

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6 1 2 3 PROCEEDINGS 4 5 MR. ISABELLA: Welcome to the quarterly meeting of the 6 Pennsylvania Game Commission. And at this time, if 7 you have cell phones, please turn them off or put them 8 on vibrate. And at this time, I'd like to stand for 9 10 the Pledge of Allegiance. 11 PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE 12 MR. ISABELLA: 13 Mr. Secretary, roll call of 14 Commissioners. 15 MR. WEANER: Mr. President, all Commissioners are here 16 17 and accounted for. 18 MR. ISABELLA: 19 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. Now, can I 20 have a motion for the approval of the minutes of the 21 meeting held April 21st, 2009? 22 VOTE TAKEN 23 SHORT BREAK TAKEN 24 MR. ISABELLA: 25 I have a motion by Commissioner Boop.

7 Second? 1 2 MR. SCHREFFLER: 3 Second. MR. ISABELLA: 4 Seconded by Commissioner Schreffler. 5 All in favor of the minutes, please reply by saying aye. 6 AYES TAKEN 7 8 MR. ISABELLA: 4 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 5 Next? 6 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 7 The next item is the adoption of proposed amendments to section 135.103 relating to registration 8 for controlled goose hunting areas to permit persons 9 10 who have previously hunted a controlled goose hunting area to make application for unclaimed blinds on the 11 12 morning of the designated shooting day, but only where there exists an absence of applications for the 13 14 unclaimed blinds from persons who have not previously 15 hunted a controlled goose hunting area. The Executive 16 Director and Staff recommend final adoption of this 17 amendment to 58 PA Code as shown on Exhibit C on page 18 seven of your Agenda. 19 MR. ISABELLA: 20 Thank you, Brad. ISABELLA: 13 14 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 15 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 16 The next item also concerns the adoption of proposed amendments amending sections 141.47 and 17 18 147.701, relating to elk and general, removing section 19 141.49 relating to elk guide permits and adding 20 Chapter 147 subchapter Y relating to guiding permit to relocate, consolidate and more clearly define the 21 22 permitting process for persons interesting in guiding 23 other hunters or trappers for certain designated species. The Executive Director and Staff recommend 24 25 final adoption of these amendments to 58 PA Code as

12 shown on Exhibit D on page 11 of your Agenda. 1 2 MR. ISABELLA: 3 Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you have heard the reading of the commentary; is there a 4 motion? 5 6 MR. DELANEY: 7 So moved. 8 MR. ISABELLA: 9 Motion by Commissioner Delaney. Second? 10 MR. WEANER: 11 Second. 12 MR. ISABELLA: 13 Second by Commissioner Weaner. Any I have just something to say, Rich, the 14 discussion? 15 way I understand, it's just house cleaning? 16 MR. PALMER: 17 Yes, Mr. President. Primarily, what this 18 does is part of our overall effort to streamline the 19 regulations. This takes separate categories of guide 20 permits that were in separate locations to go and 21 consolidates them into one section as part of our 22 overall streamlining process. In addition to that, it 23 more clearly defines what activities actually 24 constitute guiding. 25 MR. ISABELLA:

Thank you, Rich. Any other discussion? 1 All in favor signify by saying Aye. 2 AYES TAKEN 3 MR. ISABELLA: 4 Opposed? 5 6 MR. WEANER: 7 Mr. President, the vote's unanimously, 8 yes. 9 MR. ISABELLA: 10 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 11 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 12 The next item concerns adoption of 13 proposed amendments section 147.142 relating to 14 possession of wildlife accidentally killed by a motor 15 vehicle to expand the section's coverage to apply to 16 wildlife disposition generally pursuant to a 17 consumption permit. The Executive Director and Staff 18 recommend final adoption of this amendment to 58 PA 19 Code as shown on Exhibit E on pages 13 and 14 of your 20 Agenda. 21 MR. ISABELLA: 22 Thank you, Brad. Commissioners, you've 23 heard the reading of the commentary; is there a motion? 24 25 MR. WEANER:

14 So moved. 1 2 MR. ISABELLA: 3 Mr. Weaner motion. Second? MR. SCHLEMMER: 4 5 Second. 6 MR. ISABELLA: 7 Mr. Schlemmer, second. Any discussion? 8 MR. SCHLEMMER: 9 Yes. 10 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Schreffler. 11 12 MR. SCHREFFLER: 13 My understanding is that this is 14 basically adds turkeys to the accidental road kills to 15 be picked up as well as deer; is that right? 16 MR. PALMER: 17 Yes, Commissioner Schreffler. What this 18 includes is an expansion of the allowance for 19 Pennsylvania residences to pick up turkeys that are 20 killed on the highway without first contacting the 21 Commission and they would have the same period of time 22 to contact the Commission to receive a permit or a 23 permit number to take possession of that for 24 consumption. 25 MR. SCHREFFLER:

