle a little bit with the names, so bear with
3 me.

4 Let's go to page 60 and if you'll read 5 the action item there for us?

6 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: The first item is an 7 option for 101 plus or minus acres of land in Plunketts Creek Township, Lycoming County. It 8 9 adjoins State Game Lands No. 134. There are no 10 new reservations on the property. There's an 11 option price of \$100,000 lump sum. The amount to 12 be paid from the Game Fund would be limited to 13 \$40,000.

14 The Executive Director and staff
15 recommend the option listed above be accepted and
16 the Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife
17 Habitat Management to proceed with the acquisition
18 of this tract.

19 PRESIDENT BOOP: There's a map on page 61
20 that depicts what we're talking about. You've
21 heard the reading of the item.

Is there a motion?

23 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: So moved.

24 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden.

25 Commissioner Isabella, will you second?

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1 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: It's properly moved and 3 seconded. 4 Is there any discussion on this action 5 item? 6 (No response.) 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: Hearing none all those 8 in favor indicate by saying aye. 9 (Indicates aye.) 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 11 (No response.) 12 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 13 President. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you. 15 We move to page 62. Again, Bill, if you 16 could do the reading for us? 17 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: The next two agenda 18 items were donations, the first being 1.10 plus or 19 minus acres of land in Jay Township, Elk County. 20 This is an indenture to State Game Lands No. 311 21 from James and Shirley Burke being offered to the 22 Commission as a donation. The donor accepts and reserves the same as what was accepted and 23 24 observed in prior deeds of record. This 25 particular tract provides additional access to

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1 that Game Lands.

2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Unless there's an
3 objection by the Board, I think we'll do them
4 together.

5 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: The second donation is 6 59 plus or minus acres of land in Pine Grove 7 Township in Schuylkill County. This is an indenture to State Game Lands No. 21. It's from 8 9 Jean Jones. It's being offered to the Commission 10 as a donation. The donor has placed a restriction 11 on the tract that it may not be sold or 12 transferred for a period of 25 years from the date 13 of the deed.

Both items the Executive Director and staff recommend the donations listed above be accepted and the Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat Management to proceed with the acquisition of these tracts.

PRESIDENT BOOP: Again, we have maps on pages 63 and 64 that depict the two options that we're considering for donation. Again, as I indicated, unless there's an objection, we'll vote on them collectively and as part of the same motion.

25 Is there a motion to accept?

1 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: So moved. 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Schleiden. 3 Again, Commissioner Isabella, will you 4 second? COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Second. 5 6 PRESIDENT BOOP: Properly moved and 7 seconded. 8 Is there discussion on the motion? 9 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: Mr. President. 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner 11 Schreffler. 12 COMMISSIONER SCHREFFLER: I'd just like to have it included in the record our thanks to 13 14 James and Shirley Burke and Jean Jones for these 15 donations. They're much appreciated. 16 PRESIDENT BOOP: Comment is well taken and you express, I'm sure, the sentiments of the 17 18 entire Board and of the agency. 19 Anyone else have a comment or discussion 20 item? 21 (No response.) 22 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all those in 23 favor of accepting these two donations indicate by 24 saying aye. 25 (Indicates aye.)

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1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 2 (No response.) 3 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 4 President. 5 PRESIDENT BOOP: Moving to page 65. 6 Bill, we're concerned that we're wearing 7 out your voice here with so much reading this morning so we decided to give you a little bit of 8 9 a break. Do you want to resume on page 65? 10 MR. POUSS: Thank you for the break and I 11 apologize for being late. 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: We understand. Not a 13 problem and, please, don't feel you were late. 14 Let's go to page 65. 15 MR. POUSS: That relates to underground 16 mining support lease/land exchange on State Game 17 Lands No. 179 in Greene County and State Game 18 Lands No. 245 in Washington County. 19 Consol Energy, Inc., of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, has requested a land lease exchange 20 21 to install two single ventilation air shafts, one 22 on a 25-acre portion of State Game Lanes No. 179 23 in Jackson Township, Greene County and the second on an approximately 15-acre portion of State Games 24 25 Lands No. 245 in Washington County, as shown on

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Exhibits OGM-1 and OGM-2, which are on pages 67
 and 68 of your agenda.

3 The Commission is not the owner of the 4 coal rights on these tracts of land and has 5 limited surface support rights.

6 Consol is currently conducting 7 underground coal mining operations under State 8 Game Lands No. 179 in Jackson Township, Greene 9 County, and State Game Lands No. 245 in East 10 Finley Township, Washington County, under the 11 Blacksville No. 2 and the Enlow Fork mines 12 respectively.

13 In order to efficiently recover coal 14 reserves and provide safe underground mine working 15 conditions, Consol Energy is required by 16 regulation to install ventilation air shafts. Consol Energy has identified a 25-acre portion of 17 18 State Game Lands No. 179, and a 15-acre portion of 19 State Games Lands No. 245 as suitable locations 20 for the purpose of installing the ventilation air 21 shafts and associated infrastructure.