15 And they can call in to get that number; 1 2 is that correct? 3 MR. PALMER: That's correct. 4 5 MR. SCHLEFFLER: 6 And what about the animals, the other 7 animals that might be killed on the road, like for instance, foxes and things of that sort? 8 9 MR. PALMER: 10 There is a another allowance under 2-B that authorizes licensed Pennsylvania furtakers 11 12 license to take immediate possession and utilize the edible/inedible portions of any furbearer, except, 13 14 river otters, bobcats and fishers that are obviously 15 killed by motor vehicles. 16 MR. SCHREFFLER: In this consumption permit portion here, 17 18 a farmer who would kill deer for crop kill on his farm, and he stocked at consumption for the last few 19 20 months if he wants to give back to, let's say, a needy 21 family or something like that? 22 MR. PALMER: 23 Well, a farmer can not give back 24 Those deer have to be turned into the directly. 25 Commission. And once they are turned into the

commission though, this would provide the 1 2 administrative vehicle or the paperwork for 3 consumption from it, would be given by the officer to the people taking possession of that animal. 4 5 MR. SCHREFFLER: 6 Good. Thank you for the clarification. 7 MR. ISABELLA: Any further discussion? 8 9 MR. DELANEY: 10 Yes, President Isabella. 11 MR. ISABELLA: 12 Commissioner Delaney. 13 MR. DELANEY: 14 Rich, I take it this is new policy that 15 we have here, I certainly support it. I think it's 16 worth the reviews of another resource that would probably be just totally discarded in what we're 17 18 doing, but I'd also think if we amend this policy at 19 this meeting today, that's certain we need to do a 20 real good job to allow our sportsmen to know what 21 changes there are out there. So again, this resource 22 will be used in a proper fashion. Thank you. 23 MR. ISABELLA: 24 Any further discussion? All in favor 25 signify by saying Aye.

9	ATTORNEY BECHTEL:
10	The next item related to proposal
11	amendments. Amendment 58 PA Code Sections 139.4,
12	141.43 and 141.44. The use of crossbows in the
13	archery seasons has been a difficult issue for the
14	Board of Commissioners to address. The crossbow was
15	included in all archery seasons by the Board of
16	Commissioners in January of 2009. Since that time,
17	the composition of the Board has changed and some
18	Commissioners believe the vote in January does not
19	reflect the views of the current Board.
20	As a result, the Agenda item below has
21	been introduced to change the season in which the
22	crossbow can be used. This will result in less time
23	available for the use of crossbows in the archery
24	season. The changes are listed in the text on pages
25	15 through 18 of your Agenda. This is the Commission

18 directed agenda item. 1 2 MR. ISABELLA: Thank you, Brad. You've heard the 3 commentary. Do I have a motion? 4 5 MR. WEANER: 6 So moved. 7 MR. ISABELLA: Commissioner Weaner. Second? 8 9 MR. DELANEY: 10 So moved. 11 MR. ISABELLA: 12 Commissioner Delaney. Any discussion? 13 MR. WEANER: Mr. President? 14 15 MR. ISABELLA: 16 Mr. Secretary? 17 MR. WEANER: I discovered since the book was printed 18 19 here that it didn't quite match the proposal that I 20 had attended. And so therefore, I'm offering an 21 amendment, which would change the language on page 15. 22 I would move to strike out the last day of the season 23 as being October 17th and insert the date October 24 16th. 25 MR. ISABELLA:

19 Is there a second to the amendment? 1 2 MR. SCHREFFLER: I'll second it. 3 MR. ISABELLA: 4 5 Commissioner Schreffler. All in favor of amendment signify by saying Aye. 6 AYES TAKEN 7 8 MR. ISABELLA: 9 Opposed? All in favor of the amendment 10 signify by reading your name. Opposed? 11 MR. WEANER: 12 Mr. President, the vote was four to 13 three, four in favor, Boop, Delaney, Weaner and 14 Schreffler. Then three opposed; Putnam, Isabella, 15 Schlemmer. 16 MR. ISABELLA: 17 Now, we have an amended motion. I'd like to have discussion on the amended motion. 18 Commissioner Schreffler? 19 20 MR. SCHREFFLER: 21 I think that everyone on this Yes. 22 Board's first concern is the wellbeing of our 23 wildlife, in fact, I'm sure of it. And I think that 24 everyone on the Board wants to increase opportunities 25 to hunters, especially on getting our youth involved.

1 And I'm pretty sure of that. And Pennsylvania, I find 2 to be unique among states, it has a unique wildlife 3 agency, it has a unique number of hunters, it has a 4 unique hunting tradition zone, we make hunting per 5 area. And in fact, even the conditions of 6 Pennsylvania are rather unique compared to many other 7 states.

This issue is about not necessarily more 8 hunters, but more hunters hunting at a different time 9 10 with a possibly very effective weapon. This includes the sensitive period of the deer and also the last 11 year of the archery bear study. There's a belief, and 12 13 that's a belief, that there may, may be little or no 14 effect on deer by increased hunting with possibly a 15 more effective weapon. But my concern, it seems to be the missing and incomplete Pennsylvania data needed to 16 make a sound, long-term decision. 17

18 In addition, the archery bear study may have to start over if we change the parameters that 19 20 are involved. I have recommended cautious moves and 21 there have been rebut in the past, and this raises my 22 concern about the future decisions at the end of the 23 sunset provision. Looking at current actions of those who have not yet even realized any of the benefits 24 25 they complain about losing, I fear any changes at the

end of the sunset period will be met with more 1 2 opposition and controversy than now. 3 The voices that say, we've invested in expensive purchases, i.e., the crossbow are few now 4 according to the testimony we heard yesterday. They 5 seem to discount that many rifle owners also invest as 6 much for a two-week season while crossbow use is 7 available in most all seasons but for a few weeks, a 8 tremendous opportunity if you are truly a crossbow 9 10 devotee. 11 Looking at our deer numbers, at our current deer management goal and the resilience of the 12 13 species, the original intent of the early archery 14 season as a primitive low-impact season with limited 15 effect on the resource provide variable opportunities 16 to hunters, I believe this can probably be tweaked as 17 the proposal allows. In fact, I encourage the Board 18 of Commissioners to take a measured approach to move 19 cautiously, to vote for the proposal and have the 20 Staff gather complete, accurate data to make a more reliable and informed decision for the long term. 21 22 Thank you. 23 MR. ISABELLA: 24 Thank you, Commissioner. Is there more 25 discussion? Commissioner Weaner?

MR. WEANER:

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Thank you. And I realize that this 2 matter has gotten a lot of attention in the last 3 number of weeks or months here. It's my opinion that 4 the vote of January could very easily have gone the 5 other way, except for the vote on the scopes; that was 6 7 quickly tossed out. The proponents of crossbows had no problem at all with quickly reversing a decision 8 made by the Board at that time, but they seem to have 9 10 an extreme problem with us now reversing the decision the Board made back there. I have a problem with 11 12 that. 13 In April, I think the votes were here on 14 the Commission Board that we could have passed it in 15 April, we could have voted on it today or we can 16 finally adopt it. Everyone would know about it today, 17 and even know it was printed and digested in plenty of 18 time to get the word out, but we were in mind at that time that that wasn't the proper way to go about this, 19 20 that we should wait until the summer meeting, we 21 should introduce it and allow plenty of time for 22 public comment and that is the proper way to do it. 23 So you know, we basically agreed, okay, this is the way we're going to go about it. 24 25 Well, now we're being hammered because

1 --- well, let's push the deadline to make a decision 2 up to a very late time and, you know, it's going to be 3 right up to the season before we know what's --- it's 4 really not my fault, I just did what I was asked and 5 went through the proper procedure. We could have been 6 done today.

7 I've gotten a lot of support from people around the State for the proposal that I have put 8 forth. Some people have said, well, we need to go to 9 the legislature and get them to reverse what possibly 10 the Commission might do. We heard testimony yesterday 11 12 from our good representative, saying, it's not their 13 job and I personally agree with him. I think we need 14 to have a fair amount of discussion of the merits of 15 any of our decisions out there and let the politics out of it. This is not a political decision being 16 17 made. It's a decision, from my part, based on the 18 resource.

Our proposal, if you read it correctly, is not disenfranchising people who have bought trusts with us. If you purchase a crossbow and decide to hunt, given every opportunity you have, under my proposal, Statewide, you'll have seven weeks of archery hunting, versus the 10 weeks that people with other archery equipment, longbows, cross --- compound,

et cetera. So we're cutting back three weeks. We're 1 2 going from ten weeks back to seven. Yes, it has to be done. Is that adverse gathering? Is that 3 disenfranchising crossbow people? No, I don't think 4 so. We still have adequate window of opportunity. 5 6 We've been criticized for not following 7 scientific management. Well, in the history of the Game Commission, as I've been able to determine in 8 looking back, we've always gone at things slowly and 9 10 with measured cost and certainly, I think that's the way it should be because we're not sure always of the 11 outcome of our decisions. And we want to err on the 12 13 side of caution, but yet, when the vote was taken back 14 in January, that was completely thrown out the window 15 and we simply said no, we don't have much information, but we're just going to throw it over Statewide. 16 And 17 yet, I'm being criticized for not following science. There seems to be a disconnect there. 18 19 The argument we've heard is, too, that 20 the deer numbers are managed by antlerless licenses. 21 It doesn't matter the weapons we use, how long the 22 seasons are; we can manage with antlerless licenses. 23 Well, that's true to a point, but if the result is that we have to severely cut back on antlerless 24

25 allocations because we have so many more people than

1 we ever anticipated out hunting and killing deer, 2 well, that's limiting opportunities every time you 3 can't buy an antlerless license, your opportunities 4 are limited. So what's the difference if we limit 5 here or limit it there?