The total proposed lease area is comprised of 40 acres; however, the actual surface area to be affected by construction of the air shafts will be no greater than 25 acres which

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1 includes access roads, power lines and erosion and 2 sediment controls. The larger lease area is 3 requested to provide flexibility to design, permit 4 and construct the ventilation shafts with regards 5 to underground mine conditions, as well as 6 engineering, permitting and environmental concerns 7 that may arise.

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8 Consol Energy will also pay the 9 Commission for any timber impacted as a result of 10 the project at double stumpage rate as determined 11 by the Commission's Southwest Region Forestry 12 staff. The Commission may elect to credit the 13 value of the second stumpage for future wildlife 14 habitat enhancement projects to be identified by 15 the region staff; however, under no circumstances 16 will the Commission receive less than single 17 stumpage value for any timber impacted as a result 18 of this project.

19 The anticipated life of the ventilation 20 air shafts is ten years. Upon completion of the 21 underground mining operations, the air shafts will 22 be removed and the sites restored to original 23 conditions through a reclamation plan as approved 24 by the Commission.

25 In exchange for the right to occupy and

1 affect 25 acres to construct the two ventilation 2 air shafts, Consol will convey to the Commission 3 three tracts of land totaling 235 acres located 4 adjacent to State Game Lands No. 245 in Morris 5 Township, Washington County, shown on OGM-3, which 6 is on page 69 of the agenda.

7 The land is characterized as hilly, consisting of either existing or previous 8 9 pastureland, approximately 60 acres of woodland, 10 and approximately 29 acres of riparian/wetland 11 The adjacent game land is heavily hunted area. 12 and very productive for wildlife with rabbit, 13 pheasant and squirrel hunting, as well as good 14 turkey or deer hunting. The addition of these 15 parcels valued at approximately \$1,000 per acre, 16 will improve upon the already excellent 17 characteristics.

18 The project will be regulated by the 19 Commonwealth's Underground and Surface Coal Mining 20 regulations and the Commission's standard lease 21 agreement. The ten-year lease will include the 22 standard \$10,000 performance bond for each 23 ventilation shaft and environmental protection 24 measures. In addition, the lease will include a 25 wildlife habitat reclamation and revegetation plan

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developed by the local Land Management Group
 Supervisor.

3 The staff has reviewed this proposal and 4 has determined the total value of the land 5 exchange is equal to or greater than the 6 accumulated value of the lease. The Executive Director and staff 7 8 recommend the proposed lease be approved and the 9 Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife 10 Habitat Management to proceed with the leasing 11 arrangement as listed above. 12 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. Pouss. 13 We have maps on pages 67, 68 and 69 of 14 the agenda to illustrate the item. 15 Is there an motion to adopt? 16 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella. 18 Is there second? 19 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second. 20 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone. 21 Is there any discussion or debate on the 22 motion on the floor? 23 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Mr. President. 24 PRESIDENT BOOP: The Chair would 25 recognize Commissioner Schleiden.

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COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: Thank you, sir. Bill, this looks like a very complicated deal. Are you, obviously, very pleased with it? Is this one of the projects that a former Commissioner worked on with you? Is this one of the ones?

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MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Yes, sir, former 7 Commissioner Fredericks is part of the Consol 8 9 Company. This entails nearly six to one ratio for 10 the use of our surface, for which, in fact, Consol 11 has legitimate rights to utilize to some degree 12 anyway with regard to previous reservations. So 13 this has been an extremely complex issue to 14 southwest region, particularly, Barry Zaffuto was 15 instrumental in getting this done, as well as some 16 of our partnerships with Consol.

17 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: I'd just like 18 the record to show thank you from the Chairman of 19 the Habitat Committee to you and to Barry and to 20 the people down in that area, southwest, and also 21 to the former Commissioner who has knowledge of 22 what we're all about.

23 I think worked very positive with you; is24 that correct, Dennis Fredericks?

25 MR. CAPOUILLEZ: Yes.

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- 88 -1 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner 2 Schleiden, for your appropriate comments 3 concerning the matter. 4 Are there any other comments or is there 5 any additional debate on the action item? 6 (No response.) 7 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all those in 8 favor indicate by saying aye. 9 (Indicates aye.) 10 PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 11 (No response.) 12 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 13 President. 14 PRESIDENT BOOP: We move then to page 70. 15 MR. POUSS: And I believe it's the final 16 published item in the agenda. 17 It's land exchange relating to State Game 18 Lands No. 223, in Greene County. 19 AMD Reclamation, Inc., of Needham, 20 Massachusetts, has requested a land exchange 21 involving a 3.8 acre portion of State Game Lands 22 223 and a temporary construction easement on an 23 additional 6.8 acres located in Dunkard Township, 24 Greene County, as shown on OGM-4, which is on page 25 71 of your agenda.