6 You know, I personally don't want to see 7 us get into an opportunity where we have to cut back allocations because of the seasons. I would rather go 8 cautiously with the season. We've been told that, 9 10 well, it's printed in digest, and I will acknowledge that yes, it's printed in the digest and that does 11 create a concern, but for me, that's the biggest 12 13 single factor or negative about this. But in 14 inquiring with the Staff of the Commission, we said 15 had something like this ever happened before and the response was, well, lately, we've been doing pretty 16 17 well with it, but years ago, there were just tons of 18 things that were printed in the digest that weren't right when the season came, but we got one of those. 19 20 And so is it real clean? No, it's not real clean, but 21 it can be dealt with.

The proponents on crossbow use statewide knew that we had changed the ruling in January. They knew it the same day or the next day, and the word was out. It didn't have to be published anywhere before

1 people found out about it. So I think probably, by 2 the end of today, if our motion prevails, most people 3 that have bought crossbows will know about it. It's 4 not an issue that no one's going to know, there's 5 going to be people out there hunting that are just 6 completely clueless. That's not going to be a 7 significant problem. People will know.

We've been told to wait for the Sunset 8 Provision to kick in because then we can analyze 9 10 everything, and we'll follow the original motion that was made back in January and that's a much better 11 12 approach, but the same people that are telling us that 13 are saying now, well, you can't change this because 14 you just gave us this opportunity and now you're 15 taking it away. Well, what makes it any easier three years from now than it is right now? I mean, you 16 17 can't have it both ways. If it can't happen in three years, and it doesn't meet the --- if it's easy to do 18 19 it in three years, don't make the argument that it 20 can't be done now.

Personally, I think it's easier to backtrack now before something actually gets started. I personally am not opposed to crossbow use. I think that it's a legitimate weapon to be used to hunt deer or bear or other animals in Pennsylvania. I just like

1 to think that we need to go cautiously with the whole
2 thing.

3 The last thing is, yesterday we heard testimony that, well, really, the sales of crossbows 4 are up insignificantly compared to other years and 5 6 it's not going to be a real factor. But yet, the same 7 crossbow proponents everywhere has been throwing out figures ever since April saying that they're probably 8 going to be between 60,000 and a hundred thousand new 9 10 crossbows sold before the season. Well, which is it? I mean, if it's the safety we're counting one time, 11 well, it's not a factor because we haven't sold any, 12 13 and, well, it's going to be a huge factor because we 14 sold a lot. You know, it can be both. You get kind 15 of worn out after a while listening to conflicting 16 information from the same people.

17 And finally, I'd just like to say, let's 18 have a debate of the merits of this issue, forget about personal attacks on the motives of the people 19 20 that bring this stuff up. I mean, we're all here for 21 the same reason. We're all here to provide the best 22 management for the resources that we have. We vote, the outcome of the vote is recorded and we move 23 forward. And so therefore, I urge all of you to 24 25 support this motion.

28 MR. ISABELLA: 1 2 Thank you, Commissioner. Any further With that, all in favor of the amended 3 discussion? motion please raise your right hand. Opposed? 4 5 MR. WEANER: 6 Mr. President, the vote's four to three. 7 The four voting in favor are Boop, Delaney, Weaner and Schreffler. The three voting opposed; Putnam, 8 Isabella, Schlemmer. 9 10 MR. ISABELLA: 11 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 12 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 13 The next item is the amendment of 58 PA 14 Code Chapter 143 by adding section 143.203A. On 15 October 9th, 2008 House Bill 747, Act 101 of '08, was signed into law. This legislation effectively amended 16 section 2706.2 of the act relating to elk hunting 17 licenses to authorize the Commission to auction off 18 19 one elk license per license year through an eligible 20 wildlife conservation organization. 21 To this end, the commission is proposing 22 to add section 143.203A to establish the special elk conservation license auction and license issuance 23 process. The text of this is shown on page 19 of your 24 25 Agenda. The Executive Director and staff recommend

the commission approves this addition to 58 PA Code 1 Chapter 143. 2 3 MR. ISABELLA: You've heard the reading of the minutes; 4 5 is there a motion? MR. WEANER: 6 7 So moved. MR. ISABELLA: 8 9 Commissioner Weaner. Is there a second? 10 MR. BOOP: 11 Second. 12 MR. ISABELLA: 13 Commissioner Boop. Any discussion? All 14 in favor, signify by saying Aye. AYES TAKEN 15 16 MR. ISABELLA: 17 Opposed? 18 MR. WEANER: 19 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously, 20 yes. 21 MR. ISABELLA: 22 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 23 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 24 The next item concerns the amendment of 25 58 PA Code Chapter 141 Section 141.20 and Chapter 147

1	Sections 147.101 through 147.114. A dual State and
2	Federal permitting system has been in place since the
3	initial implementation of Federal regulations
4	governing falconry. Notwithstanding the separation
5	and independence of these dual permitting structures,
6	the states have always been required to operate their
7	falconry programs within the bounds of the Federal
8	regulations. On October 8, 2008, the United States
9	Fish and Wildlife Service published new changes to the
10	Federal falconry regulations. The new language
11	eliminated the requirement for a Federal permit to
12	practice falconry. The new language also established
13	a deadline of January 1st, 2014, at which time the
14	Federal permit program will be discontinued.
15	In order for Pennsylvania's falconry
16	program to continue beyond this deadline, it must
17	adopt and implement regulation that meets the
18	standards in the new Federal regulations. Once the
19	standards are met, falconers will only be required to
20	possess a state permit. The Commission is proposing
21	to amend Sections 141.20 and 147.101 through 147.114
22	to meet new Federal regulations, as well as to
23	simplify, reorganize and enhance current State
24	regulations. The text of these changes are found on
25	page 24 of your agenda. The Executive Director and

31 Staff recommend the Commission approve these changes. 1 2 MR. ISABELLA: 3 Thank you, Brad. You've heard the reading of the commentary; is there a motion? 4 5 MR. SCHREFFLER: So moved. 6 7 MR. ISABELLA: MR. Schreffler. Is there a second? 8 9 MR. SCHLEMMER: 10 Second. 11 MR. ISABELLA: 12 Mr. Schlemmer. Any discussion? All in 13 favor, signify by saying Aye. Opposed? 14 MR. WEANER: 15 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously, 16 yes. 17 MR. ISABELLA: 18 Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 19 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 20 The next item concerns the amendment of 58 PA Code Sections 147.559 and 147.560. The 21 22 Agriculture Deer Control Permit, commonly referred to 23 as the Red Tag, is a very useful program that assists 24 landowners in achieving their land use goals by 25 managing deer densities on their respective properties

1 through the use of licensed hunters. Traditionally, 2 this program has required landowners to individually 3 manage the application, reporting and deer-control 4 activities themselves.

In an effort to enhance public access to 5 this program, the Commission is proposing to amend 6 Sections 147.559 and 147.560 to authorize political 7 subdivisions to make application for an agricultural 8 deer control permit for the limited purpose of 9 10 managing the agricultural deer-control activities occurring on a conglomeration separate, but otherwise 11 individually-eligible properties located within the 12 jurisdictional boundaries of the political 13 subdivision. 14

15 This structure will not only reduce the 16 demands on each respective landowner, but it will 17 enhance the effectiveness of a larger deer-control 18 plan promoted by the community by consolidating the 19 management of deer-control activities into one central 20 location. These changes are shown on pages 41 through 21 42 of your Agenda. The Executive Director and Staff 22 recommend the Commission approve these changes.

The Executive Director recommends that the Commission approve Findings of Fact, Conclusions of 2 3 Law, and Recommendation of the Hearing Officer, Andrew Lehman, allowing revocation period to remain as 4 originally ordered for the individuals listed on the 5 6 first page of your supplement. 7 MR. ISABELLA: 8 You heard the reading of the commentary; is there a motion? 9 10 MR. BOOP: I'll move. 11 12 MR. ISABELLA: 13 Commissioner Boop. Second? 14 MR. WEANER: 15 Second. 16 MR. ISABELLA: 17 Commissioner Weaner. Any discussion? 18 All in favor, signify by saying Aye. Opposed? 19 MR. WEANER: 20 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously, 21 yes. 22 MR. 1 Game Land Number 93 as shown on Exhibit Red-1 on page 2 45 of your Agenda. The option price is \$130,000 lump 3 sum to be paid by third-party commitments for the 4 compensation of habitat and recreational losses from 5 previously approved Commission actions.

6 The sale is subject to a reservation of 7 all coal, oil, coal-bed methane and gas underlying the property. However, there shall be no above-ground 8 operations on the property to remove the same. 9 10 Acquiring this property will join two previously acquired detached parcels of existing State Game Land 11 Number 93, which were acquired and named in honor of 12 13 the Flight 93 Crew and Passengers. This property 14 adjoins the Flight 93 Memorial Boundary established by 15 the National Park Service and authorized by the Flight 16 93 Memorial Act. Approximately 115 acres of the tract 17 is vegetated in grassland from a previously reclaimed 18 surface mine operation, while the remaining portion is forested with mixed northern hardwoods. The grassland 19 20 is beneficial to wildlife species requiring large continuous blocks of undisturbed habitat such as 21 22 Henslow Sparrow and Upland Sandpiper. Access is provided off Johnson Bottom Road. 23 24 The second tract is contract number 3552