In exchange, AMDRI has offered a tract of
 land containing 40 acres adjacent to State Game
 Lands No. 223, also situate in Dunkard Township,
 Greene County. That's shown on OGM Exhibit 5,
 which is page 72 of your agenda. The proposed
 land transfer will include all surface mineable
 coals and associated mining rights.

AMDRI is a Pennsylvania nonprofit 8 9 corporation established to prevent the discharge 10 of acid mine drainage from abandoned mine pools 11 into surface waters. AMDRI is requesting this 12 land exchange to facilitate the expansion of its 13 existing acid mine drainage pumping and treatment 14 facility located at the Shannopin Mine Steele 15 Shaft site.

16 AMDRI plans to install a reverse osmosis treatment process and add a third clarifier to 17 18 provide capability to treat additional acid mine 19 drainage from existing abandoned mines and area 20 mine pools. The expanded pumping and treatment 21 capability will also potentially eliminate or 22 diminish several existing acid mine drainage discharges into Dunkard Creek. The treated water 23 24 may potentially provide a portion of the water 25 required for the proposed Longview Power Plant.

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1 The staff has reviewed this proposal and 2 determined it to be of equal or greater value for 3 the benefit of wildlife.

4 The Executive Director and staff 5 recommend this proposed land exchange be approved 6 and the Commission authorize the Bureau of 7 Wildlife Habitat Management to proceed with the 8 arrangement as listed above.

9 PRESIDENT BOOP: You've heard the reading 10 with respect to the final printed agenda item for 11 this morning.

12 Is there a motion?

13 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: So moved.

14 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Isabella.

15 Is there a second?

16 COMMISSIONER PALONE: Second.

17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Commissioner Palone.

18 Commissioner Palone, I would note this is 19 from your home county. Would you want to comment 20 at all on the item?

21 COMMISSIONER PALONE: I don't think so.
22 I just want thank Matt, who's here today, Barry.
23 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you.

24 Any additional comment, debate or

25 discussion on the item?

- 91 -1 (No response.) 2 PRESIDENT BOOP: If not, all those in 3 favor indicate by saying aye. 4 (Indicates aye.) PRESIDENT BOOP: Opposed same sign. 5 6 (No response.) COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Unanimous, Mr. 7 8 President. 9 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Mr. 10 Secretary. 11 We now turn to page 73 of the printed 12 agenda. We are at the place for other new 13 business. 14 Does any Commissioner have any other new 15 business? 16 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: Mr. President. 17 PRESIDENT BOOP: Yes, Commissioner 18 Isabella. 19 COMMISSIONER ISABELLA: I have new business in front of me. 20 21 I would like to request the Bureau of Wildlife Protection along with the Bureau of 22 Information and Education to research fluorescent 23 24 orange regulation during the spring gobbler season an option presented by the Pennsylvania Chapter of 25

I would indicate for all those 2 3 present, particularly members of the press, there were no decisions made, no votes taken. 4 The Commissioners simply needed a little time to 5 6 collect their thoughts in light of what occurred this morning. I want the Deer Team and the whole Commission to know that I am very pleased with the deer program and all the progress that has been made in deer management. I have worked diligently to be a trustee of our natural resources and I will continue in that role for as long as I have

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1 the privilege and honor to serve all the people of 2 the Commonwealth.

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3 As I see it, not being elected for president of the Commission pales in comparison to 4 being a trustee and a steward of our natural 5 6 resources. To put it in prospective, it's really 7 not the same as getting a terminal illness or losing a family member. To me, it's really not a 8 9 life altering experience. 10 My whole life I have taken the road less 11 traveled and to me, it leads to the future and to 12 the 21st Century. When I stand before our 13 creator, I want him to say, "Well done, my good 14 and faithful servant." 15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner

15 PRESIDENT BOOP: Thank you, Commissioner 16 Palone.

17 Do any other Commissioners want to make 18 any comment?

19 (No response.)

20 PRESIDENT BOOP: We are going to go over 21 to the training center after we adjourn. We will 22 have our normal press conference. Again, we did 23 not make any decisions when we were on the recess. 24 All six of us, I believe, take very 25 seriously our fiduciary responsibility. We want you to know we all like each other. We value our
 friendships. We work together and we will
 continue to do that in the upcoming year.

4 Different people have strong feelings and 5 strong opinions and every member of this Board 6 contributes. I don't think that you should view or necessarily draw an adverse conclusion from 7 8 what occurred here this morning. We will all do 9 our best to continue to work for the resource of 10 this Commonwealth, as we feel it's our fiduciary 11 responsibility and we all appreciate the 12 contributions of all the Commissioners.

13 Commissioner Palone, your comments are 14 well taken. I don't think that anyone is going to 15 find any of us making negative personal comments 16 about any of our fellow Commissioners.

17 I want to entertain a motion to adjourn.18 COMMISSIONER SCHLEIDEN: So moved.