25 State Game Land Number 331 in Clearfield County. The

1 Western Pennsylvania Conservancy is offering two tracts of land totaling 1,095 more or less acres in 2 Huston Township, Clearfield County, adjoining State 3 Game Land Number 331 as shown on Exhibit Red-2 on page 4 46 of your agenda. The option price is \$438,000 lump 5 sum to be paid in part with funds from the Estate of 6 7 Blanche Pollum and the remainder by third-party commitments for compensation of habitat and 8 recreational losses from previously approved 9 10 Commission actions. 11 The option is pending upon final approval 12 from Western Pennsylvania Conservancy's Board of 13 Directors and accepts and reserves all timber for 20 years from the date of settlement. The timber will be 14 15 managed in close coordination with the Commission and follow established best management practices. 16 The 17 first tract referred to as the Bark Camp Run tract is 18 736 acres more or less and adjoins the north east boundary of State Game land Number 331. 19 20 Bark Camp Run, designated as cold water 21 fishery runs through the mostly forested tract 22 comprised of mixed northern hardwoods and multiple wetlands associated with the stream corridor. 23 The second tract referred to as the Bennett Branch tract 24

25 is 359 acres more or less and is an indenture into the

2	This tract is predominately forested with mixed
3	northern hardwoods. This tract has frontage on the
4	upper reaches of the Bennett Branch of the

So I'm thrilled to continue to purchase this type of property 11 in Pennsylvania, but my concerns are that we can keep 12 13 it grassland and small game habitat. Thank you. 14 MR. ISABELLA: 15 Any further discussion? 16 MR. BOOP: 17 Calling for question. 18 MR. ISABELLA: 19 Commissioner Boop. All in favor, signify 20 by saying Aye. Opposed? 21 MR. WEANER: 22 Mr. President, the vote was unanimously 23 yes. 24 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 25 The next item before the Commission is

the land issue contract number 3553 involving State 1 2 Game Lands Number 152 in Erie County, State Game Land Numbers 86, 243 and 306 in Warren County. Clear Lake 3 Timber, Inc. was previously the high bidder on three 4 of the Commission's timber sales, all of which are in 5 varied stages of herbicide treatment and 6 7 infrastructure development. The timber sales are 063-06-1, 64-06-01 and 184-06-01 with an accumulated bid 8 value of \$1,148,112. 9

10 In lieu of initial block cut payments due to the Commission, Clear Lake Lumber is offering six 11 12 tracts of land totaling 452.04 acres more or less. The six tracts are as follows, 134.75 acres more or 13 14 less in Elk Creek Township, Erie County adjoining 15 State Game Land Number 152 shown on Exhibit Red Three on page 48 of your agenda, 16 acres more or less in 16 17 Deerfield Township, Warren County adjoining State Game 18 Land Number 86 shown on Exhibit Red Four on page 49 of your exhibit. 19

Three tracts adjoining State Game land 143 in Pittsfield Township, Warren County totaling 22 239.69 acres more or less shown on Exhibit Red Five on 23 page 50 of your agenda. And 61.6 acres more or less 24 in Freehold Township Warren County adjoining State 25 Game Land Number 306 shown on Exhibit Red-6 on page 51

of your exhibit. The Commission is interested in 1 2 acquiring all of these tracts after reviewing their attributes and appraised values. The Commission and 3 Clear Lake Timber have agreed to a total value of 4 \$484,000 for all six parcels, allowing for a 5 6 reservation on all timber 13 inches diameter breast 7 height and above, excluding conifers for one year from the date of settlement on four of the six tracts. 8 The value of \$484,000 is to be credited against the timber 9 10 sales until the value has been exhausted. All residual monies owed to the 11 12 Commission from timber sales will be deposited 13 directly into the Game Fund. This exchange will 14 provide additional hunting acreage contiguous to State 15 Game Land Numbers 86, 143, 152 and 306. All the tracts are forested with a good diversity of both hard 16 17 and soft mast-producing tree and shrub species. 18 Acquiring the tracts adjoining State Game 19 Land Number 143 will increase protection of the 20 biologically diverse Brokenstraw Creek. Acquiring the 21 tract adjoining State Game Land Number 306 will 22 provide additional protection to the biological of 23 Benson Swamp by securing numerous spring seeps and unnamed tributaries that flow into this diverse 24 25 wetland. All tracts provide additional access to

1 State Game Lands.

The staff has reviewed this proposal and 2 3 has determined it to be of equal or greater value for the benefit of wildlife. The Executive Director and 4 Staff recommend that the land exchange listed above be 5 6 approved and the Commission authorize the Bureau of 7 Wildlife Habitat Management to proceed with this exchange. 8 9 MR. ISABELLA: 10 Thank you, Brad. You've heard the reading of the commentary, is there a motion? 11 12 MR. WEANER: So moved. 13 14 PREIDENT: 15 Commissioner Weaner. Is there a second? 16 MR. BOOP: 17 Second. 18 MR. ISABELLA: 19 Commissioner Boop. Any discussion? 20 Commissioner Schlemmer. 21 MR. 50 MR. WEANER: 1 2 Mr. President, the vote is unanimously, 3 yes. ATTORNEY BECHTEL: 4 The next item turns to interagency 5 On May 15th, 2008, the Game Commission 6 transfer. 7 entered into a Cooperative Interagency Agreement for Interdepartmental Land Transfer and Establishment of 8 State Game Land Banks with the Department of 9 10 Transportation and the Federal Highway Administration. The State Game Land Banking Agreement will streamline 11 transportation development projects by allowing 12 PennDOT Districts to establish State Game Land Banks 13 14 in advance of highway projects impacting less than 15 five acres of State Game Land. 16 This agreement will expedite the 17 mitigation process where impacts can be debited from 18 existing land banks instead of being addressed on a 19 case-by-case basis. The following two tracts have 20 been identified as being acceptable sites for use as a State Game Land Bank Site in accordance with the 21 22 agreement. Contract Number 3554, State Game Land 23 Number 313 in Tioga County, PennDOT has agreed to transfer exclusive jurisdiction and control of 104.6 2.4 25 acres more or less tract of land located in Chatham

Township Tioga County to the Game Commission and 1 2 retain a right to enter the wetland mitigation portion of the site to conduct monitoring and maintenance. 3 The property called the Hoffman Wetlands Bank Site is 4 a detached parcel located approximately, eight miles 5 6 southeast of State Game Land Number 313. The property consists of 50 acres to be reserved in the Wetland 7 Banking Program and 54.6 acres will be placed in the 8 9 State Game Lands Banking Program as shown on Exhibit 10 Red-7 on page 54 of your Agenda.

11 The following habitat communities are 12 located on the property; 18 acres of constructed wetlands, 10 acres of natural wetlands, 12 acres of 13 14 constructed upland-wetland buffers, 10 acres of 15 natural riparian-wetland buffers, 13 acres of mature deciduous forest, 6.6 acres of pole-sapling deciduous 16 forest, 12 acres of mature hemlock forest, 11 acres of 17 bottomland forest-scrubland and 12 acres in herbaceous 18 19 old fields.

The next contract is contract number 3555 State Game Land Number 325 in Northumberland County. PennDOT has agreed to transfer exclusive jurisdiction and control of the 45.3 acre more or less tract of land located in Lewis Township Northumberland County to the Game Commission, also retaining the right to

enter wetland mitigation portions of the site to 1 2 conduct monitoring and maintenance. This property is called the Vargo Wetlands Bank Site, a detached parcel 3 located approximately four miles north of State Game 4 Land Number 325. The property consists of 37.3 acres 5 6 to be reserved in the PennDOT Wetland Banking Program 7 with eight acres to be placed in the State Game Lands Banking Program as shown on Exhibit Red-8 on page 55 8 of your Agenda. 9

10 The following habitat communities are located on the property: 16 acres of constructed 11 12 wetlands, one acre of natural wetlands, 17 acres of constructed upland-wetland buffers, 3.3 acres of 13 14 natural riparian-wetland buffers, 5 acres of mature 15 riparian deciduous forest and 3 acres of herbaceous 16 old fields. The Executive Director and Staff 17 recommend the options listed above be accepted and the Commission authorize the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat 18 Management to proceed with the acquisition of these 19 20 tracts.

ISABELLA: Thank you, Mr. Secretary. 14 15 ATTORNEY BECHTEL: The next action to come before the 16 17 Commission is the Surface Mining Coal Lease on State 18 Game Land Number 174, Indiana County. P&N Coal 19 Company of Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania has requested a 20 lease to surface mine and remove approximately 15,000 21 tons of coal from a ten-acre portion of State Game 22 Land Number 174 as shown on Exhibit OGM-1 on page 58 23 of your Agenda. 24 The Commission does not own the coal, but 25 is the owner of the surface support rights on this

tract of land. P&N is currently surface mining on 1 2 private lands adjacent to State Game Land Number 174 and desires to extend its mining operations onto the 3 State game land. The proposed re-mining operation 4 will have a total surface impact of approximately, 5 seven acres for the actual coal removal and 6 7 approximately three additional acres for erosion, and sedimentation control and operational support. 8 The proposed surface mine area has been 9 10 previously deep and surface mined resulting in a scarred landscape containing many dangerous subsidence 11 12 holes, abandoned mine spoil piles and high walls,

13 which will be removed and reclaimed. The project will 14 also include a permanent relocation of a township road 15 approximately, 100 to 150-feet to the south of its 16 current location. The road relocation will allow for 17 existing coal reserves to be removed from under the 18 road and will eliminate a sharp curve.

All timber to be impacted as a result of the proposed project will be assessed by the Game Commission forestry staff at double-stumpage rate. In exchange for the lease from the Commission, P&N Coal Company will pay the Commission on a monthly basis a royalty rate, six percent of the then current FOB pit price, whichever the greater, for each marketable ton

1 of coal removed from the lease area. A royalty value 2 of approximately, \$41,000 is estimated for this 3 project and all royalty will be directly deposited 4 into the Game Fund.

Mining will be regulated by the 5 6 Commonwealth Surface Mining Regulations and the Commission's standard surface mine lease agreement. 7 The five-year surface mining lease will include the 8 standard performance bond and environmental protection 9 10 measures. In addition, the lease will include a wildlife habitat reclamation and re-vegetation plan 11 12 developed by the local Land Management Group Supervisor. 13

14 The staff has reviewed this proposal and 15 has determined that the total value of the coal 16 royalty, timber, as well as the proposed reclamation is equal to or greater than the accumulated value for 17 the lease. The Executive Director and staff recommend 18 the proposed lease be approved, and the Commission 19 20 authorizes the Bureau of Wildlife Habitat Management 21 to proceed with the leasing arrangement as listed 22 above.

2	cottontail rabbit to our youth junior hunting season.
3	The season should be the same time frame and dates as
4	the youth pheasant and squirrel season. This special
5	season will be for eligible junior hunters, 12 to 16
6	years old without a license that have successfully
7	completed a hunter/trapper education course and for
8	junior license holders.
9	I believe a continued expansion of small
10	game hunting affords an excellent foundation for
11	today's junior hunters along with recruitment
12	opportunities. This consideration would be for the
13	2010 to 2011 hunting season.
14	MR. ISABELLA:
15	Thank you, Commissioner. Do you have
16	that in writing?
17	MR. DELANEY:
18	Yes.
19	MR. ISABELLA:
20	Would you please forward a copy to the
21	Executive Director? Any more new business?
22	Commissioner Boop?
23	MR. BOOP:
24	Yes. We're finishing up fairly early
25	this morning and I just thought I'd take a moment

1 since we have people here, obviously. A lot of people
2 talk to you about what's going on with some of the
3 issues.

I'm getting a lot of questions as a Commissioner, and I assume that based on the discussion I had with some fellow commissioners there seems to be some confusion out there this year with the hunters and their license, and how they need to display the licenses this year.

10 Obviously, when the digest went to print, we weren't sure what was going to happen with the bill 11 12 that was pending, and of course, it's my understanding 13 of the bill, that it was not an act against the law. 14 I think on page 84 of the digest in the middle is a 15 section that says you do need to display your hunting license. But I know I was at a several picnics over 16 the 4th of July with a lot of outdoor people, and 17 18 there does seem to be a lot of confusion. People are saying that they're going put in their backpack, just 19 20 like they did last year, they're not to use their 21 fishing license holder and put it on their hat or 22 they're going to keep it in their wallet.

And it's my understanding and it's our position that until the law has changed, that you do need to display your general license. It doesn't need

to be on your back, but it does need to be displayed 1 somewhere on your person. 2 I'm sure we're going to have some leeway this year with our officers in the 3 field in terms of warning and alerting people, but 4 those of you who are in a position to influence and 5 talk to others, understandably, there's some confusion 6 7 out there and we really did not know how to put it in the digest when the digest was printed. 8

9 So I think we're all hoping that the 10 legislature from the past that you can carry it in 11 your wallet and not have to display it on your person, 12 because I understand that's not the case; that's not 13 going to be the case for this fall season. So I just 14 thought there's many of you here and I just want to 15 pass that along with because there it does seem to be 16 confusion.

17 I'm really pleased and surprised, I mean, 18 everyone that I'm talking to seems to understand the 19 new schedule for applying for antierless licenses and 20 putting in the mail this Friday, that news seems to be 21 out there, but it doesn't seem to be much confusion. 22 But this display issue does seem to have people worked 23 up. Thank you.

I can 3 tell you that a lot of these clerks at the issuing agents, they're really great on the new regulations. 4 I happened to walk, when I was going to my camp in 5 6 Schuylkill County, I went into two Wal-Mart's looking 7 to buy corn, and I was at the counter, I saw several licenses being transacted, I heard a lot of good 8 comments about what the game commission is doing. 9 And 10 the clerks there were giving all the new information to the hunters. In my facility where we sell 11 licenses, there was question about license being 12 displayed, and hopefully, the legislature will move 13 14 and they will make the decision where we don't have to 15 display the license anymore. So the word is getting 16 out and I'm sure we'll be flexible as we get into the 17 season. 18 MR. ISABELLA:

19 Any additional business? Okay.
